NOTES**

Two elections are scheduled for November with the general election on November 6 expected to attract a record vote. The other election will be held on November 13 when one single amendment will be voted upon by the people of Texas. Absentee voting for the general election started Wednesday and will continue until three days before the election. Absentee voting on the other election will start on October 24 and continue for 20 days. While there are five columns on the general election tickets only the Democrats and Republican parties will receive many votes in this area. Most of the republican votes cast will be split-ballots with some voting for the Eisenhower-Nixon tickets and for the remainder of the democrat nominees. Regardless of how you vote, every person eligible is urged to go to the polls this year. There are also eight constitutional amendments on the ballot November 6 which are important to the people of Texas. Those who have not read the proposed amendments should do so or discuss their merits with someone who has given each one close study.

Ballinger deer hunters have been visiting their leases and making plans for their annual hunt which starts on November 16. Some sections of the deer country has been hit very hard by the dry weather and will offer poor hunting this fall. In fact some local hunters have given up their leases and will seek new territory to look for deer. Part of the Hill Country reports deer in fair condition and as plentiful as in past years. Practically all local people who usually hunt each year will be back on a lease somewhere this fall to try their luck.

The annual membership drive for the Runnels County

The Paint Rock school and members of the Parent-Teacher Association are completing plans for the annual Halloween Carnival to be staged on October 27. Last week each grade in the entire school named their dukes and duchesses who will take part in the main pageant when the king and queen are crowned. The couple getting the largest number of votes will be crowned the night of the carnival.

Wyatt C. Hendrick, architect of Fort Worth, has been hired by the school board at Stephenville to start preliminary plans for a new high school building there. As soon as plans are complete and costs estimated, it is expected that a bond

Farm Bureau is meeting with fine success and workers expect to reach the goal of 525 members before the end of the month. Securing members in the organization has been easier because of the fine accomplishments of the bureau in past years. Most farmers, ranchmen and those who have an interest in agriculture believe that the bureau has meant much to the members and more and more are lining up each year. The legislative program has been well handled and in this county, the local organization has had representation in all district and state meetings.

More people are becoming interested in the salt water problem in this county and are trying to do something about it. A large number of farmers have reported to the county agent and given exact locations of trouble spots and these are being checked as fast as possible. The Texas Railroad Commission, Oil and Gas Division, is cooperating with a dye program in the section east of Halchel in an effort to find where some of the salt water is coming from that is damaging wells, streams and tanks.

Issue will be submitted to the voters of the district. If passed, the building will be constructed. The Parent-Teacher Association at Menard has announced plans for homecoming on November 9 and 10. They are expecting a large crowd and invitations have been mailed to class secretaries back to 1908. The oldest student and oldest teacher attending will be given special honors at the halftime activities of the football game on Friday night. Class meetings have been arranged and a special barbecue lunch will be served at noon Saturday. Ex-students at Menard will stage a homecoming dance on Saturday night. The homecoming queen will also be crowned at the Menard-Eldorado football game.

The Melvin Parent-Teacher Association held a program last week in which teacher legislation was the theme. Floyd Marshall, high school principal, told the members how the passage of amendment No. 4 would attract more young people into the teaching profession and perhaps pave the way for the profession to meet the needs when it hits a high peak about 1960. The provisions of the amendment would make possible one of the best teacher retirement programs in the nation. Committees announced the annual Halloween carnival on October 27.

The Eden High School band has been invited to participate in band day at Austin on October 20. This will be the 21st annual band day sponsored by the University of Texas and all musicians will attend the University-Arkansas football game in the afternoon. Band members and parents are joining with school officials in an effort to line up enough cars for the students to make the trip. In 1955 more than 140 bands attended the one day music festival at Austin.

The city council at Colorado City has named a citizen group

to make a study to determine if the community needs public housing. The committee will seek information in regard to federal housing and also see if the city really needs the additional units. The group also asked that plans be made to eliminate the dust created at local gas. Members of the council made it plain that they were not suggesting public housing and the present plan was just to make a study so the committee would be in position to speak later.

The Senior Citizens of Texas met in Comanche last Saturday for the annual state convention. For many years Comanche County has maintained a very active Senior Citizens Club and this year was host to the state meeting. Sessions were held at the Veterans Hall and a large crowd from all parts of the state was on hand for the opening program Saturday morning. O. C. Waters of De Leon was program chairman and presented outstanding speakers from all over Texas during the day.

