## PEACE CORPS SENDS TEACHERS TO ECUADOR

Mr. and Mrs. John Herbert Wyss, who have been visiting her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Moody Burnham, in Crowell, and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Albert E. Wyss of Dallas, left late last week for Ecuador as two of 47 Peace Corps teachers.

The volunteers will teach in universities as well as secondary and vocational schools throughout the country. More than 100 Peace Corpsmen are now in Ecuador assisting programs of agricultural extension, community development and education.

The main problem in education is a lack of qualified instructors. To help alleviate this shortage, the Ecuadorian government has requested Peace Corps teachers.

Volunteers in universities will teach in most major departments. Those in secondary schools will instruct in mathematics, science and English. Volunteers teaching in rural areas will assist in community development projects after classroom hours.

The volunteers recently completed ten weeks of intensive training at the University of California at Los Angeles. The program concentrated on the Spanish language, teaching methods, Ecuador's history and culture, U. S. history and institutions and world affairs. The group received three weeks of field training at the Peace Corps' camp in Puerto Rico.

Some 10,000 Americans are now serving as Peace Corps volunteers in 46 nations of Asia, Africa and Latin America. More volunteers are needed; requests for them pour into the Washington office daily.

Peace Corps officials report that 5,000 new volunteers are being trained this summer and fall. Applicants interested in late fall or subsequent training are urged to complete Peace Corps' questionnaire (available at the local post office) and take the Corps' placement test, given the second Saturday of each month wherever federal service examinations are held.

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## News About Our Men in Service

Cocoa Beach, Fla. — Captain Carlton R. Damonte, son-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. Lewis Painter of Black, is the first member of the Air Force's Air Rescue Service (ARS) to qualify as an instructor pilot in Sikorsky's CH13C twin turbine helicopter.

Captain Damonte, assigned to Patrick AFB, Fla., completed more than 100 hours—including night and instrument flying time in the aircraft—to meet the requirements.

His ARS unit at Patrick is part of an Air Force global search and rescue network for downed aircraft, recovery of astronauts, and assistance during disasters.

He entered the Air Force in August 1956 and was commissioned through the aviation cadet program.

## Foard Highway Dept. Employees Receive Award

A Certificate of Merit was presented to Herbert W. Edmondson and the men working under his supervision for conscientious recognition of their personal responsibility for the prevention of accidents, who have completed 10,463 days without a lost-time accident. Mr. Edmondson is the Texas Highway Department Maintenance Construction Foreman for Foard County.

The presentation was made Oct. 8 by Raymond Long, who represented the Texas Highway Department District Headquarters in Childress.

The award was presented in conjunction with other activities throughout the state in recognition of Highway Week, Oct. 4-10. D. C. Greer, State Highway Engineer, and V. J. McGee, District Engineer.

"Mr. Edmondson and these employees under his supervision," said Mr. Long, "made a great contribution in making a reality the Highway Week slogan, 'Mobility—Our Fifth Freedom'."

## Texas Natural Gas Co. President Died in Fort Worth

H. D. Culbertson, president of the Texas Natural Gas Co. of Crowell, died in Fort Worth following a lengthy illness.

Culbertson, 81, had been in the oil business since 1917. He had lived in Fort Worth for more than 30 years. At the time of his death, he was also president of Corvete Oil Corp. He and his wife celebrated their golden wedding anniversary Sept. 30 of this year.

Survivors include his wife; one daughter, Mrs. Harry Sneed of Wichita Falls; three sons, Bill, Rex and Robert Culbertson, all of Fort Worth, and nine grandchildren.

The Crowell High School football team took its second victory in as many conference starts last Friday night as they defeated the Paducah Dragons 16-0 at Wildcat stadium.

Quarterback Dan Mike Bird led the Wildcat attack and kept the Dragons off guard with his ball handling and passing.

The Wildcats scored early in the first quarter by driving 68 yards with halfback Mike Payne carrying the final five yards for the score. Bird set up the tally with a 20-yard run. Fullback Lee Looney carried for the two extra points.

Bird put the finishing touches on a 60-yard Crowell drive in the second quarter as he raced 22 yards around left end for the tally. He also added the extra points.

Paducah threatened the Wildcats with penetrations inside the 20-yard line first, but was unable to score despite the efforts of Dragon tailback Gary Moran. Moran picked up most of Paducah's yardage on the ground and also connected with five of 11 passes.

Defensive standouts for Crowell were Don Ray Borchardt and Bird. Ronnie Mints of Paducah also played an outstanding defensive game.

The Wildcats rolled for 312 yards on the ground and added 40 more in the air. The Wildcats also intercepted two Paducah tosses.

Paducah lost the ball twice by fumbles while the Wildcats gave up the ball once due to a fumble. Crowell was penalized nine times for 77 yards while Paducah drew four penalties for 20 yards. Crowell led in first downs 13 to 11.

**EDITORIAL**  
**This Is National School Lunch Week**

"School Lunch Serves Youth" is the theme of the 1964 "National School Lunch Week," observed from October 11-17 by a proclamation of President Lyndon B. Johnson. The purpose of the observation is "to promote public understanding of the school lunch program to the child, to the home, to the farm, to the nation."

