## Wheat Referendum Due In County for June 20

Wheat farmers will decide by referendum on June 20 whether or not they want marketing quotas on their 1958 wheat crop. The voting will take place in Runnels County from 8 a. m. until 5 p. m. at the following places:

Ballinger—court house  
Winters—city hall  
Miles—city hall  
Norton—gin office  
Crews—community hall  
Wilmeth—gin office  
Wingate—Security Bank  
Drasco—grocery store  
W. R. (Buddy) Gray stated Monday that for the first time the committee would have ladies holding the referendum next week. This is being done because of the rush of farm work and to allow all men time to continue their planting and

cultivation of crops. All those who will have 15 acres or more planted in wheat in 1958 are eligible to cast a ballot in this election. The quotas do not become effective, points out the chairman, unless at least two-thirds of the producers voting in the referendum favor the quotas. The outcome of the referendum will decide the level of the available price support for the 1958 crop, as well as whether quotas and penalties on "excess" wheat are used for the crop. All growers are being urged to vote in the referendum. Those who have questions in regard to the program are asked to contact the local ASC office prior to June 20 to get the information they desire.

## Farmers Working To Get Planting And Plowing Done

Farmers of the county were halted again Wednesday from their planting and cultivating by a rain which covered the county with 1 inch and slightly more being reported. Last weekend and the first two days of this week, tractors were running early and late as practically all farmers in the county were able to start planting. Rain at Ballinger showed 1.3 inches and most areas received that much or at least enough to stop field work for a short time. Many acres of cotton were planted the first two days of the week and some plowing to rid farms of weeds was started. In most sections, farmers needed another week or ten days in which to catch up with the most pressing work. Harvesting of small grain was underway in several sections of the county this week with most reports showing the oats light and badly damaged by the long wet conditions and rust. Wheat was reported to be turning out better than oats. Work has been started by a number of farmers who have placed their land in the soil bank. Cyclone brush cutters and rotary shredders are being used on some of the acreage where sunflowers and cockleburs are high to take care of the weeds and meet requirements of the soil bank provisions. There is a large amount of row feed crops planted with some up and doing fine. Plowing of these crops started the past week and should be in good shape within a few more days.

He assisted in the house with the passage of the bill which provided a \$10,000 loan for the Runnels County Water Improvement district for preliminary survey on a proposed conservation water project.

## Jaycees Adding Features For Program Here June 29

### Runnels Water Board Meeting Monday Night

The board of directors of the Runnels County Water Improvement District will meet next Monday night for a very important session. The meeting will be held in the district court room in the court house and all members of the board are expected to be present. The district was recently granted a \$10,000 loan by the State of Texas in special legislation passed at Austin. This money is to be used for a preliminary survey of the proposed reservoir site and dam to determine if the project is feasible. This money will be available in September and work on the survey is expected to start soon after that date. At the meeting Monday night, Harry Burley, of the Bureau of Reclamation, will attend the meeting and speak to the local group on the requirement of that body in the building of large water projects. He will also answer all questions that come from members of the board in regard to the impounding of such lakes and the legal uses of water from such projects. Ray Fuqua, chairman of the Runnels County Board, is making arrangements for the meeting Monday and a number of other guests are expected to be present.

## City Commission Meeting Tuesday Handles Business

The Ballinger City Commission was in session Tuesday morning for routine business and to take up several new items.

The contract of E. E. Berry for hauling trash for the city and collecting garbage was up on June 9 and the city did not renew. Instead they employed Mr. Berry to continue with the work but he has been placed on the city payroll and they will operate the collecting trucks and be in charge of all hauling in the future.

The resignation of Mrs. Betty Gibson as police secretary was accepted effective on June 15. Miss Janice Amarine has been hired to the position and will be in the police office after Saturday.

The commission gave authorization for the purchase of two new tires for the city street maintainer.

City water employees are trying to find out what is causing the water at the city swimming pool to become colored after chlorine is added. A water expert from San Angelo was due here this week to look into the matter and everything possible is being done to overcome the trouble.

### CITY COMMISSION STUDYING STRIKE

The Ballinger City Commission was meeting this morning for interviews with employees of the city who started a strike Wednesday when they left their jobs. City Secretary Foy Farmer said that about nine were involved in the strike and most of them were workers with the water or street department.

An increase in wages was said to be the request of the workers and an effort was being made this morning to get the men satisfied and back on their jobs. Machinery operators, truck drivers, meter repairmen and other workers were included.

### MERKEL DELEGATION VISITS YOUTH CENTER

A delegation of adults and teenagers from Merkel were here last Saturday night to attend the meeting at the Teen Haven. They visited with directors of the organization and remained to watch the program Saturday night.

A large crowd of young people were at the center Saturday and a good number from the parents association also attended. Merkel is interested in the forming of such a center and came here to get information on all phases of the operation.

## County Benefits Under New Bill Passed In State

Runnels County will receive benefits from House Bill 620, passed by the last legislature and signed last week by the governor. The bill will become effective on August 22, 1957.

According to the new bill, 50 per cent of the value of right-of-way will be paid by the state with the State Highway Department to determine the value of the land involved. Money for the fund will be received from a 10 per cent increase in registration fees for all motor vehicles.

