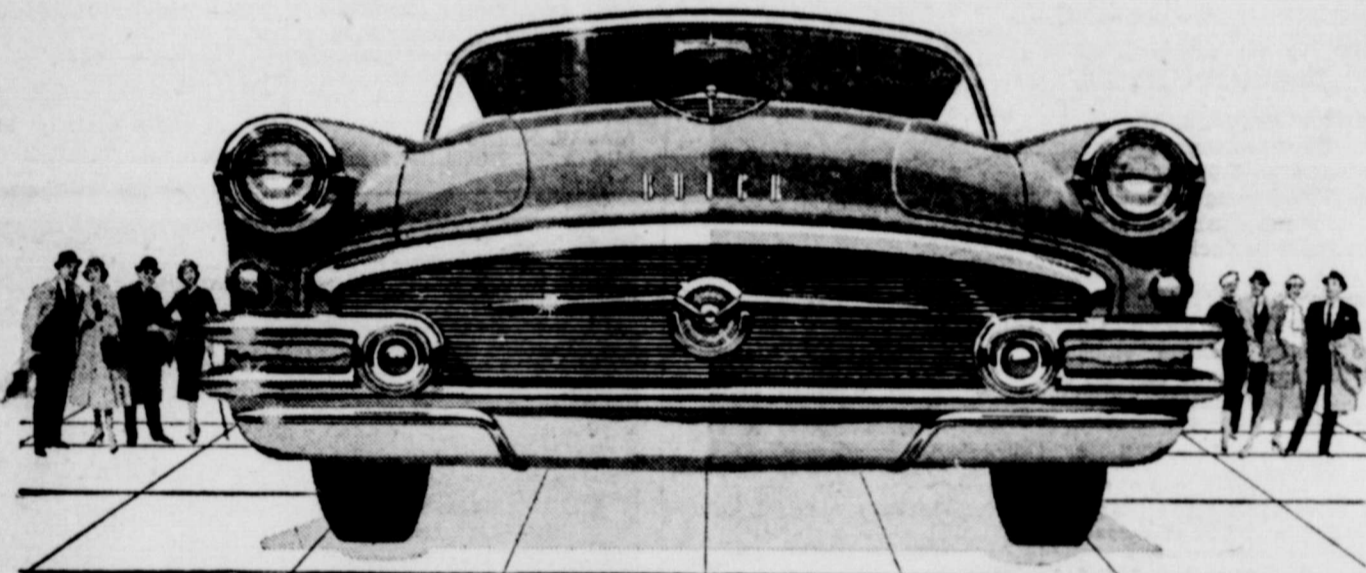

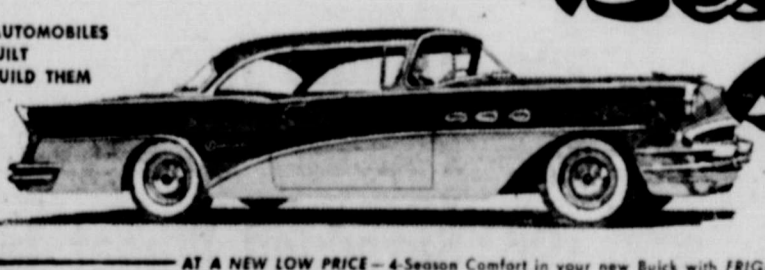

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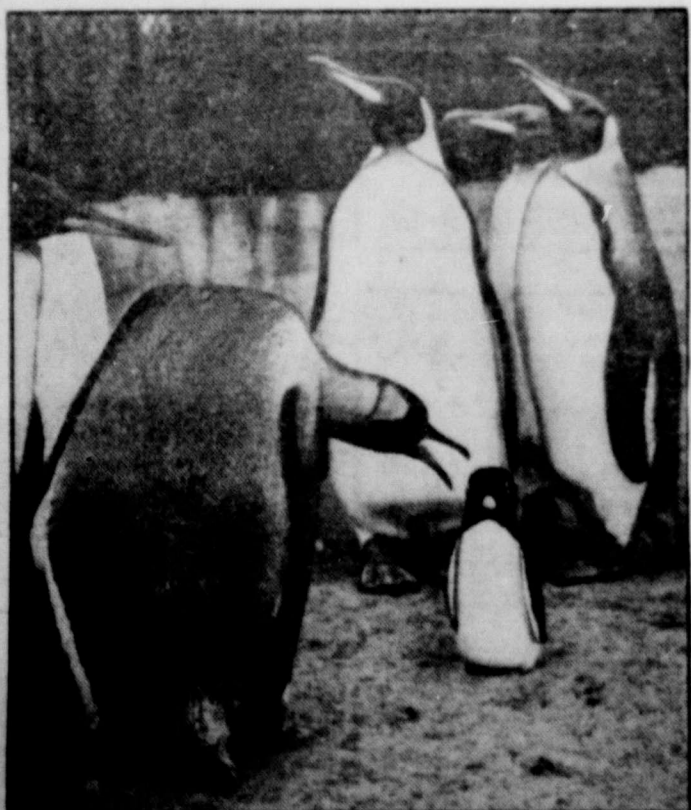

