Ballinger Jaycees Win State Award at Austin

A Ballinger delegation returned from the State Jaycee convention Sunday after spending five days in Austin. The Ballinger group consisted of eight men and seven ladies with the eight delegates seated with voting powers in the business sessions.

In the scrap books entered, the Ballinger Jaycees won three second places. The big surprise came at the awards banquet Saturday night when Ballinger was awarded the trophy for the best single project of the year by a town of any size. This was given for the staging of the Ballinger Birthday celebration last June 29 in which the club showed 100 per cent cooperation and participation.

In the other three awards, they were given for projects in towns from 5,000 to 15,000 population.

The first was for trade promotion and included the state softball tournament, staging of six-man bi-district football games and other events.

The second was for youth welfare and included sponsorship of cubs, boy scouts, voice of democracy and other events.

The third was for the annual minstrel show which was staged last fall with all Jaycees talent.

The organization has also received a certificate for civic improvement from the National Junior Chamber of Commerce for their participation in all projects sponsored by the national group.

Pastor Is Called By First Baptist At Sunday Service

The First Baptist Church extended a call to Rev. J. B. Fowler Jr. of Van at the close of the service Sunday evening. Rev. Fowler accepted the call and expects to be here with the local church not later than June 1.

Rev. Fowler was here for both services Sunday and also to attend Sunday school and the evening meetings of the young people.

He is a native of Oklahoma, 27 years of age, and graduated from high school in Odessa where his parents live. He has been pastor of the First Baptist Church at Van for the past two years and prior to that was pastor at Moran.

Mrs. Fowler is 26, a native of Arkansas, and is also a graduate of Howard Payne College. They have two children, Jerry Bruce 4, and David Alan 1.

Rev. Fowler is engaged in a revival meeting at this time and will be unable to resign from the church at Van before Sunday night.

For the past several months the church has been served by a temporary pastor from Hardin-Simmons University at Abilene.

Mr. Newton is a student in Texas Christian University at Fort Worth and will complete his work in August, at which time he and his wife will move to the church home at 803 Broadway. They will occupy the parsonage on week-ends from now until his school work is finished.

A service of installation will be held Friday night at the local church with Dr. Elmer Henson, dean of the Bible College of Bible at T. C. U., here to be in charge of the service. Members of the Ballinger Ministerial Alliance will attend this service along with pastors of other Christian churches in District 6.

Kenneth R. Newton was born and reared at St. Joseph, Missouri. Following high school, he was employed by Trans-World Airlines at Kansas City, Missouri. After four years with T. W. 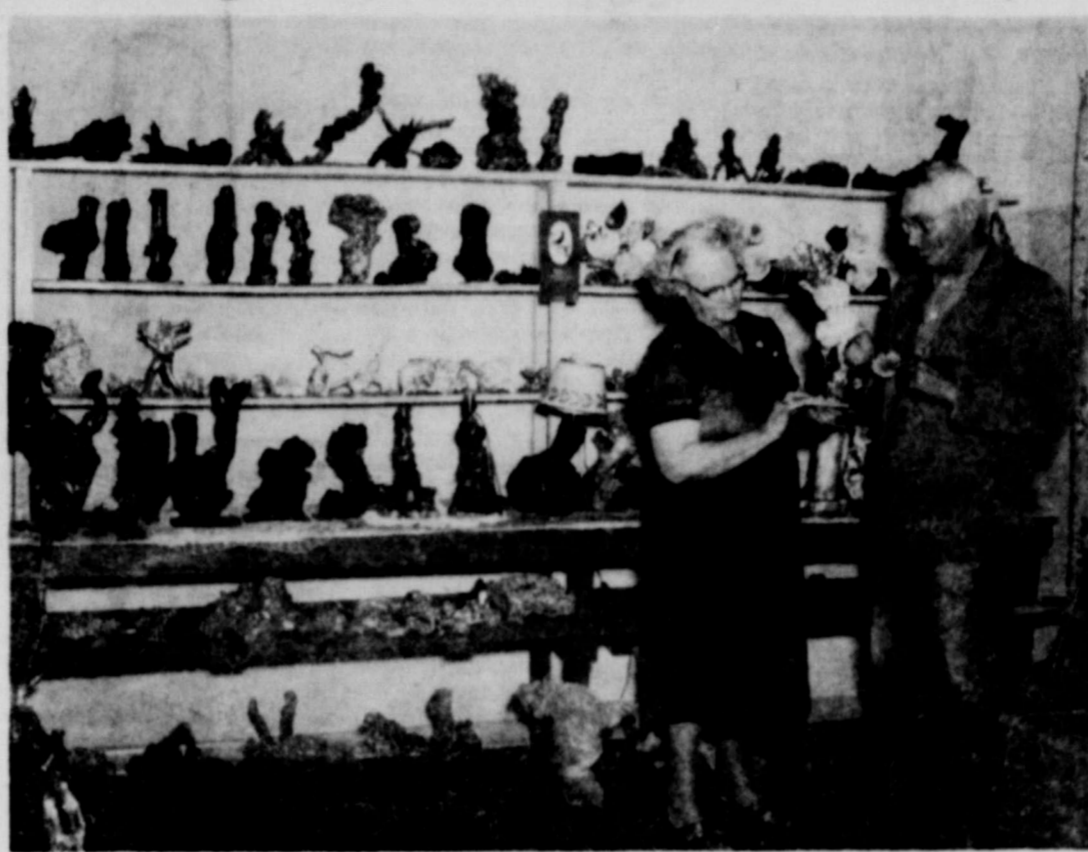

