

Grim reminders of the recent hunting season when ten of 21 reational tragedies.

Reports correlated by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department in its safety education routine show that:

A 16-year-old Beaumont boy was killed when a 16-year-old companion accidentally discharged a 20 gauge shotgun while they

An 11-year-old Lufkin girl was seriously wounded by her 10-yearold brother when he accidentally discharged a .22 rifle while they

A 17-year-old San Antonio boy was wounded by a .22 rifle while hunting with another 17-year-old;

An 18-year-old Groves boy said man while they were hunting rabbits but he was charged with murder after an investigation;

A 15-year-old Houston boy Lake Houston;

Two 14-year-old Lampasas County boys died of carbon monoxide poisoning while in their car during a hunting trip near Kempner.

In the other recreational fatality reported to the Department, a 42-year-old Dallas man fell from a tree while coon hunting and landed on his head.

Game Warden Bill Works of Eldorado reported a belated nearmiss about a late season deer hunter deep in the remote Val Verde County ranch country. He unloaded his rifle with the muzzle pointed at his pickup motor. One round discharged, blitzing the ignition distributor and requiring the shaken hunter to hike eight miles for help.

Dip in Economy **Is Forecast**




