## Summer Reading Course to Be Held Again This Year

The Foard County Library will present another summer reading course this year. Young people will be able to earn reading certificates by reading 12 books from the library and listing them on their reading logs. Pre-schoolers can earn certificates by listening to books read to them by their mothers.

Mothers are again reminded that reading readiness for children attending first grade in September is in the hands of the mothers. Teachers say they can tell within the first week of school which children have been read to at home.

Children whose mothers have read to them know how to handle books, feel that reading is fun and desirable instead of a necessary evil, and know how to sit quietly and listen.

Many inexpensive books are available locally, at not much more than the price of a funny book. But few families can afford all the books young children would like, so membership in the library, only \$1.00 per family for a year, helps put dozens of "child tested" titles within the budget of young families.

Young children will laugh at "The Cat in the Hat," "Put Me in the Zoo" and "Go, Dog, Go" and others in the beginner book series, and ask for them again and again, not realizing that the texts are painlessly introducing them to the alphabet, colors and such ideas as up, down, in, over, under, etc.

According to librarians, you are doing more than entertaining your child when you read to him, you are getting him ready to read to himself and helping him to associate reading with a feeling of love and happiness. Reading is the basis of all formal education and mothers who help their children to like reading are giving them a priceless gift.

## Cotton Seedling Diseases More Likely to Affect Cotton Planted Too Early

Cotton seedling diseases are more likely to effect cotton which is planted too early when the soil temperature is too cold or when the soil is too wet, says Joe Burkett, County Agent.

The soil temperature for best seed germination and the least chance for seedlings diseases to develop is between 65-70 degrees Fahrenheit taken at an eight-inch depth between 7 and 8 a. m. Before planting the soil temperature should average at least 65 degrees for ten days.

## May Vote to Be Held on Cotton Allotment Transfer

Cotton farmers in Foard County will vote this month to decide whether they want to be able to sell or lease their cotton allotments outside the county, Ray Hysinger, chairman of the county ASCS committee, has announced. The referendum on the question will be conducted by mail during the period of May 16 through 25. Ballots may also be delivered by hand to the ASCS county office.

The only question to be decided by the balloting is whether upland cotton allotments may be transferred during the next three years to other farms outside the county which are owned or controlled by someone else. Such transfers may be made by sale or by lease. In no case may transfers be made outside the state. An affirmative vote by at least two-thirds of the county's cotton farmers who vote will permit such transfers for the next three upland cotton crops, 1967-69.

A referendum on the same question was conducted last fall throughout the Cotton Belt, and growers in 349 counties at that time approved the allotment transfers. The vote this May will be held only in counties which disapproved such transfers in last fall's vote.

iod, insect control can be made more effective and possibly less expensive. Production costs can be lowered and there is also a possibility of cutting down on one generation of weevils.

The ginning season will be shortened with a possible higher percentage turn-out in grade and staple. Due to the shorter ginning season, labor and operating costs would be cut for the gins.

## Survey in Foard County

In a survey conducted in Foard County in March in which 103 cotton farmers took part, 91 per cent voted on May 23 to June 14 as the best delayed uniform planting date for dryland cotton in Foard County.

Irrigated farmers were not polled, but irrigated cotton would need to be planted earlier because it takes a longer growing season for it to mature to its full potential of production. In Wilbarger County, the date preferred by growers of irrigated cotton is May 15-25.

Weevil surveys taken in the east part of Foard County late in February showed a high infestation of overwintering bollweevils in several areas. They were especially high around shelter belts, cottonwood, chinaberry, waterways and drainage ditches.

A uniform planting date is just one of the practices that cotton farmers can use to increase profit from cotton. Burkett cautions that they should not neglect good management practices and proper land preparation along with the use of commercial fertilizers where needed.

## Two Demonstrations

The County Agent, in cooperation with Dr. Jim Mulkey, Superintendent of the Chillicothe Experiment Station of Texas A&M University, have established two commercial fertilizer demonstrations northwest of Thalia. One is located on Ira Tole's farm and the other is on Antone Kajs' farm. Fourteen different rates and combinations on nitrogen, phosphorous and potassium fertilizers were used in each demonstration. Each of these rates and combinations were repeated four times in each demonstration. Later in the year these plots will be marked showing the different rates and combinations of fertilizer used so that cotton farmers can observe them. When the cotton is harvested the yield will be figured for each rate and combination of fertilizer and the results made available to those who want it.

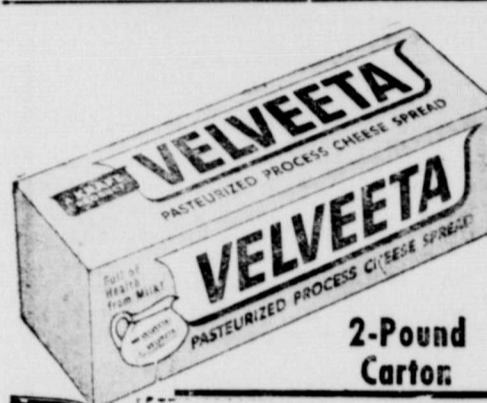




