### Foard County Savings Bonds Sales in July Total \$2,536.00

According to George Self, chairman of the Foard County Savings Bonds Committee, Series E and H Bond sales during the month of July in Foard County totaled \$2,536.00. This brings the total for the year to \$34,969.00, which is 38.8 per cent of the 1964 goal of \$90,000.00. Savings Bond sales in Texas for the first 7 months of 1964 totaled \$889,650,925 which represents 59.7 per cent of the state's goal. "The School Savings Stamp program is still one of our most effective instruments of teaching thrift and citizenship. All schools should make this program available to their students," Chairman Self reported.

### Light Showers and High Winds Buffet Area

Scattered showers over Foard County last Wednesday afternoon brought amounts of rain up to 1.6 inches in parts of the Vivian community, .3 inch at Crowell, none in some parts, and some damage from wind.

John Borchardt reported that his farm in the Vivian community received 1.6 inches and the heavy rain filled two small stock tanks that had been dry.

High winds in the north part of the county did some damage to property on the Fred Vecera farm and also in Margaret.

The Crowell Public Schools began the new school year Monday morning, August 31, with 527 students enrolled. There are 335 students in grade school and 163 in high school. This year is the first year that the school has been integrated; there are seven colored students enrolled in grade school and six in high school.

The South Ward School had an initial enrollment of 29 pupils.

Mrs. Carmon Welch, Mrs. Vera Manard, Mrs. Todd, Mrs. Ruth Goodwin, Mrs. Mike Bird and Mrs. Bursley made the drapes.

A new storage cabinet has been made by Mr. Welch for the science laboratory. A planter has been made in front of the trophy case, and the wall next to the boys' rest room has been paneled. Other improvements include new tables for the V. A. class room, and a refrigerator for the science room.

A potato peeler, a vegetable shredder, a deep freeze, an ice tea dispenser, a deep fry, and a cutlery dispenser have been installed in the cafeteria.

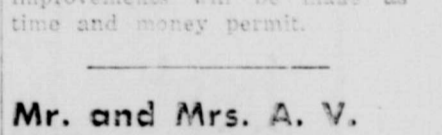
Ten new typewriters have been purchased by the board for the commercial department, and a new sewing machine has been received by the homemaking department.

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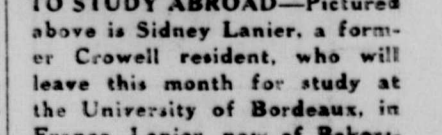

Austin, Tex.—Initial post-convention plans and strategy mapped by President Johnson for the November general election campaign will bear a "made in Texas" label. "Made in Austin, Texas" would be more specific, for much of it will originate here.

The President, his nomination as the Democratic party's standard bearer secured, hurried home to his ranch to rest up and do some thinking.

His visit attracted greater interest than any since his first as president, during the Christmas-New Year season.

With Vice Presidential Nominee Hubert Humphrey as his guest at the ranch, private talks inevitably turned to the battles ahead.

Gillespie County Democrats welcomed the President back to his home county with a Hill Country-style birthday celebration and barbecue two days after his 50th birthday.

**OPERATION MOTORCIDE** — Col. Homer Garrison Jr., Head of the State Department of Public Safety, announced that "Operation Motorcide," the grim tabulation of Labor Day week end traffic deaths as they occur, will go into effect Saturday (Sept. 5) at 12:01 a. m.

Garrison said his department estimates 36 persons will be killed on streets and highways during the 72 hours from the beginning of "Operation Motorcide" to 11:59 p. m. Monday.

But he said the prediction won't come true if all drivers make certain both themselves and their vehicles are in excellent condition, and if they use "caution, court-

esy and good sense" at all times while at the wheel.

**EDUCATION REPORT BEATS DEADLINE**—Gov. John Connally's Committee on Education Beyond the High School has completed its report and recommendations for excellence in Texas colleges and universities.

