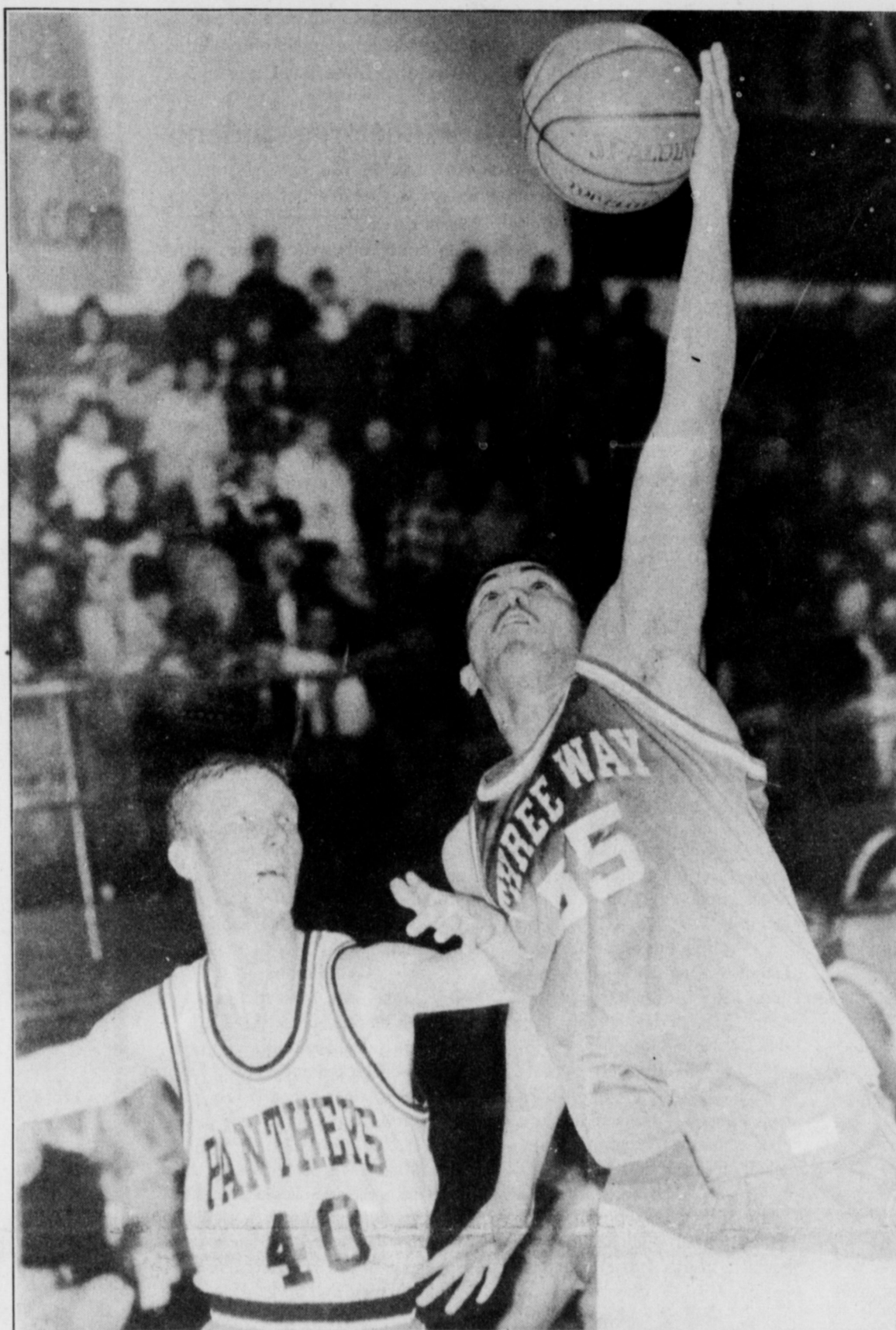

## Reynolds' last-second shot lifts Whitharral past Eagles

WHITEFACE — B.J. Reynolds has a history of beating Three Way in the final seconds.

Reynolds added another chapter Thursday by hitting an eight-foot shot with 10 seconds left to lift Whitharral past Three Way 48-46 in a District 13-1A playoff game held to determine seeding.