The need for national action originated during World War II when 155,000 men failed the physical examination because of deficiencies traceable to poor diet. The school lunch program, sponsored by the government, became

a reality by the passage of the "National School Lunch Act" in 1946.

Today there are 68,500 schools that participate in the program. The total expenditure for food last year was \$876 million. Of this amount, the national government paid \$188 million; the local schools \$688 million. The lunch provides each child with one-third to one-half of his daily nutritional requirements designated as follows: two ounces of high protein food, three-fourths cup of two vegetables or fruits, two teaspoons of margarine, one-half pint of fluid milk, and bread.

In addition to the money spent last year for food, the schools spent over \$500 million for the purchase of equipment and facilities to operate the lunch rooms. Our local school lunch program is also "big business." The average number of students eating at the cafeteria is about 235. To serve this number, it takes approximately 100 pounds of potatoes, 48 chickens, 100 pounds of ham or roast, 44 dozen rolls, 45 plate pies. Milk is bought by many pupils who do not eat the lunch; also, some drink more than one carton. In fact, on last Monday, 548 half-pints of milk were served.

We are glad that CHS operates as a part of the National School Lunch Program.

**Students Attend T. I. L. Clinic**

Seven sleepy people left at 5 a. m. Saturday on their way to a clinic for all interscholastic events held at TCU in Fort Worth. The students interested in debate heard the affirmative and negative

views on the subject: Resolved, That Nuclear Weapons Should Be Controlled by an International Organization. Poetry and prose reading, number sense, as well as persuasive and extemporaneous speaking were also of interest to some of the students.

The journalism workshop was very interesting. Carlton Wilson of United Press International was the speaker. He told of the coverage of the assassination of President Kennedy and of reporter Meriman Smith's Pulitzer Prize winning book, "Four Days." The six students that attended the clinic feel that they learned a great deal that will help them later. Those going were Ken Ferguson, Otis Smith, Seth Halbert, Gayle Smith, Evelyn Fiske, Vicki Spikes. They were accompanied by their sponsor, Mrs. Burse.

**Peace Corps Workers Speak to Spanish Class**

"It will be a challenge," said ex-student Sue Burse Wyss as she and her husband talked to the Spanish Club on Oct. 5 in regard to their going to Ecuador for two years as members of the Peace Corps. They have recently completed ten weeks in UCLA and three weeks in Puerto Rico in training for the important mission of "helping the people of Ecuador help themselves." Arriving in Quito, capital of Ecuador, they will be assigned a particular place where Sue will teach English; John, biology and chemistry. They will have to face many difficulties and inconveniences. Every drop of water must be boiled, and they will probably have to use wood stoves for cooking.

They must live on the level of the natives; they must mix with them even accepting invitations to visit in their homes and to eat with them even though the native food often is unclean and may cause illnesses.

The Spanish Club wishes to thank John and Sue for their very interesting talk and also to wish them an exciting two years in Ecuador.

**No Ill Effects Seen from Charcoal Broiling**

No ill effect resulting from charcoal-broiled food have been reported in man, according to a spokesman of the American Medical Association Council on Foods and Nutrition.  
 Dr. Philip L. White, secretary for the AMA Council, made the announcement.  
 Smoke which arises when drippings hit live charcoal used in outdoor grills is primarily from incompletely combusted fat, he explained.  
 "It is called thermal decomposition because fats begin to break down at temperatures under those required for ignition. The same thing happens when frying fat begins to smoke when overheated," he explained.  
 To assure a more pleasant at-

mosphere when barbecuing, it is well to avoid the possibility of fat combustion as much as possible, he added.

Dr. White explained that the National Livestock and Meat Board recommends that meat be cooked by the heat from the coals, and not from fire.

## Enumerators Are Needed to Work on Agriculture Census

Applicants for the position of enumerator for the 1964 Census of Agriculture in Foard County are being sought. A. H. Keever, manager of the Texas Employment Commission in Vernon announced Tuesday. Persons interested in working temporarily for the U. S. Bureau of the Census on the farm census should apply to the TEC representative who will be at the county court room in Crowell on October 19 between the hours of 1 p. m. and 3 p. m. The job will provide about three weeks of temporary employment. Pay rates are designed to provide earnings of \$10-\$16 daily.

Qualifications for appointment as an enumerator include: U. S. citizenship, age of at least 18 years, high school education or its equivalent, availability of car for use in enumeration, good physical condition for driving, walking, and standing, financial support through period of employment (wages are paid at the conclusion of the enumeration), ability to write clearly and neatly, pass a written examination.

In addition to piece-work pay, enumerators receive 8 cents a mile for use of their cars.

The job involves locating each farm and ranch in the district assigned to him (or her), determine if the operator of the farm has answered all questions on a questionnaire that will be mailed to the farm by the Census Bureau, help the farmer complete any unanswered questions on the form, check answers for accuracy, and deliver the form to the Census Bureau.

Under the supervision of the crew leader, census enumerators will be asked to complete 12 to 16 hours of self study at their homes. They will receive a fee of \$23 for the satisfactory completion of the self study course. The crew leader will assist the enumerator during the first half day worked at census taking.

Shoulder and round steaks are the most economical. Pork values include smoked hams and picnics, shoulder roasts and pork liver. 
