Plane crash in Parmer County kills two

Jake Hefner, 24 of Bovina and Clayton Sides, 25 of Dimmitt, were killed Sunday when the Experimental Challenger II push-propeller plane they were piloting crashed in a field 8 miles west of Friona. The two men started the flight from a private airstrip near Mr. Hefner's home around 8 p.m. and were last seen around 8:45 p.m. about a mile or two north of the runway. When they failed to return to the landing area, relatives became worried and started a search.

Around 10:43 p.m. a 911 call was placed by the family and received by the Parmer County Sheriff's Department. Sheriff Randy Geries assembled the Bovina Fire Department, Bovina Police, Friona Fire Department, Bovina EMS, and the Sheriff's Department for a search and rescue mission. He also asked the Department of Public Safety (DPS) to send a helicopter to aid in the search since the terrain around a possible landing site was difficult for vehicles to

FISD School Board Adopts Universal Free Lunch Program

The Board of Trustees of the Friona Independent School District met in regular session on Monday, April 9th at 7:00 p.m. in the Board Meeting Room of the FISD Administration Building, 909 E. 11th Street, Friona, Texas 79035. All board members were in attendance.

Mike Baker and John Fitzgerald, representatives of the firm Parkhill, Smith, and Cooper, presented another update on the Facility Needs Assessment Report. Two options have emerged and have been discussed several times with the Board and with a Steering Committee made up of local residents. However, more details and discussions are needed before any recommendations will be made.

The Board then considered adopting the Universal Free Lunch Program. Scott Wilkerson, Childhood Nutrition Specialist from Region 16, recommended that the Board switch to the program. Currently, Friona is one of only three districts that do not participate in the Universal Program. The other programs are Provision 2 and CEP. Steve felt that many "eligible" kids were not included in the current lunch program because of the complexity or

inadequacy of the application voted unanimously to change forms and the sign-up process. He told the Board that they could possibly double the number of "eligible" kids by switching from Provision 2 to Universal. After discussing the pros and cons of the three different programs, the Board







I Learned to Wink

Mother tells me that I was about 18 months old when she and I took a bus trip to visit her parents in Roswell NM. In the summer of 1941, mother would have been 19 years old. I remember riding on a "jump seat" (a seat in the isle that folded up on the arm of the main seats). The bus was pretty full of soldiers, and one kept turning around and winking at me. Pretty soon, I learned to wink back at him, even with each eye.

Prisoners of War

During World War II, the farmers around here could go to "POW Camp 31", southwest of Hereford, and get a few prisoners to do day jobs. The boys were Italians. Some painted the murals in the Catholic Church at Umbarger. I was about 4 years old when dad got about a dozen

boys, with one or two guards, to gather shocks of Sudan bundles and take them to the haystack, and stack them. We had a team of horses, "Prince and Tony", hitched to the hay wagon, and I rode on the front of the rack and told the horses what to do-"git-up, gee, haw, whoa". Dad had the reins tied to the rack, he walked along beside the horses, and I expect they knew more about what to do than I did.

One of the boys picked up a bundle and put it right back down, looked all around, smiled and reached his hand under the bundle and pulled out a Bull snake by its tail. He got his other hand on its neck and took off running toward another boy, and with his arms crossed, was able to wrap the snake around the other boy's neck and keep on boy with the snake around his neck started trying to brush the snake off, and as he brushed his hands down his chest, he kept the snake got a good laugh. 



Two arrests made in ongoing poaching case in Lynn County

Lubbock district game wardens have filed multiple charges against two men for their alleged role in the illegal killing of three mule deer bucks in Western Lynn County.

On Saturday, January 6, local wardens received information regarding several mule deer bucks that had been shot at night. The team of wardens quickly followed up on the information and soon the investigation spanned across four separate counties and involved multiple parties. Upon further investigation and evidence collection, it was determined that two men, 22 year old Jacob Hildebrand of Terry County and 21 year old John Redecop of Dawson County had allegedly killed three mule deer bucks at night, and on private property, without permission. Additionally, the individuals allegedly hunted the deer with a spotlight and dumped the carcasses in a wasteful manner, leading to additional charges of hunting with the aid of an artificial light and waste of game. The arrests were made Sunday April 15 following grand jury indictments of the two men that were filed April 3.

The deer were shot in Lynn County, East of the Terry county line. Terry County's mule deer season ended on November 26 of last year (2017), and Lynn County has no legal season to hunt mule deer.





Lubbock district public information officer Aaron Sims explains that despite perception that poaching is thought to have been something of the past, incidents like this occur throughout the year. "By far, the majority of hunters today follow the law and work to preserve wildlife for future generations. Unfortunately, there are individuals that roll the dice and take a chance at being caught hunting illegally. Area wardens often patrol late at night to deter these types of illegal activities. Fortunately, landowners, farmers, and good sportsmen assist wardens by keeping their eyes and ears open, and report possible suspicious activity." Sims wants people to know that any future crimes such as this will be fully investigated and charges will be filed to the fullest extent of the law.