Two days earlier, the Eagles beat Whitharral 57-48 at home to force a playoff after the teams ended the regular season tied for first.

"Every game's been like this," Whitharral coach Caleb McClure said. "Obviously the advantage of winning is you get to play a

second-place team in bi-district. But it's just a big win for our program."

Two weeks ago, Reynolds hit two free throws with eight seconds left to give Whitharral a 45-44 win over the Eagles.

Three Way (13-13 overall) will face the winner of a District 14-1A playoff game between co-champions O'Donnell and Aspermont in the bi-district round.

Whitharral (12-13) will face the loser.

After trailing by as many as seven points early in the second half, Three Way regained the lead 36-35 two minutes into the fourth quarter on a three-point play by Alberto Valderas. The junior guard coaxed in an

## MAHD chief outlines plans for new home

Muleshoe Area Hospital District administrator Jim Bone Thursday spoke at length about the proposed nursing home facility at the Second Thursday Soup & Sandwich Luncheon held at the 16th & D Church of Christ.

Bone, administrator for the past two and a half years, also briefly discussed some of the history of the district and its outpatient clinic.

During the 30-minute presentation, Bone informed the audience that the district purchased the property, buildings and equipment in June of 1997.

According to Bone, the district is now ready to expand its facilities by adding a new nursing home. An architect was chosen in January and met with a 10-member task force on Feb. 10 to discuss plans and concepts for the new facility. The old airport and a spot on the south side of the new city park are sites under consideration.

Bone said the district had contracted with the Texas Tech University College of Architecture to develop options utilizing the existing site. Two reasons this option was not feasible were the lack of land for future expansion and the lack of parking.

In contrast to the 54 beds the present facility

## Attorney General serves warrants on 'deadbeat parents'

A Muleshoe man was included in a "deadbeat parent" roundup announced Tuesday by Texas Attorney General John Cornyn.

The roundup was coordinated in Lubbock County and targeted parents who are in violation of court ordered child support.

From Tuesday through Friday, the Lubbock County sheriff's office assigned five teams of deputies to go to the homes and businesses of deadbeat parents. Officers also worked with other county sheriffs' departments and constables to arrest parents with delinquent child support accounts in Lubbock County.

Ken Mull of the Lubbock County sheriff's office said Thursday they have cleared 24 warrants of the 128 that were in effect when the roundup began Tuesday.

"We are trying our best to locate these people and help the children," said Mull. One of the biggest problems they come across is uncooperative relatives. "The relative knows where the person is but will not tell us," according to Mull.

287th District Attorney Johnny Actkinson said

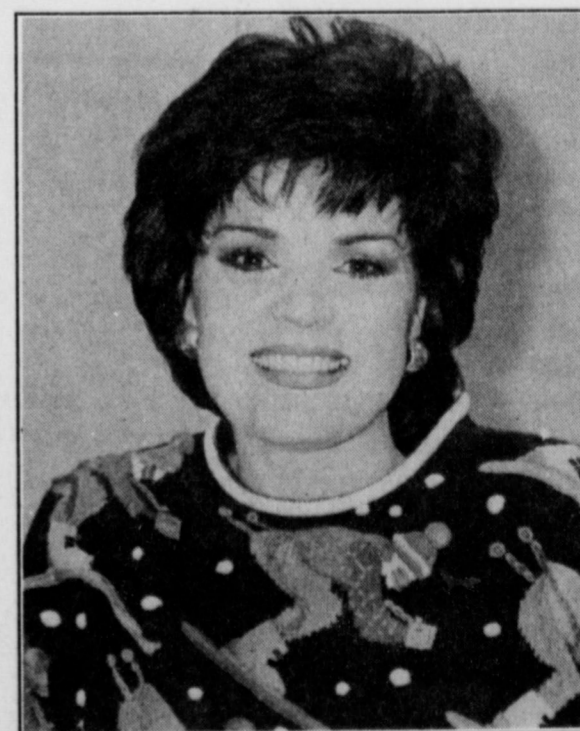
The Chamber is a non-profit organization whose funding comes from its members and fund raising events. Most of this money is used to promote the Chamber through advertis-