The 64-page report, recommending doubling of higher education expenditures within the decade and placing of all institutions under a strong coordinating board, has been delivered to the governor.

**REDISTRICTING HEARINGS TO WIND UP** — Congressional redistricting hearings conducted by a Texas Legislative Council Committee will wind up here next month.

Meetings already have been held in Fort Worth, Dallas, Houston, San Antonio, Lubbock and Tyler.

Committee chairman, Sen. Geo. Moffett of Chillicothe, said the group has "many suggestions" for redistricting.

Its big job now is to mold them together and come up with a reasonable plan or set of plans for legislative consideration, thus carving the state into 23 congressional districts as nearly as possible equal in population.

**Chances Are Slim**

The chances of finding natural gas in previously unexplored areas of this country are slim, according to the American Gas Association. Nine out of every 10 wildcat wells drilled in such regions fail to produce either gas or oil. Even in producing fields, drillers fail to find gas in one out of every three new wells.

able for the payments," Dr. Townsend said. "The directors hope that the Lelia Lake Creek project will provide enough water for the needs of the towns and the communities, but it is possible that it will not. If that is the case, these communities may have to wait until the completion of the dam on the Salt Fork of the Red River." Besides Childress and Quanah, other cities in the Greenbelt are Crowell, Clarendon and Hedley. The Lelia Lake Creek project will be located northeast of Clarendon and north of Lelia Lake. "If there is water available above the demands of these two towns (Childress and Quanah), it will be made available to the communities and landowners. Our business is to sell water," Townsend said. A contract similar to that signed by the member cities in the Greenbelt is expected to be signed with the RRVA. Townsend appointed two committees at the meeting. Named to the investment committee were Carrol Knorpp of Clarendon, chairman; Roland Walden of Quanah and Merl Kincaid of Crowell. The by-laws committee will have Clifford Johnson of Hedley as chairman with members Wendel Harrison of Memphis and George Shadid of Wellington.

Friday morning, Dr. Townsend announced he had received notices from the Texas Water Commission in Austin certifying the Lelia Lake Creek project was feasible. Townsend, president, "but we will wholesale the water to the Red River Valley Authority." The RRVA owns and operates the water system in Estelline. Carey residents are expected to continue purchasing of water from the city of Childress. With the Bible**

Not Always That Bad!

Have you ever heard the story  
of Honus? Honus was a wicked  
old renegade who lived in a small  
country town. When he died his  
body lay in the funeral parlor for  
three days without any one even  
taking notice. Finally, on the day  
of the burial, a few of his old  
cronies did stop by to at least pay

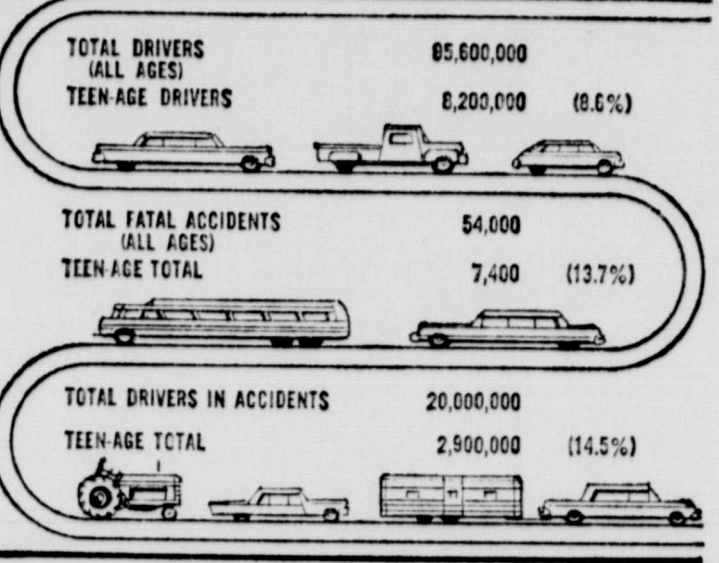

**4-H drivers  
aim to curb teen-age accidents**



Motor vehicle accidents are the leading cause of death among persons under 25. Young drivers have the highest accident and death rate of any other driver age group. These appalling statistics are the concern of 4-H boys and girls enrolled in the National 4-H Automotive program conducted by the Cooperative Extension Service.

