The city has canceled the contract with an operator of the municipal airport. This returns the property to the city but with a stipulation that an airport must be maintained. In a town the size of Ballinger, with no air service by commercial line, an airport is about as dull as any business could get. There are a few planes that land here during a year but they are very few and some new business would have to be developed before anyone could make a living operating an airport here. There are numerous things that could be done with the property if the city owned it outright without strings by the OAA on it. The city officials have also decided to sell off some 310 acres of land from the original one section which was purchased for the securing of the Harman Training Center during World War II. This land is some of the best in Runnels County and should sell for a good price.

Many ranch tanks in Runnels County have been built and stocked with fish in the past several years. Some of these have developed into excellent fishing and have provided sport for rural people and many of their friends. Recently a number of these tanks, which were good fishing, have become poor and apparently no fish remain. There are always a few greedy persons who are willing to slip into such places and use nets or poison to get all the fish. Apparently this is what happened in a number of cases in this county and, while no one has been caught in the act, it is strange that there is good fishing one day and absolutely none the next. The same thing applies to quail each year. In the late summer there seems to be a big increase and then after the dove season is over, there are no quail left and the season has not even opened. People who violate game laws should be caught and punished.

This occasion should bring out a maximum vote and every person eligible to cast a ballot should go to the polls and cast a vote for their favorite candidates. **WEST TEXAS NOTES**

The 1953 senior class of the Brady High School met there last week for their first reunion. Attendance was large and a fine program was presented by members of the group. A survey of the past five years showed the class members have produced 42 children and 19 college degrees since their graduation from high school. The class had 66 members and 33 of them were on hand last week at the Brady Country Club for the meeting. In the evening program, members told of their accomplishments of the past five years and introduced their husbands, wives or dates.

The agriculture committee of the Colorado City Chamber of Commerce will sponsor a free fall fair this year. This action was taken by the entire chamber board on recommendation of the committee at a special meeting last week. The plan for a county fair has been discussed for a number of years but this is the first definite stand taken by the civic leaders. At least five departments have been planned which will include livestock, agriculture, women's displays, recreation, etc. Additional meetings have been set to complete all preliminary plans.

Telephone officials and civic leaders at Eden last week held a short program in which the exchange was started on dial operations. The group gathered in Eden Tuesday and the last plug-in call was made by an operator and an official threw the switch to start the new service. Mayor M. J. Green placed the first long distance call over the new facilities and talked to his son in Stephenville. Work leading up to the installation of dial equipment has been under way at Eden for some time and was recently completed.

The Coke County Commissioners' Court has voted to set up a program for the distribution of surplus foods to needy persons in that county. The Coke County application has been approved by the state according to a statement by County Judge Jeff Dean. Under the plan, surplus food owned by the federal government is distributed by state organizations and Coke County will be under a super-

He is a graduate of Southwest State Teachers College and has been teaching for the past two years. He will replace James Barr who recently resigned to enter business in Ballinger. The Winters board also accepted resignations from three other faculty members, A. L. Fox, math and science in high school; Miss Jean Simmons, English and speech and Mrs. A. L. Fox, elementary teacher.

The Rowena Knights of Columbus Lodge held their regular July business meeting which included the installation of new officers. They also heard a report of the state convention and attended to other matters before refreshments were served. The installing officers were District Deputy A. J. Wilke and District Warden Edward Englert of San Angelo. Regular committee chairmen were named at the close of the meeting by the Grand Knight.

Grass fires have been common in many sections of West Texas the past few weeks. A fire at Paint Rock last week caused concern and for a time offered a threat to the downtown section. Vacant lots just south of the business area caught and were out of hand within a short time. They burned to the back door of a number of homes and all possible volunteer workers were on the job combating the spreading fire. The Ballinger fire department sent a truck and an emergency wagon to the scene but workers had the fire under control when they arrived.

The Texas Highway Department has issued a call for bids on slightly more than 11 miles of highway work between Dublin and Stephenville on Highways 377-67. The construction will include widening of the pavement and structures, surfacing the shoulders and asphalt-concrete pavement. The job is a part of an over-all project to improve the route from the Hood County line to the Comanche County line. A large amount of work has been completed on this route from Brownwood to Comanche, a distance of 24 miles.

Coleman last week closed one of their finest rodeo shows. For the past 21 years they have been presenting such western shows and have built facilities for staging one of the best in the