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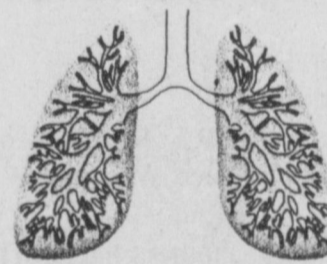


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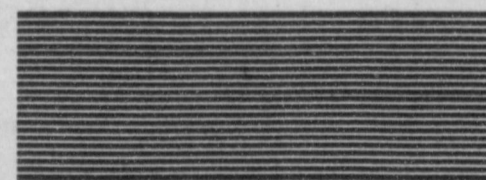

improbable over-the-head bank shot after getting fouled in the lane.

Gerald Perez, who led Three Way with 21 points and seven rebounds, tied the game at 44 on a feed from Daniel Reeves.

With the game tied at 46, Reynolds got loose along the baseline for the game-winner.

Three Way had a chance to send the game into overtime after Reynold's shot when Jonathan Kindle was fouled with 14 seconds left.

But the senior forward's first throw spun out and the

Eagles couldn't come up with the rebound after he intentionally missed the second.

"I really thought we'd have the advantage after we tied the game," Three Way coach Shawn Harrison said, pointing out that Three Way has won several games in the fourth quarter this season.

Thursday's game was a matchup of contrasting styles, with the smaller Panthers preferring an uptempo pace while Three Way wanted to keep it a half-court contest.

Using man-to-man fullcourt pressure and running at every

opportunity, Whitharral gained control of the tempo and the game in the second quarter.

Whitharral forced 14 Three Way first-half turnovers and 24 for the game.

"That was our game plan, to pressure and make them do things they didn't want to do," McClure said. "Even though there wasn't a lot of points scored, it was a fast-paced game."

Harrison just shrugged his shoulders when asked why Three Way couldn't turn the game back to their favor.

"We just couldn't handle the

pressure," Harrison said.

After falling behind by as many as five points in the first quarter, Whitharral surged back to grab a 15-14 lead on Reynolds' free throw line jumper. The Panthers stretched their lead to 25-18 on a Joe Burns 3-pointer before settling on a 25-20 halftime lead.

Burns led the Panthers with 17 points. Slippery Daniel Rodriguez added 13 points and Reynolds finished with 10.

has, the new nursing home will have between 80 and 90 beds with some used for special care. Bone added that the district might have some assisted living facilities in the new home and space for patients needing care from Alzheimers disease.

When asked about a timeline for the new home, Bone said, "I suspect we will have a site chosen within the month." The district will decide on financing for the project before taking bids around the beginning of August, he said. The projected opening of the facility is August of 2000.

Another area Bone spoke about was the outpatient clinic. "We are very proud of this facility," he said.

The clinic takes care of many Title IV patients and has increased normal and high-risk deliveries at the center. Bone said the district hopes to have a nurse practitioner working full-time at the clinic sometime in June or July.

"Almost 99.9 percent of child support cases are handled as civil matters." He said the DA prosecutes only those cases that need to be handled in the criminal system. "I don't recall any cases in my office over the past 4 or 5 years," said Atkinson.

Parents having difficulty collecting support payments can contact the Attorney General's office. They have

several avenues for collecting child support payments from the non-custodial parent. These include employer wage withholding, intercepting federal income tax refund checks, lottery winnings, or other money due from state or federal sources, filing liens against his or her property or other assets, having driver's, professional, or recreational licenses suspended, or filing a lawsuit against the non-custodial par-

ent asking the court to enforce its order or the judge may sentence the non-paying parent to jail and enter a judgement for past due child support.

# Lady Mules stun Friona

■ Gartin's 15-footer earns Muleshoe 2nd spot in 2-3A

FRIONA — Britni Gartin and Muleshoe had a dream end to the regular season.

Gartin sank a 15-foot jump shot at the buzzer Tuesday as the Lady Mules stunned Friona 40-39 and clinched second place in District 2-3A.

The freshman reserve told Muleshoe coach Jim Gruhlkey that the night before the game she had dreamed about making the game-winning shot.

"It's a good way to end the season," Gruhlkey said. "Winning a game like that can give you confidence going into the playoffs."

"The kids did a good job at the end. They didn't panic."

