LIFE RAFT FOR NEAR-SPACE VOYAGERS-Pilot of this near-space craft watches body of his ship begin the long, incinerating fall toward earth as he drifts free in the control portion of the vehicle. Drag of the parachute will become effective as the almost nonexistent atmosphere thickens on the long fall toward earth. It will slow him sufficiently to allow him to survive re-entry into the sea of air which is our atmosphere. Main fuselage of the craft will flame across the sky as friction at supersonic speed destroys it. The sketch, above, is one artist's conception of how man will return to earth after first reaching into space toward the stars. This possible solution was offered by A. M.
