These Ephesians, then, who heard the gospel, believed it, and were baptized, Paul calls an example of salvation by grace, through faith, and not of works. The church of Christ teaches this same gospel plan of salvation today. The Ephesians did not merit salvation by their works (2:9) or obedience, but they believed and were baptized to be-

Eph. 2:8 shows that their salvation was by grace and faith. Eph. 1:13 and Ac. 19:1-5 shows that it was by works also (not to merit salvation but to become eligible for it). Grace was God's part and Christ's part (Eph. 1:2). They were taught by Paul inspired of the Holy Spirit (Ac. 19:1-5) and they received the gift of the Holy Spirit (Eph. 1:13).

So they were saved by grace on the part of God, Christ,

and the Holy Spirit, They were saved by faith (Eph. 2:8) and works (Eph. 1:-3; Ac. 19:1-5), man's part.

Paul himself told what kind of faith avails anything: "faith which WORKETH by love" Gal. 5:6. The Ephesians were not saved by grace alone, or by faith alone, but by

end of a rope. The man slips into the life preserver and swims to the boat with the help of the son pulling on the

rope. Was the man saved by grace, faith, or works? None only, but all three together. He was saved by the goodness or grace of the father and son, by his faith in them (based

or grace of the father and son, by his faith in them (based on their action) pulling him to safety and into the ship, and by his works in getting into the preserver and helping get himself to the ship. Would grace alone have saved? No, he had to accept the offer of safety by laying hold on the preserver. Would faith alone save him? No, his faith in them would not avail until he worked to take hold of the preserver. He could not just say "I believe you will save me" and still flounder in the sea. He by faith had to work, take hold of the preserver. Was he saved by works alone? No, a life preserver was beyond his own power just then and he could not save himself alone. The man was a stranger so did not merit salvation from this father and son. He saved himself, not by merit, but by working to accept their grace. He could not accept the grace unless he worked. Just so God, by his grace, sent his son to save us. We believe in them and work to accept, or become eligible for the gift of salvation.