Farmers' Income Should be Kept For Tax Return

S. Baker Mallett, administrative officer in charge of the San Angelo Internal Revenue Service office is urging that all farmers keep records in order to be able to file a complete tax return. In a special article addressed to farmers he states: "By all means keep a complete record of all your income and all your expenses from your farming operations. Keep your records up to date by recording daily each sale of a farm product and each expense for food, fertilizer, and other farm expenses. Personal living expenses such as your own food, clothing and the like are not considered farm expenses. This record of your farm expense and income will make the job of filing tax returns easy at the end of the season. "Many more tax returns from farmers will be received this year because of the coverage of farm operators by social securi-

ty. This will require a tax return from every farmer who nets as much as \$400 from his farming, even if no income tax is payable. Tax return forms for farmers may be secured by writing the district director of internal revenue. "If you are a farm operator, whether you raise peanuts, popcorn, pigs, poultry or other farm products, you are obligated to pay self-employment tax and thereby earn social security credit, provided, of course, that you earn as much as \$400. A number of Ballinger stores are getting a face-lifting job that is adding beauty to the store and also helping to beautify the appearance of main street. Most of the jobs are including remodeling of the interior as well as a new look for the entrance. The half-dozen jobs already underway or completed, has started a move that should be contagious and spread to the entire town. Shoppers appreciate the appearance of a store and nothing will increase sales better than an attractive street entrance and a beautiful store with well planned displays of merchandise. The cost is not too great for such improvement and merchants who have not already planned a project are urged to investigate and if possible join their neighbors in making the business streets look better to the visitors and shoppers.

Until now the supply has prevented many from having the doses except in a few instances conducted for the past two years through the schools. The commercial supply has reached a point where it can be secured through your physician and the "shots" given when you want them. "Polio Vaccination Now" is a campaign that is being conducted nationwide and every family in the nation is being urged to consider the matter at once. Discuss it with your family physician. He can give all the information including the cost of the needed doses. This is the first year in history of all mankind that we can really do something to prevent polio. The size of the summer epidemic will depend to a great extent on what we do now in giving boys and girls the vaccine. Let's do away with iron lungs, leg braces, wheel chairs and live without the fear of the dreaded disease striking at our children. Talk to your doctor now before it is too late.

Under the plan, several hundred boys will be used on the various teams which make up the two leagues this year. Ramon C. Bailey is president and has had considerable experience at Dennison before moving to Coleman.

Moving day in the Bronie elementary school started last week with classes moving into the new and modern building. Supt. Garland Black stated that the moving would be gradual so as not to disturb classroom work any more than necessary. The new building is complete with exceptions of a few minor corrections to be made by the contractor. Members of the board of trustees expect to set the date for the formal opening at their next meeting. Moving into the new lunch room will be delayed because of the time involved in handling equipment from one room to another.

Construction and installation continues to move forward on the new telephone exchange building at Winters. John D. Under questions, the panel admitted that the use of a car offered an opportunity to go places and get into trouble but also pointed to the good uses that could be made of the family car. They cited the fact that when youngsters run in groups there is always transportation available. The City of Eden has called an election for April 3 at which time a mayor and two aldermen will be elected. Mrs. Lee Roy Pfister was named manager of the election. Mayor C. E. Harris has served the City of Eden for the past ten years, and according to reports, will not seek reelection this year. Cecil Chamption and Robert E. Burns, aldermen, will also complete their terms of office this year. No announcements have been filed with the city secretary.

A bounty of \$1 for fox has been offered at Menard. The members of the county commissioners' court voted that amount last week after hearing reports of the increase of fox over the area. One person was bitten by a red fox near Hexas and after the animal was killed it was found to have rabies. This required three persons to take serum because of the bite and scratches. It was also reported that many dogs have been bitten by fox in that county. To receive the bounty, the court requires that at least 4 inches of the tail be brought to the court house.

A study club has purchased the old Santa Fe depot at Rochelle and will turn it into a community center. The creation of such a center has been the project of the club for a number of years. A remodeling of the former depot will be started at once and a plan for the use of the building will be formed in the near future. Plans call for moving the building to another lot and a contractor has been secured to do the remodeling. Members of the club already have a building fund but stated they would need additional money to complete their plans.

The Miles Lions Club has conducted a very successful campaign for the March of Dimes and has had the cooperation of all other groups at Miles as well as individuals and firms. Last week-end a total of \$535 had been raised with one more big event to be staged. Special shows, a balloon sale, cake and pie auction, candy sale and various other events were used to raise the money during the drive. A dance at the county line will be the final money raising feature with the management of that place giving all proceeds of the dance to the Miles Lions to help with their quota.

