





FARM BUREAU BACKS CLASSING OF COTTON

Efforts of Farm Bureau eaders in Texas to insure accurate classing of cotton by the government now has the wholehearted support of the American Farm Bureau Feder-

Charles B. Shuman, president of the American Farm Bureau Federation, has announced the reactivation of the AFBF cotton committee to give specific study to the establishment of a non-governmental cotton classing review board for the purpose of reviewing controversies over cotton classing.

This action is a direct result of efforts of the Texas Farm Bureau leaders to obtain accurate classing of cotton by the government's Smith-Doxey services. Following a hearing at Waco, the House Agricuture Committee promised that the Congress will act immediately after it convenes in January to get a "light spot" classification for cotton put in the govern-

Shuman also revealed that the AFBF cotton committee would also study the question of whether present grades adequately reflect the value of machine-picked cotton and whether the producer interest is adequately represented on the International cotton grades






