
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
6.000 Register **At Draft Boards During January**

that more than 6,000 Texas males of draft age registered at the state's 137 draft boards in January, Colonel Morris S Schwartz, state Selective Service director, reported last week. He said about 65,000 men year, mostly 18 year-olds register with the Texas boards. At the beginning of the current law, 1948-49, rate of registration was about 63,000 a year. Males reaching age 18 are required to register on their birthday, or within five days thereafter. All males born since August 30, 1922. are legally obligated to register, except those not yet 18.