Tips can be anonymously reported via the Operation Game Thief hotline by calling 1-800-792-4263. OGT offers rewards of up to \$1,000 for information leading to the arrest and conviction for a wildlife crime.





Highway closure for Marathon runners in Lubbock

LUBBOCK - Runners participating in the Lubbock Mayor's Marathon will be hitting the pavement on Loop 289 on Sunday, April 22. The marathon is scheduled to take place on the Loop 289 outer main-lanes (counterclockwise traffic lanes) and will require the road to be

"Local law enforcement will begin closing access to the main-lanes at 5:45 a.m. on April 22," said Jeremy Dearing, P.E., TxDOT Lubbock District transportation engineer. "We anticipate having a complete closure of the outer main-lanes for several hours, but as participants progress around the Loop and an area is cleared of runners and aid stations, the lanes will reopen to traffic. All lanes are scheduled to reopen and traffic restored by 2:00 p.m."

Motorists will continue to have access to the inner Loop main-lanes (clockwise traffic lanes) and most of the Loop 289 frontage road system, but two detours are planned:

Traffic traveling on the northbound east Loop 289 frontage roads will be detoured around the Loop 289 section where no frontage roads exist (between 50th and 19th Streets) using Spur 331 (Southeast Drive), MLK Jr. Boulevard and 19th Street.

Westbound north Loop 289 traffic wanting to connect with US 84 will be detoured at I-27 to Avenue Q, then west on Erskine Street to southbound University Avenue and US 84 (Clovis Highway).

Commercial vehicles following the Loop 289 hazardous cargo route will need to

follow the posted detours.

"It's important for drivers coming into Lubbock from other parts of the South Plains to be aware of the closure and have alternate routes in mind to navigate around the city," Dearing said. "With the exception of a small segment on the westbound frontage road on North Loop, from north University Avenue to the Berl Huffman Athletic Complex, closed to traffic, the frontage roads and all major cross street intersections will remain open during the marathon, but Loop frontage road and cross street drivers should still anticipate delays."

How Can You Meet Your Short-term Goals?

Why do you invest? If you're like most people, you'd probably say that, among other things, you want to retire comfortably. Obviously, that's a worthy long-term goal, requiring long-term investing. But as you journey through life, you'll also have short-term goals, such as buying a second home, remodeling your kitchen or taking a much needed vacation. Will you need to invest differently for these goals than you would for the long-term ones?

To answer that question, let's first look at how you might invest to achieve your longer-term goals. For these goals, the key investment ingredient is growth - quite simply, you want your money to grow as much as possible over time. Consequently, you will likely want a good percentage of growth-oriented vehicles, such as stocks and other stock-based investments, to fund your 401(k), IRA or other accounts. In short, when investing for long-term goals, you're seeking significant growth and, in doing so, you'll have to accept some degree of investment risk. But when you're after short-term goals, the formula is somewhat different: You don't need maximum growth potential as much as you need to be reasonably confident that a certain amount of money will be there for you at a certain time.

You may want to work with a financial pro-

fessional to select the appropriate investments for your short-term goals. But, in general, you'll need these investments to provide you with the following attributes:

- Protection of principal As mentioned above, when you own stocks, you have no assurance that your principal will be preserved; there's no agency, no government office, guaranteeing that you won't lose money. And even some of the investments best suited for shortterm goals won't come with full guarantees, either, but, by and large, they do offer you a reasonable amount of confidence that your
- principal will remain intact. • Liquidity - Some short-term investments have specific terms - i.e., two years, three years, five years, etc. - meaning you do have an incentive to hold these investments until they mature. Otherwise, if you cash out early, you might pay some price, such as loss of value or loss of the income produced by these investments. Nonetheless, these types of investments are usually not difficult to sell, either before they mature or at maturity, and this liquidity will be helpful to you when you need the money to meet your short-term goal.
- Stability of issuer Although most investments suitable for short-term goals do provide a high degree of preservation of principal, some of the issuers of these investments are stronger and more stable than others - and these strong and stable issuers are the ones you should stick with. Ultimately, most of your investment efforts will probably go toward your longterm goals. But your short-term goals are still important - and the right investment strategy can help you work toward them.

Sales Tax Holiday for Emergency Supplies

(AUSTIN) — With the potential for severe weather approaching this spring, Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar reminds Texans they can purchase certain items tax-free during the state's sales tax holiday for emergency preparation supplies, from April 28 to April 30.

"The severe weather we had last year — partic-

ularly Hurricane Harvey — was a stark reminder that Texans should be prepared for emergencies at all times," Hegar said. "This tax holiday allows people to save money while ensuring they have the supplies they need before an emergency situation occurs."

There's no limit on the number of qualifying

items you can purchase. These include: batteries, fuel containers and flashlights priced at less than \$75; hurricane shutters and emergency ladders priced at less than \$300; and portable generators priced at less than \$3,000.

Purchases that do not qualify include: batteries for automobiles, boats and other motorized

vehicles; camping stoves and camping supplies; chainsaws; plywood; extension ladders and stepladders; and tents.
