large pastures by fencing to rotate grazing. Their cropland will be terraced with outlets going into a 7-acre grassed waterway and crops planted will be to improve soil fertility. Twenty-eight acres of less desirable cropland will be seeded to native grasses. Henry and Hub have begun work which will treat each acre according to its needs. As each acre is adequately treated, it affects both the farmer and the community by keeping ponds and lakes from filling with silt, homes from becoming dusty, and also lowers crops that are in surplus.

Wheat harvest in the Truscott area is slightly above average, manager of the Farmers Co-Op. Lengthy liness Elevator at Truscott, despite the dry winter.



48,000 Americans Died in Traffic Accidents in 1965

In 1962 highways deaths topped the 40,000 mark. As 1965 gets underway the 50,000 mark is not far away. In 1964 America's highways were stained with the blood of 48,000 persons.

Tragedy did not stop with the deaths, but added 3,840,000 persons to the injured list, accord ing to The Travelers Insurance Companies which has completed a survey of statistics from state motor vehicle departments. Four million copies of The Travelers report are distributed annually.

Adverse weather was not ar important contributing factor. Records show that 90 per cent of the fatal crashes occurred or clear days and on dry roads. The remaining 10 per cent occurred in fog, rain and snowy weather.

Excessive speed continues to hold top spot in the list of acci dent causes, with driving on the BIG MIKE wrong side of the road and reck less driving taking second and third places respectively. Pedestrians were at fault in many of the fatal accidents, with crossing between intersections being the top killer.

Youthful drivers hold the greatest responsibility in the highway 7.7 per cent of the 1964 fatalities. They represent about 7 per cent of the driving population.







> But a closer look at the dominant sources of demand for agricultural lands may help explain the situation, the specialist added. First, he said, the average net farm income can be misleading. Many farmers and ranchers receive a far greater return than the average indicates. This group is capable of adjusting rapidly to incorporate technological advances and financially able to bid up the price of land to gain a larger economic sized unit. The strong demand for strictly agricultural land comes almost entirely from this group, Andrews said.

> Another important source of demand for agricultural land is from industry and urban developments. In many areas of Texas, industry is expanding and using large acreages of agricultural land and pushing prices upward. Urban centers are spreading out and taking up more and more land and highways are also takng their share, the specialist said. These intensive uses of land exert great influence on land prices, the study noted.

A third important source of demand comes from urban dwellers. These buyers are interested in using land for agricultural purposes as well as farm homes, week end farms and for recreation.

These demand sources for land are the dominant forces in the Texas land market and are not expected to change in the near future, Andrews concluded.


