

The Bible Teaches:

WHAT IS SAVING FAITH?

Past lessons have shown that salvation is neither by faith alone nor grace alone. Spurgeon wrote "salvation is

ALL GRACE, which means, free gratis, for nothing ... Alas! I Can Do Nothing" (All Of Grace, pp. 5, 64). Some claim that God sends faith miraculously, independently of the Bible. Some teach that God has predestinated certain individuals to be saved and that all others will be lost, regard-

less of what they believe or do. If such human doctrines (Matt. 15:9) were true then salvation would be all on God's part, none on man's, and God alone will be to blame for any and all that are lost. If God does it all and man can do nothing then such statements in the Bible as "God is no

respector of persons" (Ac. 10:34) and "The Lord . . . not willing that ANY should perish, but that ALL should come to repentance" (2 Pc. 3:9) are false.

The truth is "whosoever will, let him take the water of life freely" (Rev. 22:17). It is God's will that ALL be saved (2 Pe. 3:9); to that end he gave his son (Jn. 3:16). God, however, has given man the power of choice and will not force obedience, salvation, and heaven upon any who choose to disobey God's word and go to hell (2 Thess. 1:7-9).

The Bible plainly teaches that salvation is by grace (unmerited favor). Were it not for God's love and good-ness none could be saved. Yes, salvation is by grace but not

by grace only. Grace is God's part. Faith and works consti-tute man's part. In these lessons we stress man's part. God has abundantly taken care of his part. Man's part is the part which is lacking; therefore we stress man's part, obedient faith.

God's part and man's part in salvation could be illustrated in some respects by the way we get temporal food and other necessities of life. Christians are taught to pray for their daily bread (Matt. 6:11) yet no one expects God to send it miraculously. Man is to work for his food (Gen. 3:19) and those who are too lazy to do their part Paul says "... if any would not work, neither should be eat" (2 Thess.

3:10). God will do his part if we will do ours in any realm.

By God's grace, provision has been made and will be made for daily bread but the person who expects God to do it all, "neither should be eat." The same is true in the realm

healing and salvation. Christians are to pray for the sick, but man is to do his part as well and use medical means at his disposal. It would be no more absurd to pray for daily bread and do nothing than to pray for healing and do

Just as it is foolish and futile to ask God to do it all in

getting daily bread or healing, so it is to expect God to do it all in salvation. Just as the lazy person will not eat and will not be healed (by God's direct help, only in some cases by nature's normal recuperative powers) he will not be

If the lazy beggars (able to work) will work they can eat. If the sick will use medicine as needed they will recover in most cases. Just so, if those on the mourner's bench, and others expecting God to do it all, will do their part they will be saved in every case. What more do they expect God to do? He has given his son and provided the way, etc., etc. His will says to BELIEVE, REPENT, and be BAPTIZED for the remission of sins (Acts 2:36-38). If those believers who pray for long periods of time for salvation would repent and be baptized (Ac. 2:38) their sins would be washed away (Ac. 22:16; 1 Jn. 1:7; Rom. 6:3-4). You don't have to beg God to save you. He is already willing and has done his part. Do your part (faith and works). Don't expect him to do it all. "Work out your own salvation . . ." (Phil. 2:12).

Grace alone or faith alone will not avail in daily food or healing and neither will they avail in salvation. No Bible example of salvation by grace only or by faith only can be found this side of the day of Pentecost when Christ's will went into effect. Much Bible teaching can be given to show that salvation is by grace and faith but no scripture can be given that teaches that we can be saved by either grace only or faith only.



The "what" kind of grass when to reseed and how to reseed grasses are questions that are on the minds of a lot of people who have placed some of their land in the conservation reserve part of the Soil Bank program, reports H. Gieseche Jr., secretary of the board of supervisors of the Runnels Soil Conservation District
