The new bridge across the Colorado River at Ballinger on Highway 67 was opened Tuesday afternoon to traffic. The bridge, under construction for the past nine months, is now ready for through traffic and is a big improvement over the old narrow bridge with curving approaches. The new bridge is straight with the highway and will be much safer than the old structure. Detour signs were torn down Tuesday and no interruption of traffic is expected in the future.

Ballinger Teacher Selected For Year In Science Study

Floyd Henry Wimberley, general science and algebra teacher in Ballinger, will leave in September to spend a year in graduate study at the University of Utah at the expense of the National Science Foundation.

Wimberley is one of 50 high school science and mathematics teachers, among nearly 650 applicants, who have won places in 1958-59 Academic Year Institute at the University of Utah. Seventeen American Universities, including Utah, will hold 1958-59 Academic Year Institutes—a program inaugurated last September by the National Science Foundation to train better science and mathematics teachers for the nation's high schools.

Mr. Wimberley, who resides at 200 Sharp Avenue, Ballinger, is a 1950 graduate of Hardin Simmons University.

The Foundation pays the teachers to go back to college. It pays their tuition, fees and travel expenses and gives them a living allowance roughly equal to a young teacher's salary for the year.

The Ballinger City Commission was in session Tuesday to attend to business, approve bills for payment and attend to other routine matters.

A resolution was passed by the commission authorizing the mayor to make application for federal aid to help make improvements to the municipal sewer system. Members of the city group hope to receive approximately \$3,000 for this purpose.

Albert Lippe was appointed as assistant fire marshal and will assume his duties at once. The commission approved the paying of registration fees at the annual meeting of firemen and fire marshals to be held in San Antonio on June 10, 11 and 12.

Officers Return Prisoners Here To Stand Trials

The United States Geological Survey in cooperation with the Texas Board of Water Engineers will, in the next few days, start a topographic mapping program in the vicinity of Ballinger. The area to be mapped consists of six quadrangles covering approximately four hundred square miles encompassing portions of Runnels and Coke Counties. The area will extend from Ballinger west approximately twenty-four miles and north sixteen miles, which will take in the towns of Maverick and Bronte.

Primary purpose of this detailed mapping program is for water conservation and development and flood control. The resulting maps will also be useful in the development of irrigation, oil exploration, highway planning and agricultural development. The maps will be compiled from aerial photographs flown at approximately eight thousand feet. The map will be published at a scale of one inch equals two thousand feet. The contour interval will be ten feet.

The initial work on this mapping program will be horizontal ground control by telerameter traverse. This work will be under the direction of Mr. Arthur Gervais Jr., Project Engineer. He will be assisted by Irvin J. Benes and George M. Barker, Topographic Engineers. These men will be working along the roads and cross-country for several weeks and will appreciate the cooperation, assistance and advice of folks living in the area.

"I dedicate this bridge to the honor of the people of Runnels County and the traveling public," were the words of Herb Petrie, member of the Texas Highway Commission, as he cut the ribbon that opened the new bridge for the first cars. The ribbon was held on either side of the commissioner by Sarah Chandler and LaNell Holbrook, Ballinger High School seniors.

Cars with drivers were lined up for the first trip across the bridge and in the first car was Mr. Petrie, Judge W. H. Rampy, and Mayor Bill Moore. Immediately following in other cars were members of the state highway department engineering staff, county and city commissioners and other honorary guests at the opening.

As the crowd gathered for the opening Tuesday afternoon, the Ballinger Bearcat band, under the direction of Wm. F. Poethelwaite, played a short concert. After all program members were present, Allen Davis called the meeting to order, and the band played the National Anthem and Rev. Felix Keys Jr. offered the prayer of dedication.

Chas. Hambrick, president of the Ballinger Chamber of Commerce, was master of ceremonies and extended a welcome from Ballinger to all those present. He presented Judge W. H. Rampy, who in turn introduced members of the Runnels County Commissioners' Court, Mayor Moore and members of the city commission, J. A. Snell, divisional highway engineer, W. B. Hoppe, resident engineer, Marshall Moore of the Austin Bridge Co. and other visiting highway officials from over the state.

He presented Herb Petrie who spoke briefly to the crowd. He paid a compliment to Ballinger and Runnels County and expressed appreciation for the many friends he has in the area. He declared that the opening of the new four-lane bridge on Highway 67 was only a part of the work anticipated on the national highway which would eventually be a modern route all the way to Mexico.

The speaker reminded the people that the bridge cost the state and federal government \$420,000, the city \$6,080 and the county \$13,900. The full span is 581 feet in length and will mean better service and safety to the traveling public.

Mr. Petrie told his audience that the Texas Highway Commission will contract some \$281,000,000 in highway construction in Texas this year. He added that the Soviet Union was three times the largest country in the world and yet they had less than one-third of the paved roads and streets as was found in Texas alone.

He joked by saying no wonder they had to take to the air with their Sputniks, they had nowhere to go on the ground.

The construction job was started on the bridge in June 1957 and for the past nine months all through traffic has been routed over a detour. People living in South Ballinger and the many service stations and eating places along Hutchings Avenue welcome the opening of the bridge and the return of through traffic over Highway 67. In addition to the completion of the bridge, the first 3 of a mile of four-lane divided highway has been completed west of the Colorado River.

