The Crowell Riding Club's trail ride to the Paducah rodeo will begin at 8 a. m. on Thursday, April 21, when the group will leave from the court house.

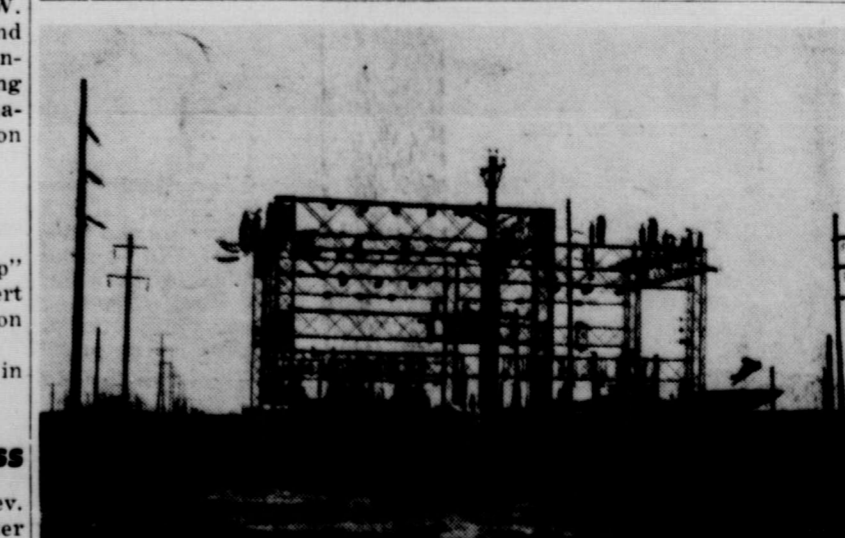

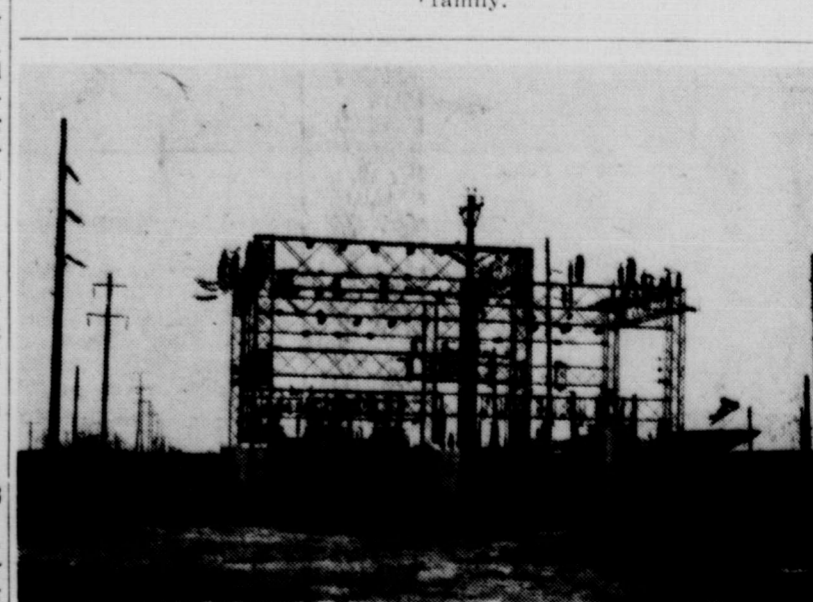

ers are assured adequate in-

Dechant advised the Secretary of Agriculture that "if he is to expand the economic base of rural America, to start by giving priority on increasing prices of income to the farmer. As a practical matter, this is the first basic step in the economic development of rural America."

 Returns for ADP**

Dallas—The automatic data processing of 1940 and 1940A returns for 1965 started on January 1, 1966, in the Internal Revenue Service's Southwest Region, according to Ellis Campbell Jr., District Director for IRS in northern Texas.

Mr. Campbell says the percentage of errors can be reduced if all taxpayers will see to it they file accurate and complete returns.

Be sure that you report your social security number correctly. It should be compared with your social security account card. Sometimes it is easy to transpose figures, thereby causing errors. All taxpayers should read carefully the instructions in the returns package mailed to them and mathematical computations should be checked for accuracy.

A final check should always be made to assure that the return is properly signed. If a joint return is filed, both signatures must be shown. All data in the return must be legible.

Automatic Data Processing of tax returns demands that accurate information be introduced into the system.