The come-from-behind win gave Muleshoe (13-16 overall, 8-2 in district) a season sweep of the Squaws. A Friona win would have forced a playoff between the teams for district seeding.

Muleshoe and Friona (19-9, 6-4) had already clinched playoff berths heading into the game. The Lady Mules' last playoff appearance was in 1994.

"It was a big win for a lot of reasons," Gruhlkey said. "It gives us some momentum. We

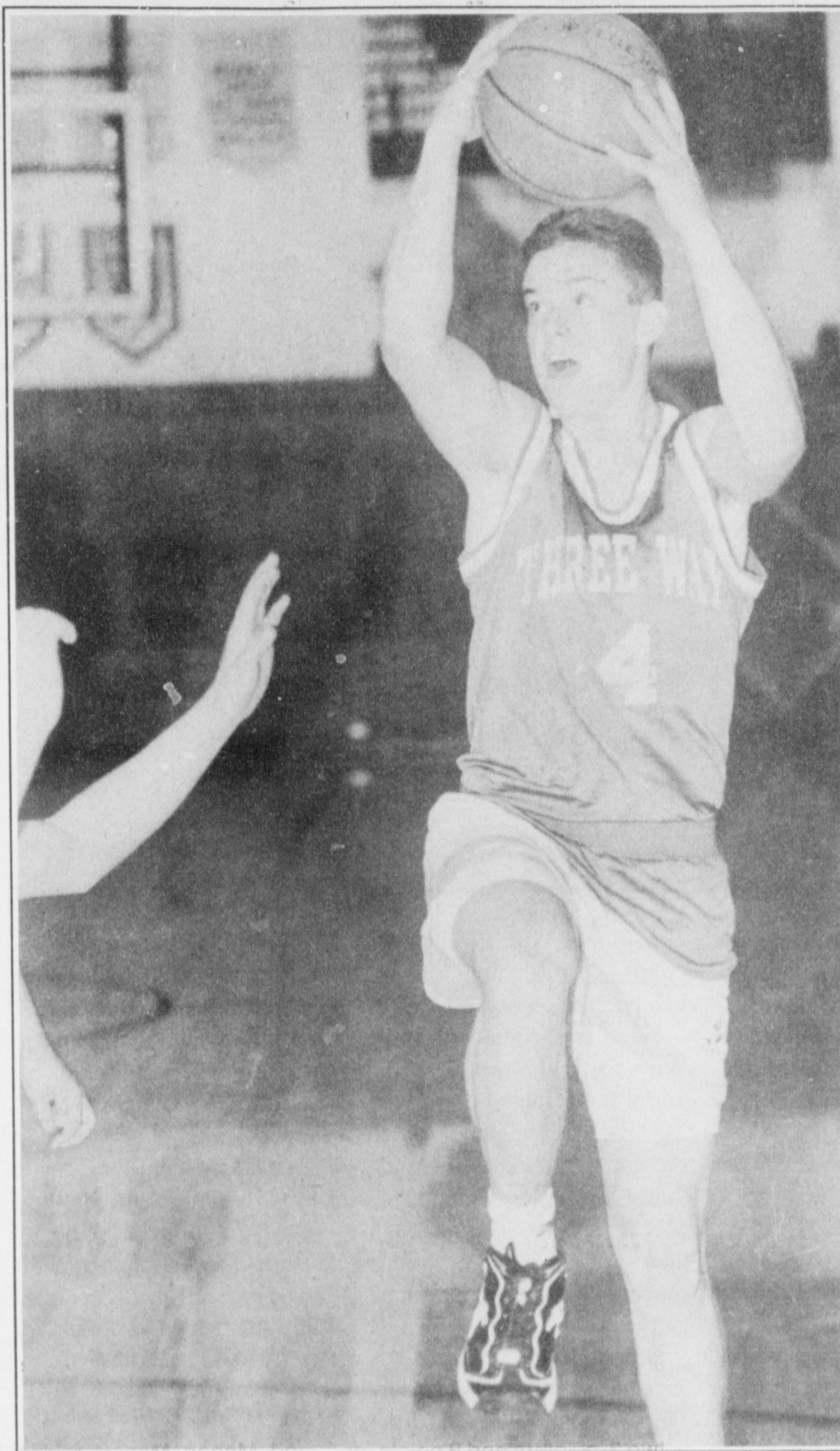

One game after clinching its first district title since 1957, the Mules dominated rival Friona 64-42 Tuesday, in the process giving fifth-year coach Ralph Mason his 200th career win.