Under this plan the money will likely not be available until after March 1958.

Under the new highway building program in this county there is considerable right-of-way which has not been purchased. It is expected the commissioners will make deals with land owners and contract for the needed land so that the actual purchase will qualify under the new law.

None of the land from 5 miles west of Ballinger to the Tom Green County line on Highway 67 has been purchased. Judge W. H. Rumpy stated Monday that the benefit from the new bill would surely make it possible for the contemplated work in the county to be completed with the bond money authorized by the voters for that purpose.

The bill will also greatly benefit the county on future road projects where additional or new right-of-way is needed. At the same time it will cost all owners of motor vehicles some money in a higher registration fee. It was stated that the average increase on passenger cars would be about \$1.50.

### POOL REOPENED SUNDAY AFTER NEW PAINT JOB

The Ballinger municipal swimming pool was reopened Sunday after being shut down for several days. Last week the pool was drained and the inside given a new coat of paint. Refilling was started Saturday and was completed for swimmers Sunday afternoon when it opened for business.

Trouble was still being experienced this week with a slight greenish color to the water. New filtering process was being used in an effort to handle the trouble and get the water back to the clear stage.

Dick Richey, pool manager, stated Tuesday that business had been considerably better since the hot weather started and large crowds are on hand each afternoon.

## Winters Showdeo Opening Parade This Afternoon

Winters is all set for their annual Showdeo program with the opening event scheduled at 5 o'clock this afternoon when the giant parade will pass through the downtown streets. A second parade will be staged again at 5 p. m. Saturday.

The big show for 1957 promises action galore with the best of livestock on hand and performers ready to test their skill. Arrangements have been made so that experienced men are in charge of each phase of the program to see that the action is fast and no waits.

The parade committee has announced a number of decorated cars, riding groups, and out of town riding clubs. Cash prizes will be offered to the best entries.

The first performance will get underway at Blizzard Field at 8 p. m. with bareback bronc riding, jackpot calf roping, wild cow milking, clover leaf race, saddle bronc riding and bull riding. A calf scramble will be an added feature this year. There will also be clowns and special acts for the entertainment of all ages.

All this week has been Western Week in Winters with the people donning western costumes and devoting their time to advertising the rodeo.

## Farm Delegation From Turkey To Visit In County

Runnels County will be host to twenty farmers and agricultural leaders from Turkey on July 20. County Agent C. T. Parker has been advised that the delegation will be here at 10 a. m. on the above date and will remain in the county until about 5 p. m.

The program planned so far will include a short meeting with the county commissioners' court to study county government and a meeting with 4-H club boys and their leaders. The group will also inspect several special farm and ranch demonstrations and will make a general tour of the county.

They are in this county to study agriculture from various angles and are guests of the Department of Agriculture. While in this area they will be headquartered at San Angelo and will come here from that city.

They will have their own interpreter with them as very few of the group speaks English. Mr. Parker stated that other phases of the program for the one-day visit here would be worked out later. Some plans will be made for the noon hour with the group dining here.

All phases of conservation practices will be of interest to the visitors and places for stops on the tour will be determined later, according to condition of local demonstrations.

## Paul Lynn Test Near Ballinger Past 2500 Feet

The W. U. Paul No. 2-Harry Lynn was drilling Wednesday past 2500 feet. Location of the well is about 3 miles northwest of Ballinger and is south of Palo Pinto production in the Ballinger (Palo Pinto) field.

Humble Oil & Refining Co. and G. W. Strake No. 1-L. A. Wilbanks 4 1/2 miles northwest of Hatchel, a Gray sand prospect in the newly opened Winters, Southwest multiphase field, flowed 22.08 barrels of oil on a 24 hour test. The production was through perforations between 4480-84 and 4490-94 feet, testing in the well is being continued.

Gardner production has been extended 1 3/4 miles north in the Ballinger multiphase field with completion of the Frank W. Burger No. 1-E. A. Voelker, six miles south of Winters. It was finished for a calculated daily flowing potential of 472 barrels of 43 gravity oil. Top of pay was picked at 4408 feet.

Geochemical Surveys of Abilene No. 1-Harris Davenport foot been located for a 4200 foot rotary test. It is 3/4 mile south and slightly east of the Sidney H. Davis No. 1-Walter Adamsi, opener and lone producer in the Misti (Srawn) field.

## Soil Bank Land Check To Start Locally Monday

The Runnels County ASC office will start on June 17 checking all land placed in the soil bank in this county. This is the land taken out of production and on which weeds must be cut and otherwise kept in good condition.

The long spell of wet weather in this area has let this type of land get back in condition. Many fields in the soil bank are now high in sun flowers and other types of weeds that must be taken from the land before it can pass inspection.

ASC workers will also start the wheat acreage reserve check in the county and will complete this phase of their job as soon as possible. This will include some 200 producers and approximately 8,000 acres.

A school for workers will be held here next week and then a check will be started on the reserve cotton acreage in the county. This is for acreage taken out of production for this year and it will be the first item checked in the 1957 cotton program. Members of the ASC staff stated that they expected most farmers would finish planting cotton this week and have their fields ready for the first check by workers of the ASC office.

Announcement was also made in regard to the wool program that the national average has not been received but the local office still hopes to pay off on this program during July.