**September Plentiful Foods Offer Meat, Fruit, Vegetables**

Three choices of meat, a selection of vegetables and a fruit are your plentiful foods selection for September, according to the Texas Extension Service.

The list, prepared by the Agricultural Marketing Service, features beef, fresh prunes, broilers, turkey, and late-summer vegetables.

Although beef production in recent weeks has been somewhat below record levels set earlier this year, beef is still in big supply. And consumer prices continue attractive. Since September is "Better Breakfast Month," try serving steak for breakfast.

Another good breakfast item is fresh Italian prunes. Almost half again as many prunes will be available as were produced last year. Oregon, one of the three big prune-producing states, is predicting a crop three times as large as in 1963. Tart fresh prunes are just the thing for sleepy back-to-schoolers.

Look for a wide variety of fresh vegetables during September. Tomatoes, onions, lettuce, snap beans and cabbage likely will be plentiful in most markets. There'll be a good supply of other vegetables, too.

An estimated five per cent more broiler-fryers coming to market over a year ago should put attractive consumer prices in prospect for September. Prices last September were the second lowest on record.

Turkey, too, will be abundant. Mid-summer marketings ran 18 per cent higher than a year earlier; refrigerated holdings are about the same. And ready-to-cook turkey prices encourage frequent use.

From the News . . .  
**THIRTY YEARS AGO**

News items below were taken from the Thursday, Sept. 6, 1934, issue of The Foard County News:

Preparation is being made to begin buying sheep and goats in Foard County in the government's program. Before any animal can be purchased, all owners must list the number of sheep at the county agent's office that they will have to sell.

The possibility of reviving interest in building a large dam on Pease River at a point about ten miles northwest of Crowell was revived Monday at a meeting in Electra of representatives from the chambers of commerce of Vernon, Quanah and Electra, and W. D. McFarlane of Graham, Congressman from this district.

Decision to complete Texas Company's No. 5 L. K. Johnson oil well at a depth of 3,626 feet was reached this week after a test revealed that the well was flowing 850 barrels of oil per day.

Up to Wednesday afternoon, 2,091 head of Foard County cattle had been purchased by the government in its drought relief program. The total number of cattle condemned and shot out of the above number amounted to 960.

The annual session of the Northwest Brazos Association of the Free Will Baptists came to a close at Good Creek Sunday after opening there last Thursday. Claytonville will be the scene of the annual meeting next year. Rev. H. H. Haston of Chalk was re-elected moderator of the association.

An appeal to farmers of Foard County for their help and cooperation in dealing with the unemployment situation which exists in this county is being made by Bryan O'Connell, administrator of direct relief in Foard County and the County Board of Welfare and Employment.

Bud Minyard returned Wednesday from Abilene where he had been pulling bells.

**1964 Apple Crop Starts Arriving at Food Markets**

Vanguard shipments of the 1964 apple crop are already available at many markets.

Most of them are summer varieties like Starr, Gravensteins, Lodi, early Delicious and Transport, reports the Agricultural Marketing Service.

This year, as a result of better-keeping fruit and improved storage, apples are available all year long. As the new crop begins to arrive, there's still a fair supply of Winesaps from last year's harvest.

Indications are that the 1964 crop of apples is going to be a big one. If mid-summer predictions of the U. S. Department of Agriculture materialize, there'll be more apples than any year since 1937. The estimate of 144.5 million bushels is 15 per cent more than last year, and 18 per cent more than average.

Most apple-producing states will share in the increase. And of the five major commercial apple states—Washington, New York, Michigan, Virginia and California, that normally account for 62 per cent of the crop—only Washington prospects are down.

