Arsenic Controls Bermudagrass Turf

Purple nutsedge, commonly called nutgrass, can now be controlled by herbicides containing organic arsenic compounds, reports Joe Burkett, county agent.

Nutgrass is a serious problem in bermuda grass, a grass used for turf on home lawns, athletic fields and other sites, says Burkett. Its extensive underground tuber system makes nutsedge extremely difficult to control.

Research has found nutgrass shoots sensitive to arsenic herbicides. Burkett points out, while bermuda grass is tolerant to these compounds. Thus, selective control of nutgrass is possible with several of the methylarsonate formulations, a primary one being disodium methylarsonate.

A 60-100 per cent concentrate solution should be used, says Burkett. Three to five ounces of the formulation in two to four gallons of water per 1,000 square feet s usually sufficient.

Several applications of the herbicide are necessary, says Burkett, because of numerous shoot buds on each underground tuber and numerous dormant tubers which are activated when other tubers in the same system are killed. Lateral translocation of the arsenic in the tuber system does not kill dormant tubers, explains Burkett. Applications should be repeated

often as three to five times. Aside from eliminating nutgrass from a bermuda grass turf, arsenic compounds also serve as an effective control of crab grass,

whenever new shoots appear, Bur-

kett points out, which may be as

Burkett adds. However, it should be remembered, warns Burkett, that St. Augustine grass is highly susceptible to these compounds and, therefore, such treatment should

be avoided.