Senior post Dustin Cleavinger collected 16 points and nine rebounds as Muleshoe (21-7 overall) improved to 9-0 in District 2-3A with one game left in the regular season.

Mason said it's important that Muleshoe keeps its momentum heading into the playoffs.

Dalhart, Tulia and Sanford-Fritch finished tied for third in 1-3A and were involved in a playoff this weekend.

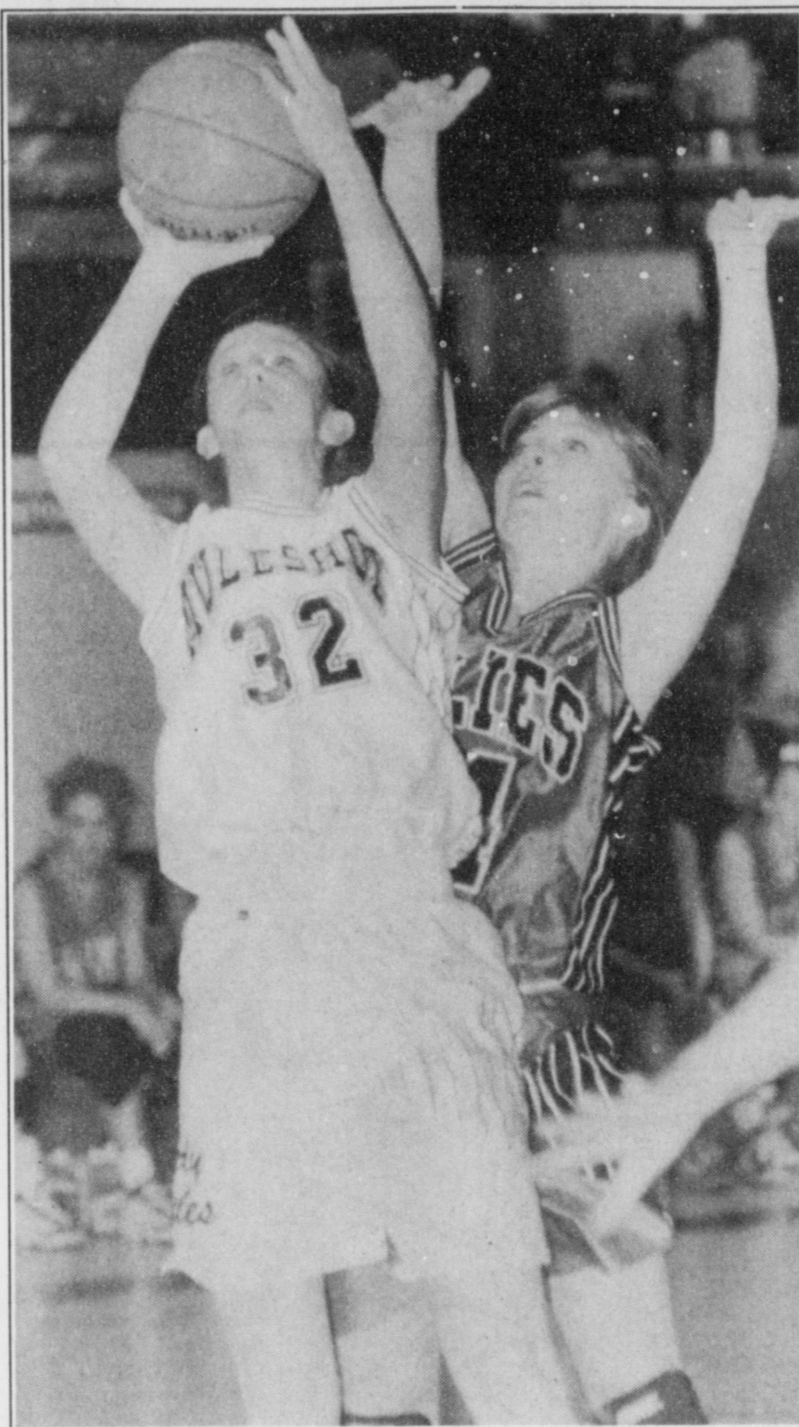
The Lazbuddie boys and girls finished tied for first in District 11-1A with their Happy counterparts.