**Hunters Get Manners Tip from Watson**

Hunters got a friendly warning from J. Weldon Watson, executive director of the Parks and Wildlife Department, that their manners on location often times goes a long way toward landowners' reactions.

"Plus the age-old problem of gates left open, fences torn down, fields set afire, and livestock endangered," said Watson, "we now have a new and more poisonous plague. This is the 1964-model litterbug who has become the scourge of all civilization."

"We all know about the litterbug. Some of us unknowingly close the door to being invited back. Because a farmer or rancher, beset by nature's assorted problems, seldom has any patience left when he finds that hunters have scattered refuse all over his place and have generally desecrated the landscape."

Watson said he had received reports that some landowners in the Rio Grande Valley had become so annoyed by the expense of cleaning up after white-winged dove hunters that they are considering putting up 'posted' signs for the first time.

The executive director, blaming much of the trouble on "plain unthinking carelessness," admonished hunters to "set up their own rules of conduct and just act like they were hunting on their own land."

"And," he concluded, "the old head in the hunting business knows best that after you have been the perfect gentleman afield share your game bag with the landowner. And be sure that you pick his birds first, so that little extra tribute of gratitude definitely will be taken care of."

**More Emphasis on Merchandising Some Beef Cuts**

Little change in retail beef prices is noted from those of the past several weeks, yet greater emphasis is being placed on merchandising of less popular and longer-cooking beef cuts.

These less-popular, longer-cooking beef cuts are appearing at really low prices, says Mrs. Gwen Clyatt, Extension Service consumer marketing specialist.

Some of these cuts are from overweight cattle and contain more fat than many homemakers are willing to buy unless the price makes a substantial difference.

Retail pork prices also remain at about the same level as the past several weeks. Ribs and hams are the more popular pork items, and bacon is another favorite.

Turkey, which is down a cent or two a pound this month, makes up into delicious barbecue. Consumers can find the size they want with ease, whether it's a whole turkey, a small turkey, or part of a big turkey. Cooked turkey pieces also can be marinated in one's favorite sauce, then heated throughout. It can be put on skewers for quick turkey kabobs.

Elberta and other types of processing peaches are now on the market. Green apples, plums, bananas, white and red grapes, limes and lemons also are good fruit choices.

**Mexicans Want Screwworm Program in Their Country**

Ranchers from Mexico, after touring the screwworm eradication headquarters at Mission early in August, expressed the hope that their country would soon be included in an expanded eradication program.

Indication that a cooperative program between the United States and Mexico is a strong possibility was evident from the announcement that the groundwork is being laid for a study of the economic and technical feasibility of eradicating screwworms from Mexico. This study would also supply valuable data on the severity of the screwworm problem in Mexico that would be necessary for conducting an eradication project.

The ranchers were visibly impressed with the operations of the facilities near Mission where more than 100 million screwworm flies are reared and sexually sterilized through exposure to gamma radiation each week. Dispersed by airplanes over screwworm-infested land areas, these flies mate with native, fertile flies and prevent production of offspring.

More than two-thirds of the flies are being released in northern Mexico to keep fertile flies from migrating into the United States and reinfesting areas freed from the pest. While this is chiefly a protective measure for the U. S. livestock industry, ranchers in northern Mexico report considerable reduction in their own screwworm problems.

The leaders of the Mexican delegation, Dr. Oscar Valdes Ornelas, secretary of agriculture for livestock, and Octavio Ochoa y Ochoa, president of the Mexican National Livestock Confederation, enthusiastically endorsed the program and urged the governments of both countries to proceed with action that would lead to expansion of the campaign to include all of Mexico.

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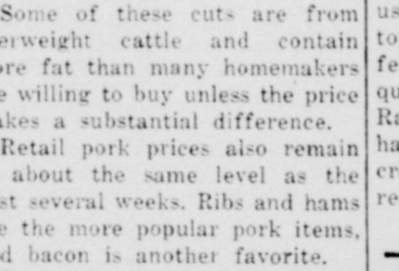
