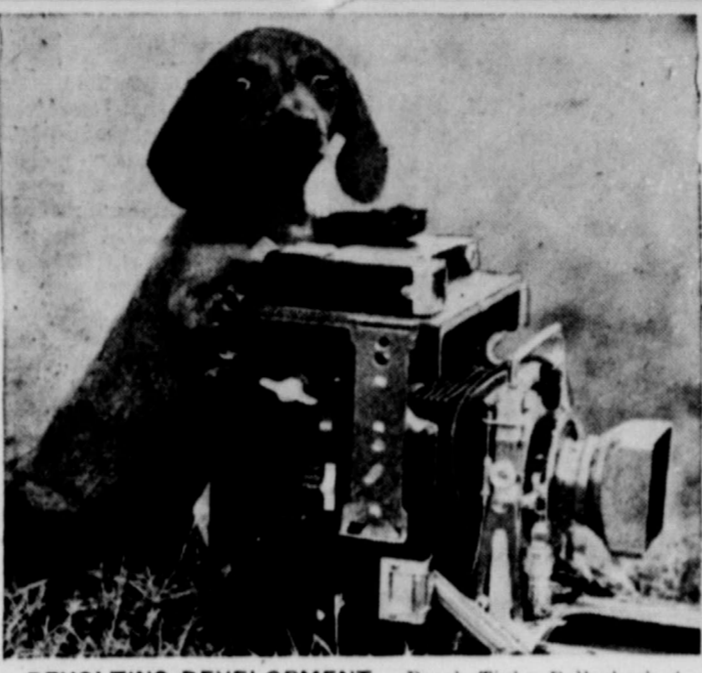
At the Christmas program, Mrs. Elmer Shepperd will show movie slides of pictures which she took while touring Europe this summer.