Information concerning Coleman's new national guard armory is expected within the next 30 days. The project has been approved and funds appropriated but no announcement has been made in regard to when construction will be

started. Latest information was to the fact that the cost of the Coleman armory had been increased from \$70,000 to \$107,000 and an indoor rifle range included in the building. The city some time ago set up ten acres of land as a site and an armory board visited Coleman and approved the location. The Miles Parent-Teacher Association has announced a Mexican supper and variety show to be staged on the evening of October 27. The supper will be held at the school lunch room and Mrs. L. E. Lacy has been named chairman for this part of the activities. Serving will start at 5:30 p. m. with charges of 85 cents for adults and 50 cents for children. The variety show will be held in the school auditorium and will present a large number of good acts.

Members of the Parent-Teacher Association at Bronte have made plans for the annual carnival to be held October 27. Announcement has been made that the show this year will feature a parade, talent show, cold drink stands, grab bag, cake auction, and numerous other entertaining features. 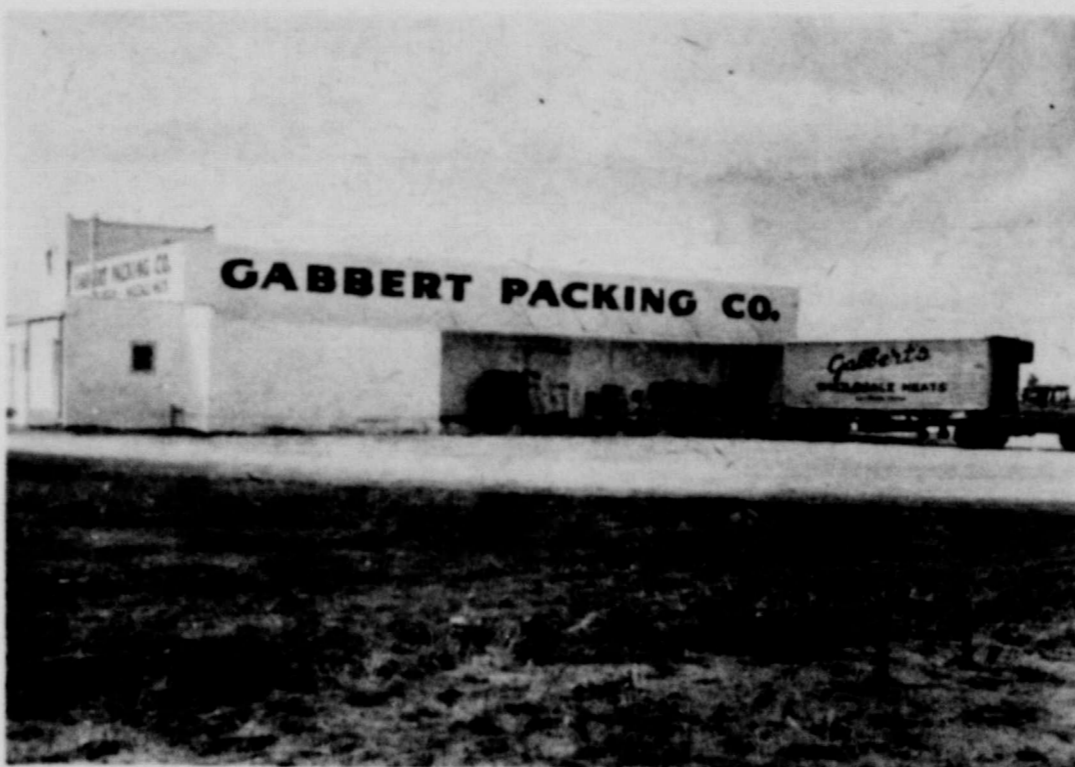