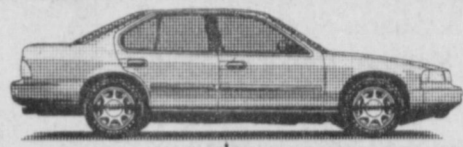

**Literature & Life: The Givens Collection**

For Frederick Douglass, reading and writing were the keys to freedom. A world-famous abolitionist, writer, and orator, Douglass began his quest when he was a slave child listening to his master's wife read the Bible aloud. The crucial role that literacy has played in the development of African-American culture over the last two centuries is the heart of **Literature & Life: The Givens Collection**.

This half-hour special uses the Givens Collection of African American Literature, a prestigious collection of books and manuscripts housed at the University of Minnesota in Minneapolis, as a starting point. The Givens Collection includes more than 6,000 items — books, manuscripts, pamphlets, letters, and ephemera — by and about African Americans, including an original first edition of the first book published by an African American, Phyllis Wheatley's *Poems* (1773).

**Tuskegee, Alabama: Living Black & White**

In the 1950s, Tuskegee was a symbol of gradual black assimilation into mainstream culture through educational and economic progress. **Tuskegee, Alabama: Living Black & White** focuses on the underlying tensions and class divisions of the white and black population of that area after World War II. During that period, Tuskegee played a pivotal, national role in issues of voting rights and school desegregation, and produced a number of key historic figures in the civil rights movement.

A community where in the 1940s, 80 percent of the population was African American, Tuskegee had a strong black middle class — with considerable economic power — who provided the foundation for enlightenment and education. **Tuskegee, Alabama: Living Black & White** shows that even under these favorable circumstances, the struggle for civil rights in this part of the South was slow and painful.

In 1963 federal judge Frank Johnson ordered integration in the public schools. Though local officials accepted the order, Governor George Wallace sent in state troopers to close the schools. This situation, and others like it in Birmingham, Mobile, and Huntsville, was resolved only when the federalized National Guard was brought in.

If Mom was alive, were I a senator right now being asked to vote truthfully regarding whether or not the president was truthful in his testimony, I'd need to be very careful. I'd hate to be the first senator in history to be soundly spanked on the Senate floor.

I know that our president's folks are no longer living, but I find myself wondering about his closest advisors, attorneys, and friends. Are they all orphans? If not, their mamas and daddies must have been very tolerant people.

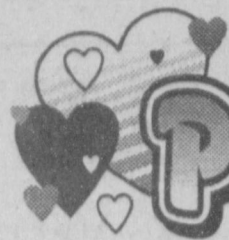
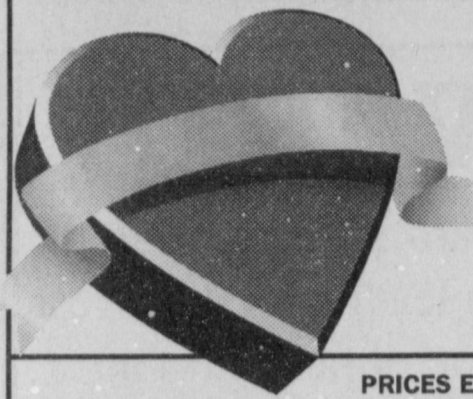

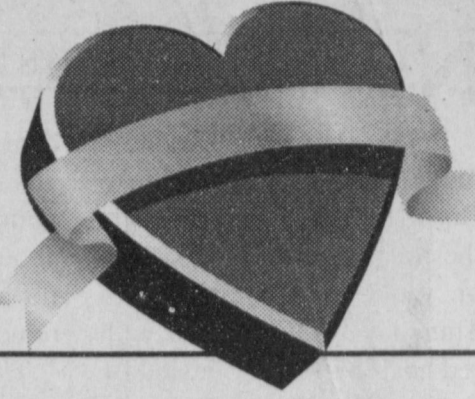