Jaycees at Stephenville have voted to construct and operate a miniature golf course this summer. The club voted to try and have the course ready early in March and committees are studying ways of improving the lay-out to provide better entertainment for the patrons. This will help in the summer program of providing amusement for youngsters and others and will also provide a source of revenue for the Jaycees. The group is also completing plans for their annual banquet. An examiner for the Texas Railroad Commission completed hearings in Brownwood last week on an application by the Santa Fe to discontinue two trains between Brownwood and Temple. The railroad explained that mail carried on the trains could go by post office vehicles and railway trucks. It also showed that few passengers used the train and that express shipments were light and could go by highway carriers. Union organizations of trainmen, conductors and expressmen offered the only opposition. Citizens at Crane have made a formal request for free city mail delivery. A survey of that town was made last week with results that 623 residents signed statements saying they desired the delivery service. Postmaster A. T. Carroll stated that he was convinced the service was wanted and that he would file an application at once asking for city delivery. Crane is in postal district No. 2 with headquarters at Amarillo.

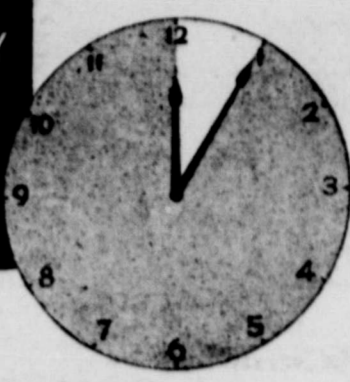

Presidential Committee Urges Greater Freedom in Transportation Rate Making Report Cites Savings to Public

Dallas, Texas — At the second session of the 84th Congress, one of the important legislative items to be considered is the Report of the Presidential Advisory Committee on Transport Policy. The Report contains recommendations for building a sound transportation system to serve the nation in peace and war.

More Transportation for Less Money

According to the Committee, the national transportation policy should stress competition, not government regulation, as the determining factor in setting carriers' charges for their services.

By placing all common carriers on a competitive rate-making basis, each mode of transport will be encouraged to develop its inherent advantages and pass on the resulting savings in lower rates to shippers. And because shipping costs are included in the price of almost every commodity, lowered shipping costs can easily mushroom into tremendous savings to the public.

Comprehensive Study

In July, 1954, President Eisenhower appointed a special Cabinet Committee to study our national transportation policies and problems and, in due time, submit its recommendations for his consideration.

To aid it in making the study and in drafting the Report, the Committee selected

a group of seven prominent and successful business and professional men, none of whom had any special interests to serve or axes to grind.

In April, 1955, the Committee submitted its Report to the President and shortly thereafter he passed it on to Congress with his approval.

Public Interest First

The Report contains many sound recommendations... all designed to promote the public interest by making it possible for the railroads, trucks and inland water carriers to compete for the nation's traffic on an equal basis.

The Committee recommends that each carrier be given the freedom to offer the public the lowest possible rates, so long as such rates show a profit over and above the cost of providing the services and provided such rates are not unfair.

Prevents Monopoly

The Interstate Commerce Commission would retain its power to prevent effectively any carrier from becoming a monopoly or from engaging in any unjust or unreasonable rate cutting.

Under the recommendations of the Report, the railroads would not have any rights or privileges not enjoyed by other modes of transportation.

All of the carriers would be on an equal rate-making basis... all enjoying the same rights

and privileges under precisely the same wording of the law. Where the inherent advantages made it possible for one carrier to establish a rate lower than that of some other carrier, it would be permitted to do so.

All the railroads seek, or all they are entitled to, is the right to compete on an equal basis with all other modes of transportation. That is what the Report of the Cabinet Committee recommends. The consuming public has everything to gain and nothing to lose by applying this principle of our free enterprise system to transportation.

Fair to All

The people of our nation always have been inherently just when they have the facts. If they are aware of the fairness and the equity of the Report of the President's Cabinet Committee, they will favor its adoption. Equity and justice are on its side.

Its strength and its virtue rest upon the principles of our free economy.

Its chief and only purpose is to promote the welfare of all the people.

The Report constitutes a fair and forward look in the national transportation policy.

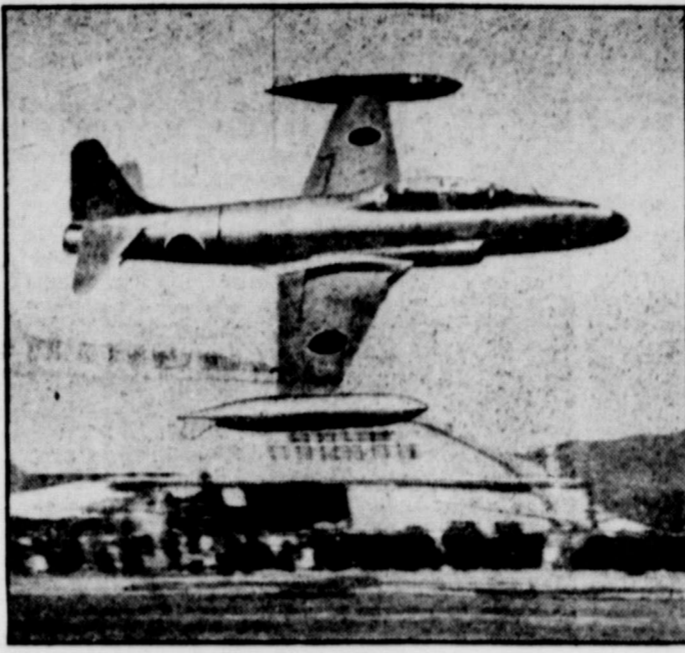
