Mechanics of a Scam
Here's how a typical scam works: Someone impersonating an employee from an lectric cooperative's billing/collections department contacts a co-op member and claims the co-op has not received payment for the member's bill. The caller threatens to shut off the customer's electricity if payment is not received immediately. The nember panics and figures out a quick way to pay, whether through a prepaid card, a bank accout or debitcredit cad inform bank acco tion.
Any members who fall for such a scamwhich can happen to anyone-are still reponsible for their electric bills, in addition o having lost the amount they "paid" (and possibly much more, if they provided banking numbers or other personal information that thieves could reuse)
A Flair for Fraud
Scammers are becoming craftier and more

been reported that some scammers have offered rebates for good payment history! Co-ops around the country are seeing other types of fraud, too. In South Carolina, several co-op members reported a man wearing a co-op badge, claiming to be a solar provider working in partnership with the cooperative. The man, who drives a white, unmarked van, solicits members for appointments to discuss solar installations. This is how he gains entry to members' homes.
The co-op warned its members via social media that it has no such partnerships with any solar providers, nor would its employees Where To Turn for Help Public awareness and Public awareness and protection initia-
tives started by electric cooperatives and other utilities - such as the national coalition Utilities United Against Scams and Vermont's new Scam Busters campaignare using social media, local news and bill inserts to educate and protect members and
do deme knocking or cal ing. During such a call, if co-op members are phone, they should neither make a payment nor give out any personal information. In stead, they should hang up on the caller, then call their electric cooperative and the police. To avoid falling for scams, the Texas Atorney General's office advises member-cus tomers to remember three tips
If someone calls claiming to represent your local electric cooperative and demands immediate payment or personal information hang up the phone and call the member se vice number listed on your electric bill. - Do not give in to high-pressure calls vide Social Security numbers, credit card numbers or bank account ing, credit car anyone who requests it during an unsolicite anyone who requests it during an unsolicite - Never allow anyone in check electrical wiring, natural gas pip or appliances unless you've scheduled an appointment or reported a utility problem. Anytime co-op employees arrive at your residence, request that they produce prop er identification before transacting any

## Critical situation in corn has producers looking for answers

## Corn farmers worried about umonisin contamination in their fields need to immediately conact their crop insurance agent that was the message from Wednesday, September 27 in the exas High Plains.

The potential for fumonisin contamination in corn fields throughout the region prompted bout 700 farmers, crop consul ants, insurance agents and end mas meetings conducted by the Texas A\&M AgriLife Extension Service and Texas Corn Produc

More than 50 percent of the orn grown in Texas comes from he High Plains region. The primary market for this corn is the atle feeding industry, and ac ording to the latest "The Im". " 635 , it accounts for about he region.
Fumonisins are toxins pro um fungi, according to Dr Tom sakeit, AgriLife Extension plant pathologist, College Station. Fu monisins are mycotoxins that an cause illnesses in livestock specially horses, so there are regulatory limits to the amounts load of corn can contain. Isakeit explained that not all nolds growing on ears produce mycotoxins. The Fusarium fung hat produce fumonisin can be visible as a dull white coloration of the kernels, but this appearance doesn't mean the toxin is ine that is with a chemical tes of harvested grain.