The new and modern structure will replace an old bridge which was started in 1922 and has been in use since that time. It was narrow and had a winding approach at each end which made it a serious traffic hazard.

The bridge is well lighted with standards on both sides of the structure which will be maintained by the city and county. There is a walk-way for pedestrians on each side of the bridge and a center elevation through the middle of the right-of-way will divide traffic going in different directions.

Several hundred cars were lined up Tuesday afternoon to make their first trip over the new bridge and traffic was heavy for the first few hours.

NORMAN VINCENT PEALE SPEAKER FOR GAS GROUP

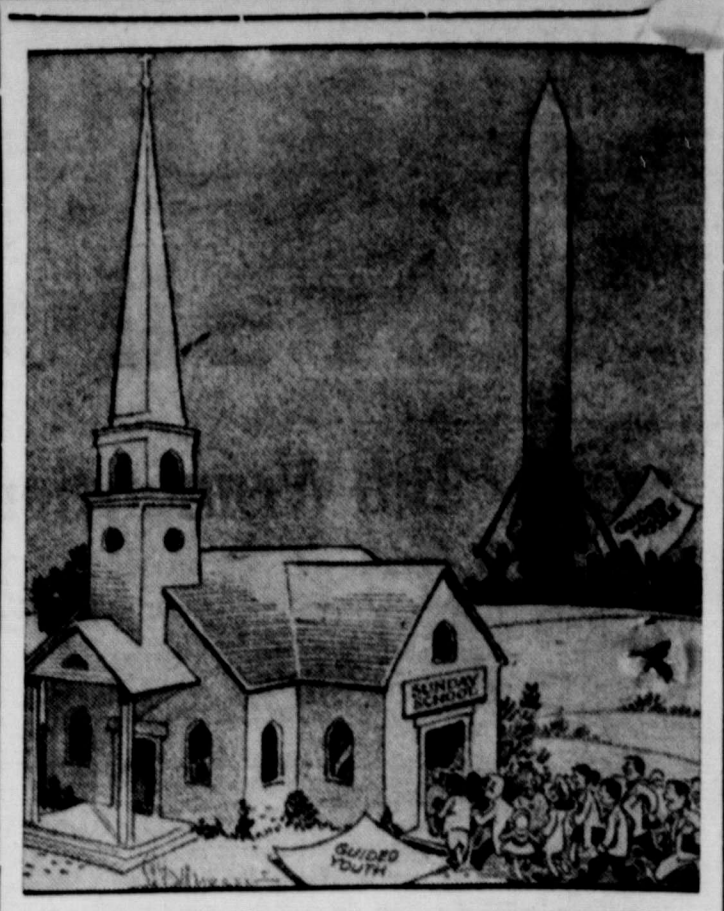

Chief C. G. Conner Is Guest Speaker For Local Clubs

"Traffic Safety" was the subject when C. G. Conner, who is with the Texas Department of Public Safety, spoke at a joint meeting of the Ballinger Shakespeare Club and the XXXVI Club Thursday afternoon in the library club room.

When giving a brief history of transportation for the past 50 years, Chief Conner stated that although motor vehicles are modern, the people have not been educated to operate the motor vehicle in a safe manner.

In giving statistics on acci-

dents, the speaker said that traffic accidents annually kill 38 thousand persons, injure some 1 and a third million persons, and cost over 4½ billion dollars. There are hopes of cutting down accidents if each driver would take it upon himself to learn laws and ordinances, continued Mr. Conner.

Mr. Conner concluded his talk by urging elementary schools to teach traffic safety to all children; our high schools should provide Driver Education courses with both classroom and practice driving instructions to boys and girls just before their driver licensing age; Teachers Colleges,

both State and city, should offer courses on how to teach traffic safety and Driver Education.

Sheriff Don Atkins introduced the speaker.

Mrs. John Miller, club president, was in charge of the business and welcomed guests. Mrs. Jack Jackson reported on the Court project which the club sponsored for the high school students to attend a mock traffic trial held at the court house Thursday morning.

Approximately 30 club women attended the Traffic Safety program.

Ballinger Shakespeare Club Sponsors Court Visit

Thirty students from Ballinger High School and twenty students from Junior High attended a mock trial Thursday which was held before Earl Cope, Justice of the Peace, and followed the order of a regular traffic court trial.

Deputy Sheriff Eskell Powell acted as the defendant. His lawyers were E. J. Grindstaff and E. B. Underwood. O. L. Parish, Jr., was the state attorney. Witnesses for the state were A. H. Anthony and Bob Dickinson. Powell was found guilty and fined.

Following the mock trial, a panel discussion was held by all those who participated at the traffic court. The Senior High students included two Texas History classes which Cedric Bettis teaches, and Drivers Education students from Junior High which Glen Ferguson instructs.

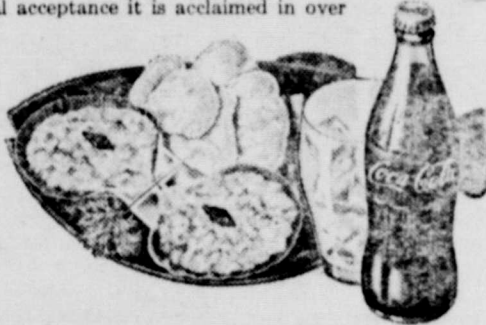