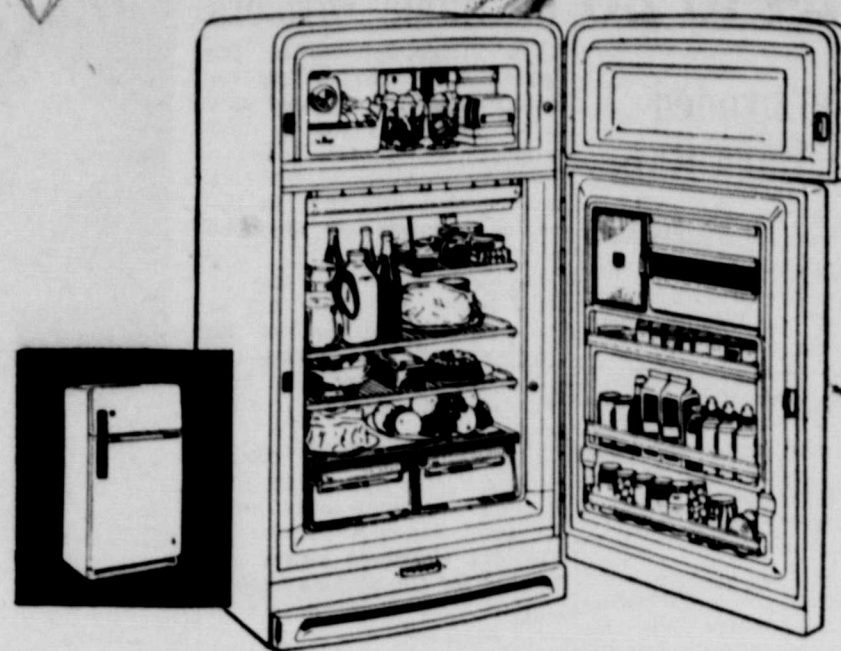
state. This year the Coleman County centennial was combined with the annual rodeo to make a much better program. All people in that area entered into the centennial idea and pioneer costumes, long beards, covered wagons, buggies and other pioneer articles were in evidence in parades and on the streets each day. A highlight of the four day program was a visit by Gov. and Mrs. Price Daniel.

Plans are being made at Comanche for the installation of a television antenna to serve the entire community. A survey was being made there last week to see how many would use the service in case it was made possible and many were signing up. If the plan is carried out, a big, high mast tower will be erected on Reservoir Hill. The cost to subscribers will depend upon how many are secured for the special service which is expected to improve reception in that area.

The Menard school board, in session last week, discussed plans for the hiring of a new band director. Supt. C. R. Brace told the board that Pat McShann had announced his intention of resigning after serving the school as bandmaster for the past three years. No action was taken in as much as no written resignation had been received by the board. The board also is to receive bids for the renovating and repairing of the school's heating system. They authorized the purchase of new typewriters and other machines to be used in the business department.

The Hamilton Herald-News has just published a Hamilton County centennial edition of 72-pages tabloid size. The paper is well arranged and perhaps carries more historical matter than any that has been published in West Texas. More than half of the paper is devoted to early history, feature stories and many pioneer pictures of the town and county. It is called a parade of progress and is dedicated to the pioneers who settled the county and started the towns, churches and schools.

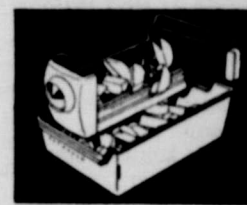

The Immanuel Baptist Church of Talpa will celebrate its 50th anniversary on Sunday, August 10, in the newly decorated church.

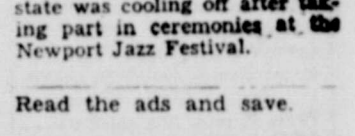
At the close of a revival on August 18, 1958, the members organized the church.

family told us that he would do everything he could to help me be elected, but ended his conversation with "Frankly, I don't know why you want it anyway." After this conversation it occurred to me that many of you wonder why a person wants to be a representative. One may as well ask "Why does one want to be a doctor, a minister, a farmer or a rancher?" It is a dedication of oneself to his natural interests and abilities. It is my belief that each person should give part of himself to the business of governing his State. I do not aspire to be the government, I only want to represent you, the people, in governing the State.

