Ballinger will be 72 years old Sunday. With some people that age would be guarded as a deep, dark secret but with Ballinger it is another milestone to be pointed to with pride. In past years the citizenship of Ballinger held celebrations to honor the pioneers who were responsible for the growth and progress. Today we celebrate to honor the memory of those men and women who came here in 1886 to start a new West Texas town. They did a good job—one which every person in Ballinger is proud of today.

The pioneers pitched their tents here to start new homes and with a determination to make Ballinger a good town. During the past 72 years many men, women and children have passed through Ballinger, making their home here for a time and going on to other areas where they were called. Many have left their marks on the city and are included in those we honor.

Ballinger did not get off to a slow start. On that first day, June 29, 1886, a train brought some 5, 000 people here to participate in the town lot sale. Many bought and remained to start business careers in the far west. Building material was shipped here in large quanities and business houses and homes were started and rushed to completion. Within a short time a town was operating and supplying the needs for the families of the area for that day and time. As new needs arrived, they were filled. When cotton became a product there was a cotton gin to seperate the lint and seed and turn out a bale that could be shipped. As schools and churches were needed, citizens put up the money so that the children might be educated and also that all might find a place to worship.

Slow transportation made it practically impossible to go to other towns to buy Ballinger is still trying to supply the needs of all the people. Some of these things come slow and after 72 years, civic groups are still struggling

for better things to render the service which people expect.

Transportation has moved from the covered wagon to the horse and buggy, the automobile and the airplane. Farm implements have advanced from the mule-drawn Georgia-stock to the modern tractor and automatic farm machines of today. Communications have moved from the mounted horseman to telephones, radio and television. In all these new inventions, Ballinger firms have been quick to provide a shopping place where the articles could be purchased, installed and serviced. Ballinger has constantly improved the opportunity for its

youth to have a good education. Our school system has come from the reading, writing and arithmetic phase to a modern system offering all subjects and a large field of extra subjects. Ballinger is a church town and today 24 different congrega-tions meet in modern churches of their choice.

A beautiful park, swimming pool, play grounds, baseball fields, youth center and other spots provide entertainment and recreation for the youth as well as the adults. This does not include the many facilities included in the school system for the athletic program and other special training.

During the more than three-score and ten, Ballinger leaders have looked to the future. When they see a need arising, moves are started that usually bring the need to the area. Millions and millions of dollars have been provided for better streets, better lighted business areas, modern public buildings, paved streets, water supplies, and there has been a constant project for better roads since the pioneer days. This project is being pushed now and is far from being completed. During the next two years many paved roads will be added in this county which will make modern transportation more comfortable and much


safer.

While we can point with pride to the accomplishments of the past 72 years, there is much to be done in years that lie ahead. There was never a time when the best of community leader-ship was needed and a united citizenship to follow that leadership to the final accomplishment of the things that will keep Ballinger growing. As a better way of life comes to this great nation of ours, it must become a part of the Ballinger stand-
