If all of the banks in the sun-scorched areas of the West and Southwest were asked by President Eisenhower to make a fifty percent reduction in interest rates on their loans to farmers and ranchers, it would

be considered most unusual, Or, if all of the merchants of the area were asked to make a fifty percent reduction in the prices of one or more of their basic items, as an aid to the farmers and ranchers, that, also, would be considered most unusual.

Either of these requests by the President of the United States would make front page news, stimulate editorial comment, and create extensive public

Cattle have been shipped from the drought areas to grazing lands in other sections, on the basis of existing freight rates . . , but the railroads have moved the

cattle back to the home ranches FREE OF CHARGE, Of the several forms of transportation, ONLY the railroads have extended the distressed farmers and ranchers a financial helping hand, in the form of reduced rates on hay or other feedstuffs and on the free movement of cattle back home,







## The Bible Teaches:

NO. 31 IN A SERIES. SAVE EACH ONE. YOUR QUESTIONS AND COMMENTS INVITED. WILL FAITH ALONE SAVE?

The Great Commission and the examples of conversion in Acts prove that HEAR. BELIEVE, REPENT, CONFESS, and BE BAPTIZED FOR THE REMISSION OF SINS are the necessary steps for man to take to enter into the family of God and become eligible for salvation, the free gift of God.

### WILL FAITH ALONE SAVE?

Hearing is almost self-explanatory and was briefly explained in our last lesson. We begin now to explain SAVING FAITH. First we will see what it is not and then we can better understand what it is. The reason we specify SAVING faith is that there is a kind of faith that will not save. That is dead faith, faith alone, a faith without works.

### SOME JEWISH RULERS HAD FAITH ALONE

John 12:42 tells of some Jews who "believed on him." If read the rest of the verse and verse 43 and you will see that they hid their faith, wouldn't confess Christ, feared the Pharisees more than God, and loved men's praises more than God's favor. Could such reprobates be saved as long as their hearts remained in such a state? If faith alone saves, they were already saved.

### DEVIL TO SPEND ETERNITY IN HEAVEN IF FAITH ALONE WILL SAVE

Not only will those hardened Jewish rulers of John 12:42 be in heaven if faith alone will save but also Satan and his angels will be there. James 2:19 says "... the devils also believe and tremble." By the doctrine of salvation by faith only, the devil and his angels are bound to be in heaven because inspiration says they believe.

### MARTIN LUTHER CONTRADICTS CHRIST

John 8 gives another Bible example of unsaved believers. Then said Jesus to those Jews WHICH BELIEVED ON HIM . . ." (v. 31). Were these people saved? By Martin Luther's doctrine of salvation by faith only the answer would have to be YES because the Bible plainly says they believed. But notice the kind of people they were: "Ye seek to kill me, because my word hath no place in you." (v. 37) . . . . "Ye seek to kill me . ." (v. 40) . . "Ye are of your father the devil . ." (v. 44) . . " "Ye are not of God" (v. 47). Christ said these people who had faith but not works, faith alone. He said they were children of the devil. Luther's doctrine would make them children of God. Which will you would make them children of God. Which will you

PETER SHOWS PLAINLY THAT SALVATION IS NOT BY FAITH ONLY OR NOT AT THE POINT OF FAITH BEFORE

In Acts 2, sinners were told first to BELIEVE know assuredly that Jesus Lord and Christ." (2 As a result of hearing this and other parts of the gospel preached by Peter "they were pricked in their heart, and said unto Peter and to the rest of the apostles, Men and brethren, what shall we do?" (v. 37).

Notice the chronological Bible order: First they heard the gospel (verses 14 and on including the command to believe v. 36). Faith was produced because it says "they were pricked in their heart" and it says they asked what to do to be saved. This shows they did believe.

Notice that AFTER they were told to believe and AFTER they did believe they asked what to do to be saved. Peter must not have been a "faith only" preacher because in answer to these people who ALREADY BELIEVED he didn't say "I have just told you to believe. That is all you must do" He didn't say "You believe so you are already saved."
In answer to these people who had faith and wanted to know what to do to be saved. Peter said "Repent and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins, and ye shall receive the Holy Ghost." (v. 38) and " save yourselves " (v. 40).

The result was: "Then they that gladly received his word were baptized: and there were added unto them a bout three thousand souls." (v. 41) ... And the Lord added to the church daily such as could be saved." (v. 47).

See the chronological order? 1. They heard the gospel. 2. They were told to beffeve. 3. Faith was produced. 4. They then asked what to do to be saved. 5. Peter told them to repent and be baptized for the remission of sins and to thereby save themselves. 6. That they did so they were saved and in so doing the Lord added them to his church. "FAITH ONLY" WILL NOT STAND THE BIBLE TEST

It is a poor doctrine that can't stand investigation and can't stand a Bible trial. If salvation is at the point of faith without further acts of obedience why weren't the Jewish rulers of John 12 saved? Why did Christ say those believers of John 8 were children of the devil? Why did those sinners of Acts 2 who believed ask what to do to be saved? Since they already had been told to believe and already believed why didn't Peter tell them they were saved? The answer: "Ye see then how that by works a man is justified, and not by faith only." (Jas. 2:24).
