WILL FAITH ALONE SAVE? (NO. 4)

Past lessons have shown that we are not saved by faith only (Jas. 2:24) and that James and Paul do not

contradict each other on the subject of faith. In the last on we began a discussion of whether or not their writings contradict on the subject of works. We saw that there

is no contradiction between James' statement that we are saved by works (2:24) and Paul's statement that we are saved by faith without the deeds of the law (Rom. 3:28; Gal.

2:16, etc.) because James speaks of works under the will of Christ and Paul speaks of works of the law (of Moses, the O. T. law now abolished Col. 2:14; Heb. 10:9-10). But how

about Eph. 2:8-9 spoken to Gentiles who had never been under the law of Moses (v.11-13)? They, seemingly, were not trying to be justified by the works of the law of Moses.

not trying to be justified by the works of the law of Moses. To them Paul said, "For by grace are ye saved through faith; and that not of yourselves: it is the gift of God: Not of works, lest any man should boast." Does this contradict James 2:24? Certainly not. We know there are no contradictions in the Bible. Paul's outstanding point in Eph. 2:8-9 is that by God's grace we are saved and not by man, or by man's works of merit or goodness. He is showing that salvation is the free gift of God (see also 2 Cor. 9:15; Rom. 3:24; 6:23; 1 Jn. 5:11, etc.) and that man can't merit it, or by works boast that he is good enough to be saved. Paul stresses God's part, grace (unmerited favor) in Eph. 2:8.

stresses God's part, grace (unmerited favor) in Eph. 2:8.

Jan es stresses man's part, works in James 2:24. Paul does hot gelittle works because in the next verse he says "we are . . created . . unto GOOD WORKS which God hath before ordained that we should walk in them" (works). In Rom. 1:5; 16:26; 1 Cor. 15:58; 2 Thess. 1:8-9; Gal. 5:6; Heb. 5:9 and many other places Paul stresses the need of works.

From one standpoint you might say that Paul says we can't be saved by works alone and James says we can't be saved

e saved by works alone and James says we can't be saved

Paul's point on works is important. None should get the idea that we can, by our works, merit or earn salvation. No man can boast that his works are good enough to purchase for him salvation. Salvation is by God's grace. It is free. No man can earn it, pay for it, buy it, or merit it with his works. It is "by grace... the gift of God" (Eph. 2:8).

Since salvation is free, the gift of God, and no man can beast that by his works he merits it, how then could James say that we are saved by works (Jas. 2:24)? Did Paul contradict himself when he said "... as ye have always OBEYED ... WORK OUT YOUR OWN SALVATION with fear and trembling" (Phil. 2:12)? ANSWER: Salvation is the free gift of God but man must work, obey God's will, to be come ELIGIBLE for the gift. By his works man doesn't merit it becomes eligible for it.

Often we read of last wills of men freely bestowing essessions upon relatives or others but providing in the fills certain requirements which must be met before the eneficiaries are eligible for the gifts. Just so Christ has tade a last will and testament. He died for all and freely rovided salvation for all, but in that will he gave some quirements (including works) which all must meet before they are eligible for the inheritance.

Paul in Eph. 2:8-9 was showing that the gift of salva-n is by God's grace and not man's works of merit. Paul Phil. 2:12 (also 1 Cor. 15:58; Rom. 1:5; Gal. 5:6-7; 2 less. 1:8-9; Heb. 5:9, etc.) is not contradicting what he d in Eph. 2:8-9. He is simply stressing the fact that man ast work to become eligible for salvation, the free gift of

When James said we are saved by works he did not say works alone. He did not exclude grace. He did not teach t we merit salvation by our works. He showed the essity of works, that we are saved by them in that by m we become eligible for the gift of salvation.

Thus we have seen that Paul and James do not contra-teach other or themselves and that salvation is not by th alone. We have seen that man can't merit salvation that he must work to become eligible for it.






