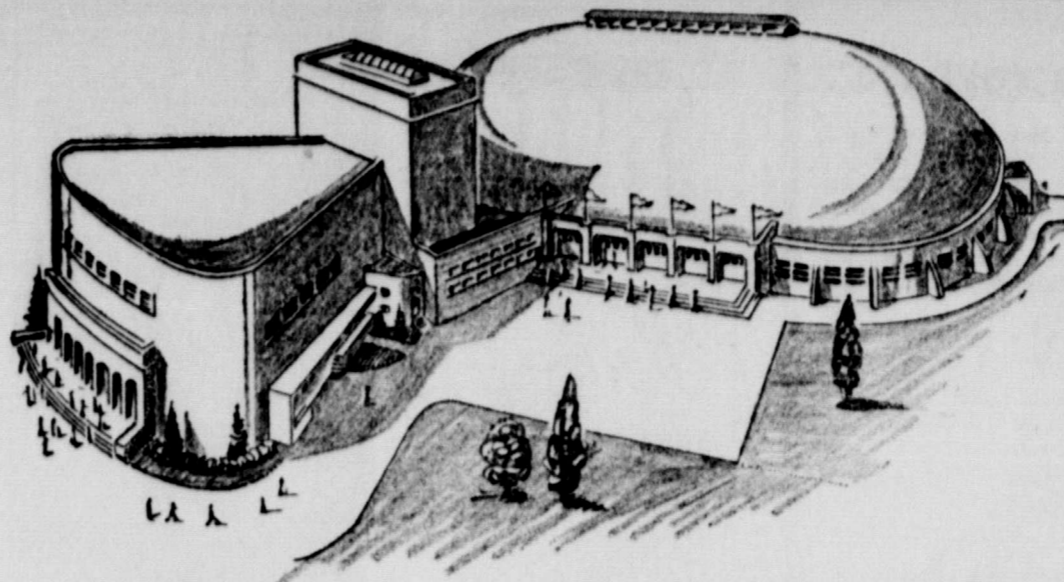
Jim Houghton, graduate of Hardin-Simmons and formerly of Ranger, is pastor of the Norton church.

