The Gospel of Christ

Keys To Bible Understanding

Proper Division of the New Testament Our previous lesson on this subject showed that the events of Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John took place during the Mosaical dispensation which did not end until the death of Christ. During his lifetime Christ commanded the Jews o keep the law of Moses (Matt. 23:2-3), and sent his appoint

tles only to the Jews (Matt. 10:5-7; 15:24); but after his death and the death of the law of Moses, Christ commanded the apostles to preach his will (the gospel) to all Christ came teaching the law of Moses and explaining

its true and original meaning before it was corrupted by the Pharisees' and other men's commands and interpreta-tions (Matt. 15:3-9, 11, 13). Christ lived up to the law of Moses perfectly and fulfilled its righteous purposes. He completed it upon the cross (Matt. 5:17-18; Col. 2:14).

Besides teaching and explaining the law of Moses and bringing it to an end, Christ had another purpose for com-ing to this earth. He knew the Old Testament kingdom and law would be completed and abolished on the cross; there-fore, he prepared the way for the establishment of his kingdom or church and prepared for the institution of his will, the gospel, the system of faith. He taught principles and commands, such as the Beatitudes, faith, obedience, etc., which were applicable both under the law of Moses and the law of Christ; however the preaching of the gospel, preaching to all people, the observance of the Lord's Supper, baptism for the remission of sins and other such special nmands were reserved for the church age alone. The Great Commission was not given until after Christ's death and the Lord's Supper was not instituted until after the last passover of the law of Moses and on the last night be-fore the cross. Christ's instructions showed that the Lord's Supper was for the church age only (Luke 22:30). John the Baptist had authority to institute a kind of baptism for the special period till the death of Christ and under the law of Moses but it was not valid after the death of

After teaching his apostles much about his will, after instituting the Lord's Supper, and making other preparations for his coming church, Christ died upon the cross. After his resurrection he gave the Great Commission and other instructions to his apostles but told them to wait in Jerusalem a few days until they had received the Holy Spirit (Luke 24:49; Acts 1:4). After they had received the Holy Spirit, then they were to begin carrying out the Great Commission (Acts 1:8).

Christ's will could not go into effect until after he died (Hebrews 9:16-17). The Holy Spirit could not come until Christ had ascended (John 7:39) and the apostles could not carry out the Great Commission until they received the Holy Spirit (Luke 24:49; Acts 1:4).

After preparing his apostles and other disciples and teaching the apostles all they could bear during his personal ministry (John 16:12), Christ ascended into heaven and sent the Holy Spirit into the apostles to bring to their re-membrance all he had already taught them (John 14:26) and to guide them into all the truth (John 14:26; 16:13) The teachings of the apostles and other inspired men from Acts to Revelation in the New Testament are just as much Acts to Revelation in the New Testament are just as much the teachings of Christ as those in the gospels. Christ said that the words the Holy Spirit inspired them to say and write were his (Christ's) words (John 16:12-15). Nearly all of Christ's teachings from Acts on to the close of the New Testament apply to us today where much of Christ's teachings in the four gospels apply to Jews under the law of Moses.

To rightly divide the New Testament it is necessary that we understand that the events of the gospels took place under the law of Moses and that Christ's will was not pro-bated until after his death. The events from Acts 2 on through the close of the New Testament took place during the close of the New Testament took place during the Christian dispensation and the teachings apply to us today. Christ is our authority today. His will went into effect on the day of Pentecost (Acts 2). We are under his law, not the law of Moses. We go to Acts of Apostles, not to the thief on the cross to find the plan of salvation today. In Acts of Apostles we see Christ's Great Commission and plan of salvation put into action by the apostles he inspired.