The tea table was laid with a floor-length blue net cloth

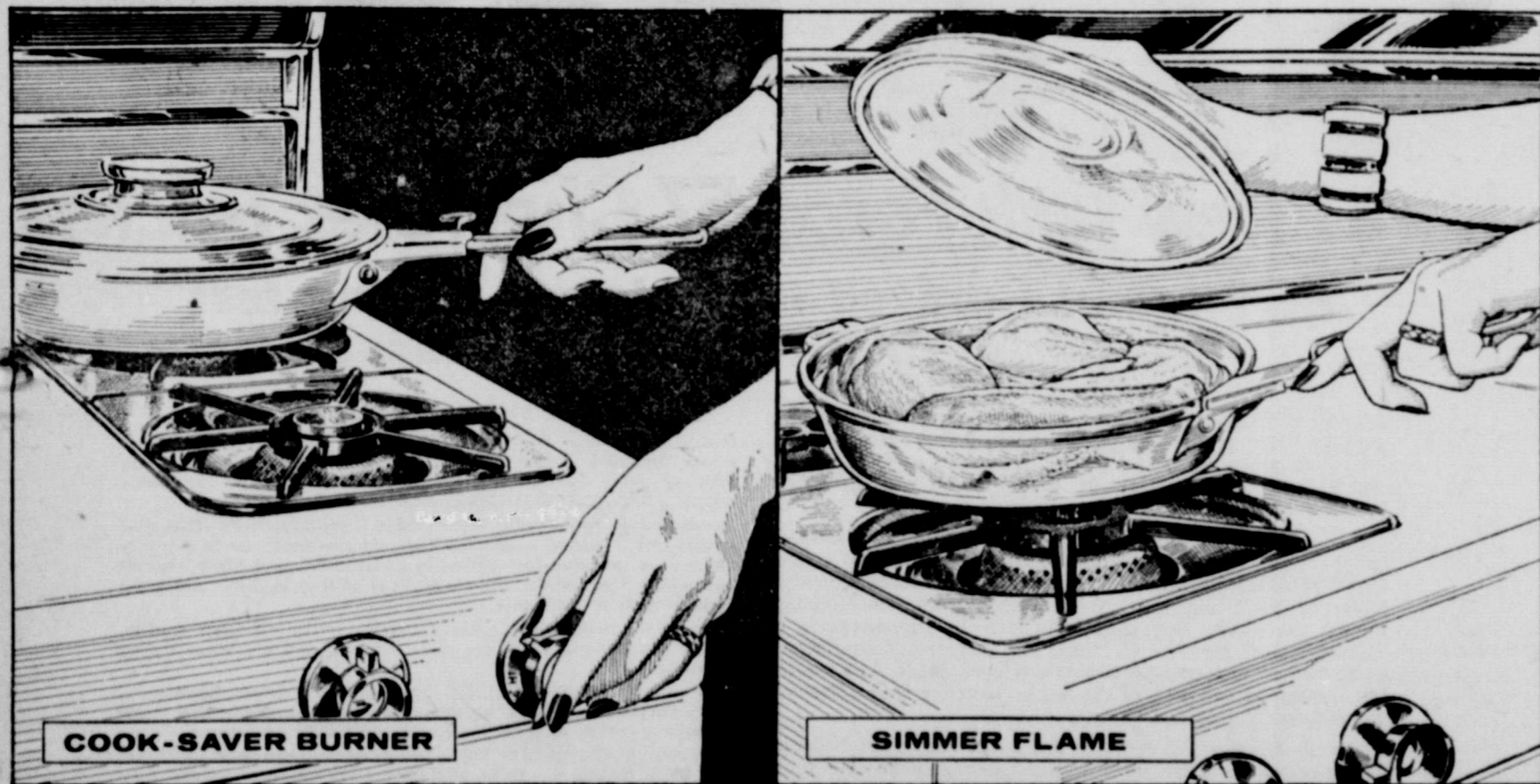

mother and was the national costume worn to church and on holidays.

In relating her exciting life in Norway, she described the country as a "Fairyland" covered with snow for six months of the year. The main entertainment for young people was mountain climbing in the summer and skating and skiing in the winter. She spoke of learning to ski when she was three years old. When the Norwegians are unable to get out of their homes, they do anything and everything.

Mrs. Griggs discussed the strong educational system in

Norway and said that there was no illiteracy there. At the completion of junior high school, students enter high school to prepare for entrance to the university or for trade schools. Students are required six years of English, three years of French, and six years of German. Classes are held six days a week and begin at 9 a. m. and over at 2 p. m.

She told of her work with the French Underground during World War II, and her work with the American Red Cross in France. She also discussed the political activities in Norway, and said that the young people there are interested in political affairs and take an active part in campaigning but are not permitted to vote until 21 years of age.

Mrs. Griggs also discussed the Olympic games in Norway, also the livelihood of the people, and the religion, which is Lutheran.

Mrs. Griggs was born and reared in Norway and received her education at the university at Oslo as a medical student. She came to America with her husband. They reside at Sweetwater where he is in business. She is a district member of the Garden Clubs.

Mrs. Griggs is an outstanding speaker and has speaking engagements filled until January 1.
