

### TWO-BATH METHOD


With the Two-Bath Method 4% of detergent is added to the naptha, only one-fourth to one-half oz. of moisture is added per lb. of clothing to be cleaned. (When the atmosphere has a relative humidity of 75% the clothing will absorb this much moisture.) Only a fifteen-minute cycle and a two-minute rinse to remove the detergent is necessary to do a first-class dry cleaning job, eliminating 99% of all spotting, and eliminating all wet cleaning.