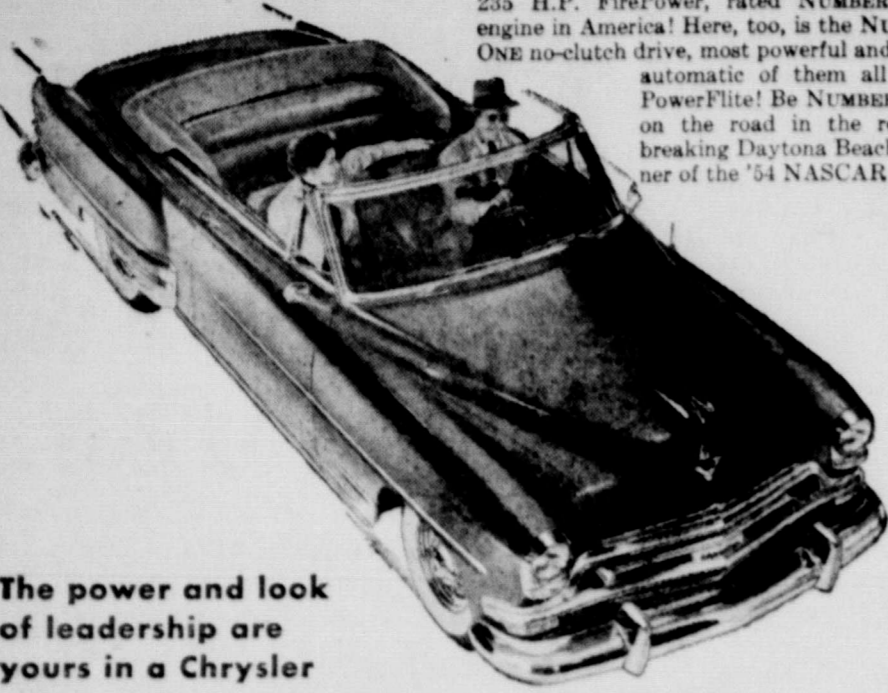

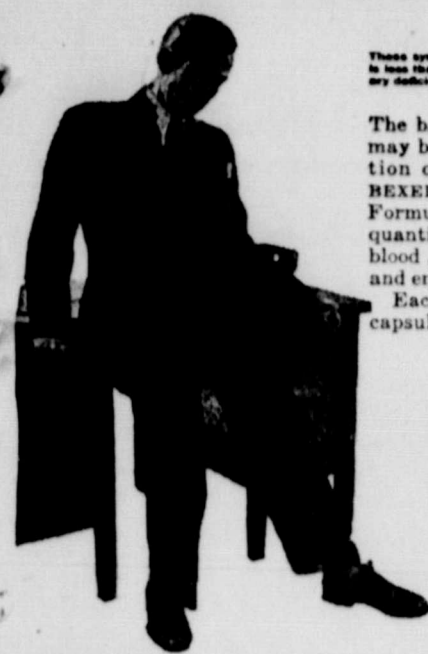

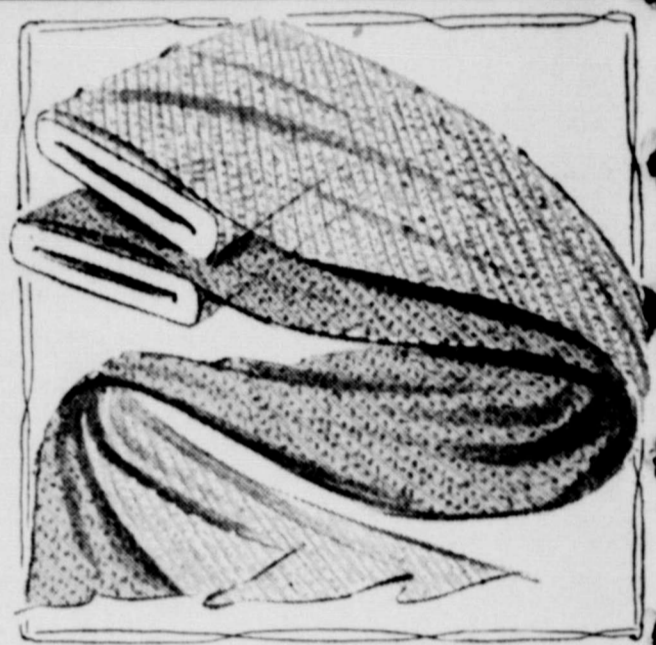

**Agent Gives Helps on Growing Vegetables for Deep Freezing**

John A. Barton, county farm agent, is suggesting a number of vegetable varieties that are most suitable for freezer lock-up and boxes. He states that the freezer is taking the place of the pressure cooker in preserving foods and that experiment records show that a much better quality is produced.

Mr. Barton states that a lot has been discovered within the past few years on the right varieties of vegetables to plant and grow for the deep freeze. As garden time is close at hand and a few suggestions are given.

Asparagus, Martha Washington, Mary Washington and Palmetto are favored. This is one of the easiest and earliest of all vegetables and can be grown on a small plot. A bed planted alongside will produce a lot of early, high quality vegetables.

Beans, lima, suggested varieties are: Fordhook 242, Henderson bush, and a pole bean, Florida speckled. For beans to shell, use Pinto and Kentucky Wonder.

Beans snap—Tendergreen, Top Crop, and Bluelake, a pole bean.

Beets—Detroit Red  
Carrots—Red Core Chantenay, Nante Coreless and Imperator  
Sweet Corn—Aristogold Bantam Evergreen, Iowana, Golden Cross Bantam  
Spinach, Swiss chard, turnip greens, mustard and tender greens can all be successfully frozen.

Okra—Louisiana green velvet  
Peas—Southern shelled, Cream 12, Extra early Black-eye and Dixie Lee crowder  
Pepper, green—California Wonder  
Squash—Early Prolific, Straight Neck, Yellow Crookneck, White Scallop.

The county agent has a number of new bulletins which will give information on growing, keeping off insects, when to plant, how much to plant, what kind of fertilizer, how often to water and many other items of valuable information.

Any interested are invited to secure these bulletins, which also tell how to freeze, how to cook and serve frozen foods.

A large number of farmers and ranchmen are helping their pastures and reseeded fields to catch and soak up limited rainfall by pitting them.

H. J. Zappe, Richard Herrin, Glen Eager, Clarence Spill, I. W. Rogers and L. F. Smith have already started or completed this work.
