

What Must I Do To Be Saved? (No. 4)

As we continue our study of conversions the next eximple is that of Cornelius and those in his house (Acts 10) WHAT DID CORNELIUS AND THOSE WITH HIM DO

TO BE SAVED? The conversion of Cornelius and those in his house might be called the "Gentiles' Pentecost." Those converted on the day of Pentecost, and other examples we have studied thus far in Acts were all Jews. Cornelius was the first entile converted. Before his conversion even the apostle and other leading brethern in the church thought that the gospel was like the laws of Moses and was only for the Jews. It took a vision, a direct revelation from God to con-vince Peter (Ac. 10:9-20). It took the relation of this vision the baptism of the Holy Spirit upon Cornelius and the In his house to convince leading Jewish brethern in the church (11:1-18). That was one of the special purposes and aspects of the conversion of Cornelius and those with him to prove that Gentiles were to hear and obey the gospel and

Peter used the keys of the kingdom to give the plan of salvation to the Gentiles in Cornelius' home like he used them on the day of Pentecost for the Jews. Gentiles were baptized with the Holy Spirit in Cornelius' house like the Jews (the apostles) were on the day of Pentecost. See Ac.

The New Testament hadn't been written then; Gendidn't have the gospel preached to them heretofore; therefore Cornelius had no available way to find the plan of salvation he was seeking for. Peter or others would not have preached to him without a direct revelation from God just like Ananias would not have preached to Saul without a vision from God. In those days of miracles and before the New Testament was finished, God used a miracle to get the preacher (Peter) and the audience together in the house of Cornelius just as in the case of Saul and also the Ethio pian nobleman. In the above mentioned respects the con version of Cornelius is pecular to other examples of conversion and different from conversions today, but so far as what Cornelius or those in his house did to be saved this ase is no different from any other since Pentecost.

GOOD MORALS NOT ENOUGH

It would be hard to find a better man morally than Cornelius before his conversion. He was "a devout man, and one that feared God with his house, which gave much alms to the people, and prayed to God always" (V.2). He was just and had an excellent reputation (V. 22). He was very interested in the salvation of others (V.24). He was openminded and unprejudiced (V. 33).

me today think they can leave undone the commands of God (baptism and church attendance for examples), live an honest, clean, good moral life and go to heaven. Such mistaken souls should profit from the conversion of Cornelius. In spite of all his goodness he was lost until he obeyed Christ's commands (V. 6, 48; 11:14).

CORNELIUS NOT SAVED BY A VISION


To answer the prayer of Cornelius seeking the way of salvation, to convince the Jews he had accepted the Gentiles, and to get the preacher and the people together dur-ing that age of miracles God chose to send a vision to both Peter and Cornelius. In that vision God did not tell Cornelius he was saved; neither did he tell him the plan of salvation. Cornelius was unsaved then (11:14), yet Cornelius' vision would be accepted as an "experience of grace" and as proof of conversion in many churches today

CORNELIUS NOT SAVED BY HOLY SPIRIT BAPTISM Cornelius and those assembled in his house were bap-tized with the Holy Spirit for a special purpose as above mentioned. Holy Spirit baptism is for other purposes than salvation. The apostles on Pentecost received it after they were saved and Cornelius received it before he was saved. After his Holy Spirit baptism Cornelius was baptized in water. Water baptism is for the remission of sins (Acts 8:36-38; 2:38; 22:16); therefore Cornelius was baptized with the Holy Spirit before his sins were forgiven, before he was saved.

AND WERE BAPTIZED The peculiar incidents surrounding the conversion of Cornelius and their purposes have been explained but so far as what Cornelius and those in his house did to be saved, it was no different from any other case since Penetoost. They HEARD THE GOSPEL (10:34-40). They were told to truly BELIEVE (10:43) (saving faith is always obedient Jas. 2:24, Heb. 11, etc. and results in baptism for the remission of sins, Ac. 2:38;22:16), to REPENT (11:18) and to BE APTIZED (10:48). In short, Peter said to TRUST and DEEY (10:35).



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
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Cover Crop Will Save Land Waste If Planted Soon Unless climactic conditions

turn very favorable this fall winter and next spring, we are again faced with a serious wind erosion threat, according to C. C. Wiedenfeld of the Soil Conservation Service. A large part of land in the Runnels Soil Conservation District has had a crop failure this growing season. It is going into the wind erosion season with little or no cover for protection. The landowners should now attempt to get a winter cover crop established.

Winter peas or small grain have the best opportunity to furnish cover when they are planted now. Many times this means dry planting at the end of August or the first two weeks of September. The cost of seed and planting is a good risk against the benefits that result from a good growth of

From the past rainfall records, it appears that the odds are in our favor. In the past sixty years, forty-eight years had enough rain in September to give a cover crop a good start. Twelve years were too dry to get fall growth, but some of these would have grown a little cover in the early spring.

Kirby Robinson says that the benefits in soil protection and soil improvement resulting from one good cover crop of winter peas will pay for four years of planting and seeding.

It is suggested that farmers plant now to get the maximum benefit from the first rain this