Picking up rocks and pieces of wood during the past fifteen years has assembled a collection for a Ballinger man which is attracting attention and is well worth a look from all people. Lemuel Dupre, who lives in Apartment 9 of the Ballinger Housing Project, has the interesting pieces of wood and rock and in the past years has been polishing them and making an exhibit that covers one entire wall of his living room.

Aside from the pieces of wood and rock which have been cleaned and polished, he has a huge collection of other pieces which he expects to turn into table lamps and other items as he can get the work done.

Mr. Dupre got started picking up odd shaped pieces of wood as he traveled around and has many that resemble animals, reptiles and some just beauty. Some are root structures of trees and shrubs while others are twisted limbs that have been made that way by nature.

The collection comes from about ten states, the furthest away being from California, while there are many pieces that came from Mexico. Mr. Dupre says he keeps a watch for pieces for his collection all the time when he is traveling or on an outing along streams.

After pieces of wood are cleaned and given a coat of varnish or paint, he makes them into lamps or items to which the shape lends itself. He has not changed any of the pieces from the original shape when they were found.

In his living room he has a display of six shelves about ten feet long completely filled with finished articles. One of the most interesting pieces of wood is a twisted combination of Indian Wood which was found in the Big Bend section. He has some wood pieces that will sink when placed in water.

The rock collection has been assembled for beauty and odd shapes and is interesting to study. Many came from caves which Dupre has explored in past years.

Mr. Dupre came to Rannels County in 1903 but from 1907 to 1926 was in Mexico where he was in the revolution and other exciting experiences. At present he is engaged in writing a book of his life which he hopes to complete soon.

Mrs. Dupre is also interested in the hobby and has found a number of rocks of which she is very proud. The couple hopes to make a public display of the results of their hobby in the near future.

Cars In Alleys Blocking Trucks On Routine Work

The Ballinger City Commission was in session Tuesday morning for a number of special business matters.

Members of the commission received a number of complaints in regard to people parking in alleys and obstructing traffic. In several cases recently trucks have been unable to get through the passage way to unload merchandise and the city trucks have been forced to back in and out of alleys because of parked vehicles. This is against a city ordinance and city officials hope that local people will keep these driveways open and not force the police to issue tickets.

The city attorney was instructed to draft a new ordinance on parking which will cause the installation of meters along the court house lawn from Seventh Street to Broadway. The ordinance will also change the time limit for parking all along Hutchings from two hours to one hour for 5 cents.

