Paving bricks were laid by hand by men called "bricksetters." A skilled bricksetter could lay bricks at what seemed like a miraculous

speed. Some could lay more than 500 feet of 20-foot-wide pavement a day. They were paid 50 cents an hour-twice as much as the men who assisted them. The bricks were not the same as those used for buildings. They were longer

and thinner, more like tile. If the Interstate system in Texas-3,029 miles-was being built by the bricklaying system, the completion date probably would be no earlier than the year 1996, or perhaps even past the year 2000. The Interstate goal is 1972, and Texas is right on schedule.

These voluntary taxpayers reported some \$15,439,451,-000 in adjusted gross income. The biggest part of this-some \$12,-237,916,000-came from salaries and wages. On a nationwide basis, some 99

million Americans signed tax returns, showing an adjusted gross income of \$348,706,728,000 some 283 billion of this also came from salary and wages.
