



# **Chevrolets Give Fuel Economy in** 1966 Mobil Run

Chevrolet has staked out a laim for superior fuel economy on the results of the 1966 annual Mobil Economy Run.

Full-sized Chevrolets won classes "E" and "F" for standard-sized cars with six and eightcylinder engines, respectively, and won a second place in class "F" as well.

In class "A" where compact six-cylinder cars competed, a Corvair Monza finished third overall, getting 23.25 miles per gallon on the 3,300-mile trip from Los Angeles to Boston. A six-cylinder Biscayne piloted

by a mother-daughter team, Pat and Pam Sawyer, Hemet, Calif., won class "E" with an average of 21.04 miles per gallon.

In class "F" the winner was a Chevrolet Impala with 327 cu. in. V-8 engine in which Ron Royer, Encino, Calif., averaged 19.87 miles per gallon. Second place winner was Paul Prior, Troy, Mich., who averaged 18.68 miles per gallon in a Chevrolet Caprice with a 396 cu. in. V-8 engine.



#### **Hunting Leases** in Texas Bring in \$13 Million in 1965

Landowners in Texas leased their land to hunters for over \$13 million in 1965, according to a state summary released by Wallace Klussmann, Extension spec-

The report, compiled by Klussmann from information supplied by county agents, said approximately 21,000 landowners leased 33 million acres for all types of hunting in '65. The income from hunting leases was up \$1 million from 1964.

Over sixteen thousand of the leases were for deer hunting. The state average charge for annual leases for deer hunting was 46 cents an acre. In the Edwards Plateau area, average charge was 80 cents an acre.

For day leases, the state average return was \$1.10 per acre. Klussmann points out the day method of leasing is not necessarily more profitable, since increased labor and other costs are in-



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


