



Indications are that the 1964 crop of apples is going to be a big one. If mid-summer predictions of the U.S. Department of Agriculture materialize, there'll be more apples than any year since 1937. The estimate of 144.5 million bushels is 15 per cent more than last year, and 18 per

cent more than average. Most apple-producing states wil share in the increase. And of the five major commercial apple states -Washington, New York, Michigan, Virginia and California, that normally account for 62 per cent of the crop-only Washington prospects are down.


