February 15 Final **Date for Ordering Feed Through ASC**

The county ASC office announces that February 15 is the deadline for placing an application for FHA feed. Until February 15, orders may be placed for a feed supply to last 60 days or until April 15. The applicant must use the purchase order for feed before the 120-day limit, which is May 15. No application can be placed after February 15.

The office has been advised that the railroads' 50 per cent reduction in rates for hay hauling will expire in February but the government will continue to pay half the cost on transporting hay up to \$10 per ton on all deliveries to eligible farmers and ranchers until midnight March 31.

Publicity has been requested on 1955 wool, explained below. The department of agrciulture states that payments under the new program, for wool on animals marketed will be made on lambs or yearlings sold for slaughter.

Producers, in applying for wool payments, must have owned the animals at least 30 days. To be eligible for payment, the shorn wool and the lambs and yearlings must be marketed on or after April 1, 1955. In the case of shorn wool, it cannot have been shorn before January 1. 1955.

In qualifying for payment for wool on lambs or yearlings the producer must present to the