The commission authorized the installation of a new street light on South Eighth Street at Blum Avenue.

Only one bid was filed for a truck chassis recently advertised by the city. This bid was submitted by the Ballinger Truck & Tractor Co. and was accepted by the commission. An advertisement for bids for fire fighting equipment to be mounted on this chassis is being prepared. When a bid is accepted, the company will get the chassis from the manufacturer and mount all the equipment required and complete a new fire pumper for the Ballinger department.

One building permit was issued to J. E. Sparks in the amount of \$150 for an addition to a bathroom at his home on Sixth Street between East Avenue and Broad Street.

DEFENSE WARNINGS TALKED AT MEETING

Chas. Dickinson, with the federal civil-defense, was here Tuesday to meet with Carl Murman, county coordinator, and delegations from Ballinger, Miles and Winters.

He discussed the type of warning signals that can be installed in town and one-half of the cost paid for by the federal government. This program is mainly for warning of attack by enemies but can also be used for warnings of approaching tornadoes and other weather hazards.

Cost was shown at about \$3,500 for each unit and a survey showed two would be needed in Ballinger. No action was taken by any community at the close of the meeting.

The Dallinger Hardware Store was burglarized last week with ten new guns, ammunition and cash taken from the store. A short time later an arrest was made at Abilene following a traffic wreck and four of the guns were recovered with one arrest being made.

Jerry Wesley Lowe of Abilene made a statement in which he implicated Wayne Clift in the Ballinger job. In his statement he said that the pair arrived in the alley at the rear of the Dallinger store at 1:30 a. m. They used a tire tool to prize the panel from the rear door and then removed the inside bars to gain entrance to the building. He admitted taking ten guns, ammunition, and what cash was in the register.

He told of going from here to Dallas where six of the guns were placed in the attic of a garage at the home of a relative. He added that the parties were not at home and did not know the guns were left there. After making the statement here, Dallas officers went to the address and recovered the six guns. The other four were found in the car following the wreck at Abilene.

Lowe was injured in the wreck and is now at Abilene in the custody of his parents. Clift ran, following the wreck and so far has not been apprehended. Charges of burglary have been filed against both men.

Cub Activities Will Close Year Tuesday, April 29

Ballinger cub activities are coming to the close of the year and last Sunday some 30 cubs, with their parents, were at the city lake to take rides with the Ballinger Boating Club. Each cub received as many as two rides during the afternoon.

Patrolman C. R. Anthony has secured Billy McElroy, a pistol specialist with the department, to come to Ballinger on Tuesday, April 29, to give a demonstration to the cubs in expert shooting. This program will be held in the cove at City Park at 5:30 p. m. and visitors will be welcomed, especially boy scouts. McElroy will do such shooting as splitting a playing card, shoot out a candle and split a bullet on the sharp edge of an axe and hit a clay pigeon with the halves.

At 6:30 on April 29 the cubs, their parents and friends will assemble at the park for the annual picnic and tramp party. Special awards will be made at the close of the meal by Cubmaster Clayton Jay.

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Gov. Price Daniel and other state officials and agencies have become extremely interested in traffic safety and have called upon all county judges, city officials and persons interested to meet and discuss what can be done. A meeting was held in Runnels County this week and county and city officials will lend every possible cooperation to any plan which will prevent some of the killings on Texas highways. Traffic patrolmen, radar controlled speed and other measures will help, but the real help must come from each individual driver. Most drivers are careful, with exception of speed, but many of them suffer because of the one careless or unsafe driver along the route. Education of safety on highways has done much to make many people use every precaution when on the road. Faster cars and better highways are an invitation to step up the car to rates of speed far in excess of the limit, watch all highway signs and obey them, will likely never have a wreck unless it is the full responsibility of some other person. There is no doubt of the need for safer driving and with officials in every county helping, maybe the situation can be improved.

