MAY BE REPLENISHED Increased fish production is possible in farm ponds in the Runnels Soil Conservation District. Many ponds would yield more pounds of fish if they were properly stocked. Some of the best combinations for farm ponds are: bass-bream, bass-

According to George Krupala, local Soil Conservation Service technician, all undesirable should be removed before restocking ponds. He said the best way to remove the undesirable fish is with the application of rotenone or draining of the pond. More information can be obtained at the local conservation office.

Maintaining high fertility of pond water accomplishes two desirable objectives: increases fish production and prevents the growth of submerged waterweeds and moss. Using commercial fertilizer will more than double the yield in most ponds. The proper time to apply the fertilizer is from April

ance and to grow the big ones, heavy fishing is necessary. When small fish are bigg ex-cessively it is an indication that your pond is overstocked. Fish usually bite heavily when hungry. Constant fishing will remove the excess fish, creating a desirable balance.

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




