





From the News . . .

YEARS AGO

News items below were taken from the Thursday, May 9, 1935, issue of The Foard County News:

The finest rain to cover Foard County in many weeks started falling last Friday night and before it stopped late Saturday night, it had averaged around two inches over the entire county. The official measurement of the downfall at Crowell was 2.41 inches.

George Moffett of Chillicothe, state representative from this district, has been successful in getting a constitutional amendment submitted to the people, which will limit the number of representatives that any one county may have to seven, if the people vote to adopt it.

"Texas Spring," a May fete, will be given by the primary and ntermediate departments of the Crowell grammar school as the annual Spring program and seventh grade graduation exercises Wednesday afternoon, May 15, at 5 o'clock. The football field is to be the scene of this year's pro-

In an official notice elsewhere in this issue of the News, the county attorney warns that the operation of devices known as marble machines has been held unlawful by the attorney general's department, and that whoever keeps such machines is subject to prosecution.


