



Q. Can adults get polio? A They can and they do. And it hits them harder than it hits

Q. Are parents safe from polio if their children have been vaccinated? A. No. Everybody has to get his own vaccination. A vaccinated person, though protected against polio, can still carry the polio virus and infect the unvaccinated

Q. Are you safe if you have had one shot? Two shots? A. Not as safe as the vaccine can make you. One shot is better than none. Two shots are better than one. But for maximum three shots of Salk vaccine.