It now appears that the City of Ballinger will be unable to use any water from Elm Creek this summer for home and industrial purposes. The salt content in the stream builds up to proportions which make it impossible to use for home consumption or irrigation. There is ample water to start the summer in both the Valley Creek and Elm Creek lakes but pumping facilities to Valley Creek has been unable to handle the load for the past two summers. City officials had hoped to get the Elm Creek plant ready to help out when the peak load of summer comes but recent tests from the lake shows the salty condition very bad. The water can be used for the municipal swimming pool but if it remains as salty as at present, it will likely not be pumped into the local water reservoirs. In that event, there may have to be some kind of water control this summer to take care of all parts of the town and maintain a pressure which will provide water for all areas.

Ballinger's pride and joy, the city park, will soon begin another season of activity. Each year the popularity of the Ballinger park increases and it becomes better known over a wider territory. Many family re-



WEST TEXAS NOTES

On April 13, Mrs. A. S. (Granny) Matthews celebrated her 100th birthday anniversary at Coleman. She was honored on this occasion by her children, grandchildren and a host of friends who called. The honored guest came to Brown County in 1863 at the age of five. She told of some of the hardships which met the pioneer families, one being the Indian raids with many tribes still living in this section. She told her callers that she was 12 years of age before she met her first physician.

A fund drive was launched in Menard last week to be used for the promotion of junior baseball. The goal was set at \$3,000 with \$2,500 earmarked for the lighting of the playing field. They plan to operate four teams in the boys' league and to make the field desirable for play and also for the spectators. A long-term lease had been secured on the ground to be used for the playing field and after it is put in condition, a backstop and other needs will be built. A survey had been completed showing 72 boys in the 8 to 12 year group desired to play baseball this summer.

Red Cross workers in Coke County have announced that the 1958 quota has been raised and the annual fund campaign closed. The county had a quota of \$1,012 and the final check showed \$1,018 had been collected. H. A. Springer served as county chairman and has expressed his appreciation to all workers. Bronte workers were organized and ready to start the annual campaign for the Cancer Crusade. They planned a solicitation that would contact all firms and individuals in that area within the next two weeks.

It is a big job for one caretaker to maintain the park at its peak unless all people cooperate by putting trash in containers and by keeping tables and seats as clean as possible. This summer a drinking fountain will be an added feature in the park and those who use it can get ice water at all times.

C. T. Parker spoke to the Winters Lions Club last week and told them that "the money you spend on kids will be the greatest investment you ever make." Parker is a member of the state Youth Advisory Council and he told members of the Winters club that youth was no worse than in the past but they were living in a fast moving, modern world that offered different opportunities. After the program several members showed interest in the securing of a youth center at Winters and one offered to make a substantial contribution to that cause.

The annual State Singing Association held their annual meeting at Stephenville last week with a large gathering of people from all over the state. Stephenville has entertained this convention for a number of years. Annually it attracts singers from a wide area and among them is some of the best known quartets and other special groups in the state. Aside from those who attend to take part in the two day program, others come to hear the groups and the mass singing of the huge chorus.

The city and school officials at Colorado City are studying plans for the collection of delin-

quent taxes. They indicated in a meeting last week that they may file suits in courts to collect long-time past due taxes for the two groups. Both the city and school have more than \$30,000 due each in past due tax payments. They will hire legal talent to take over the job of giving proper notice to those owing taxes and in the filing of suits when payments are not made. Special notices were to be mailed all persons owing taxes.

The bill passed the Senate last week and is earmarked to help municipalities in projects that will provide jobs and help end the present recession. Eden leaders were hoping for approval of a 50-year loan and are awaiting word from their application.

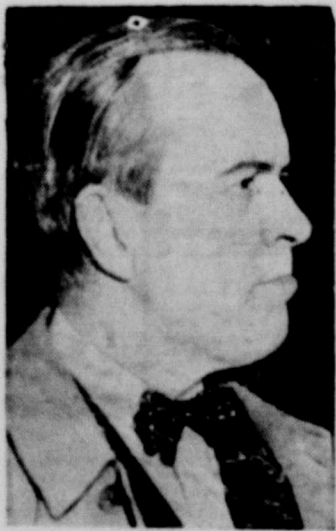