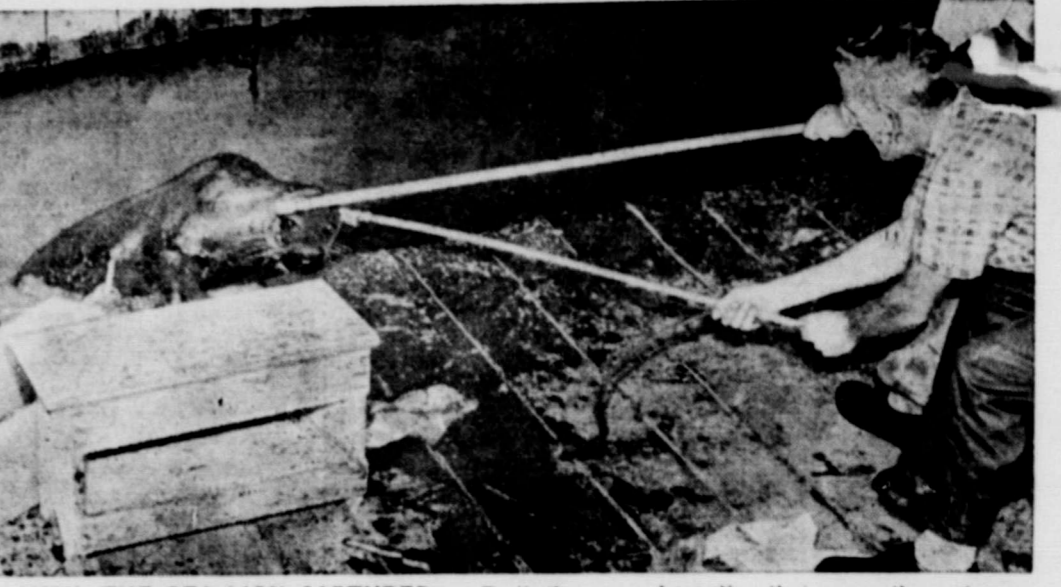

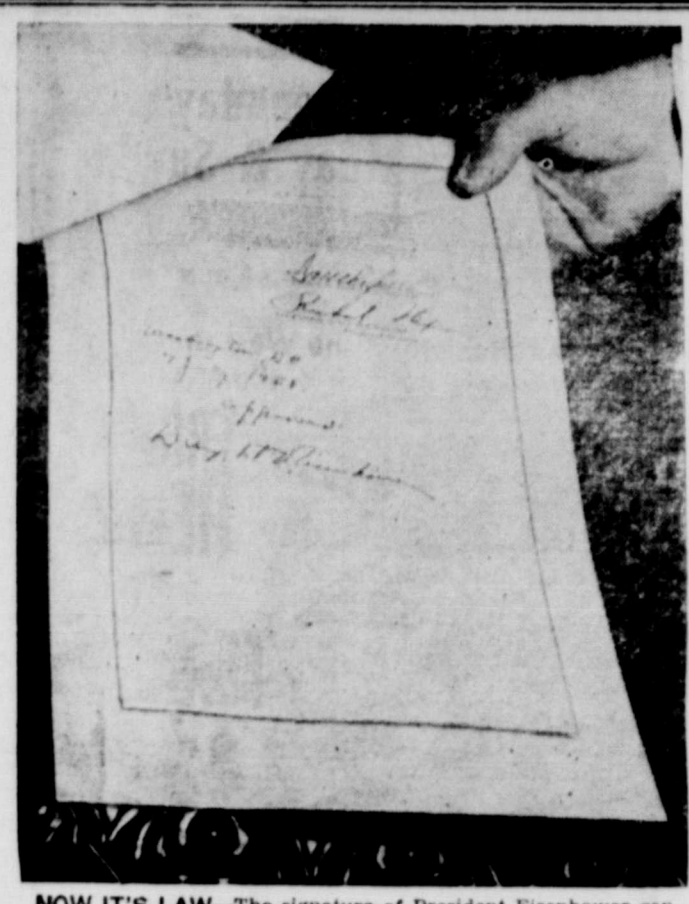

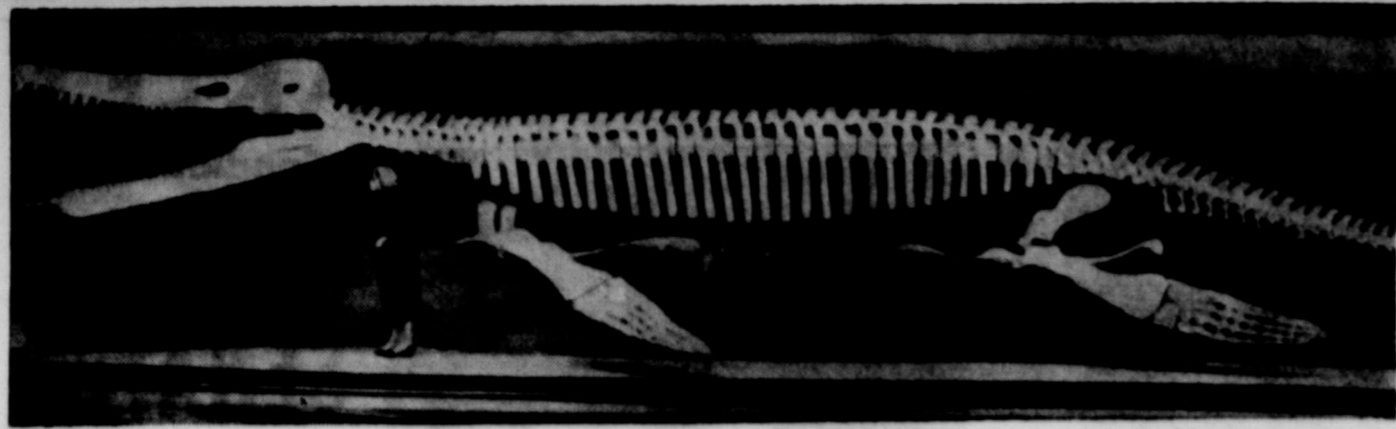

**HE'S LONG GONE, THANK GOODNESS**—Miss Nelda Wright of the Harvard Museum of Comparative Zoology is a small figure indeed posed by the fossil skeleton of the Kronosaurus, once the largest flesh-eating reptile in the seas. About 100 million years ago, the reptile, which is 20 feet long with a nine-foot head, sank to the bottom of a sea which once

covered part of Queensland, Australia. Twenty-seven years ago the remains were found and the soft but resilient bones were freed from the rock with hammer and chisel. The skull contains 80 spike teeth up to eight inches long. It has taken till now to complete the reconstruction. It is the only complete skeleton of a Kronosaurus in existence.
