Graveside Rites for Well Roy Held Last Friday

Former Crowell resident died in Amarillo May 11

Well Roy, 64, long-time resident of Crowell, died in Amarillo Friday, May 11. Funeral services were held in San Jacinto Methodist Church in Amarillo at 10 a. m. Friday, May 13, conducted by the pastor, Rev. Woodcock. Graveside rites were at the Crowell Cemetery at 10 a. m. Friday conducted by Merriel H. Abbott, Crowell Methodist pastor.

Funeral arrangements were in charge of the Griggs Funeral Home of Amarillo and Womack Funeral Home of Crowell.

Bearers were Bob Carroll, Owens, Walter Thomson, H. Milton, Ralph Hinkamp and Marjorie.

Roy was born August 3, 1901, in Arlington. He spent his childhood in Farmersville, Texas, and August 15, 1929, he and Marion Cooper of Crowell were united in marriage. They lived in Crowell until 1942 when they moved to Amarillo. His wife died in death on Oct. 1962. Due to ill health, he left his job at First National Bank in Amarillo in 1964.

He continued to make his home at city until his death. In 1947, Mr. Roy joined the San Jacinto Methodist Church in Amarillo, and he and his wife continued to be active in the church as their health permitted.

He served as a Sunday School teacher and a member of the board.

He is survived by three brothers, R. Roy of Fort Worth, Roy and O. B. Roy of Dallas, and several nieces and nephews, and a host of other relatives and friends.

1965-1966 SCHOOL TERM TO END ON MAY 19

The 1965-1966 school year will end on Thursday, May 19, at 3:30 p. m. The teachers will return to work to average and to record. The commencement exercises will be the final activity which will be held at the high school auditorium on Friday, May 20, at 8 p. m.

Next Term Begins August 27
The 1966-1967 school year will open on August 27th with a faculty meeting at 7 a. m. School will be in session from 8:30 until 11 a. m. for the purpose of issuing books and making assignments. The 1966 school year runs from August 29, 1966, through May 19, 1967, with the following holidays: Nov. 24-25, Thanksgiving; Dec. 22-Jan. 3, Christmas; and March 24-27, Easter. Farmers Elevator Has Annual Meet Last Saturday

Over fifty members of the Farmers Co-Op. Elevator Association attended the annual meeting of the organization Saturday afternoon at the community center.

Virgil Johnson, president, was in charge of the meeting, and Newell Hofmann, secretary, read the minutes of the annual meeting last year.

The auditor's report was given by Borden Duffie of Abilene.

Homer Johnson, manager, told the group about the used petroleum tank the association had installed at its Thalia facility to handle wet wheat.

Featured speaker was Frank Farris of Amarillo, vice president and general manager of Producers Grain Corporation. Mr. Farris told the group about the port elevator owned by PGC in Corpus Christi.

He predicted that due to freezes in Kansas and Colorado seriously affecting wheat production in those states, that the price of wheat here at the beginning of harvest will be between \$1.50 and \$1.55 per bushel.

A revised set of by-laws were adopted by the local co-op.

New Directors
Bill Moore, Virgil Johnson and Roy C. Steele were the three directors who were elected to serve on the board.

The three door prizes were won by J. A. Marr, Charles Drabek and S. E. Crosnoe.

Following the member meeting, the new board of directors re-organized with Mr. Johnson again elected president and Mr. Hofmann re-elected secretary.

Deadline Nears for Voting on Cotton Allotment Transfers
If you are a cotton producer in Foard County, Ray Hysinger, chairman of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, wants you to remember that May 25 is the last day to cast a ballot on the transfer of upland cotton allotments outside the county. Ballots were mailed Friday, May 13, to all known cotton producers, and the referendum was being underway since May 16.

Ballots may be mailed or delivered in person to the ASCS county office, but they must reach there by Wednesday, May 25. A ballot in an envelope postmarked May 25th will not qualify as "eligible" unless it is in the county office before the close of business on that day.

The vote will decide only the question of whether a farmer in this county can sell or lease his cotton allotment to someone who would use it in another county of this state. In no case can transfers be made outside the state.

A two-thirds affirmative vote will permit such transfers during the next 3 years.

Farmers are cautioned to follow all instructions in marking their ballots. If you are in favor of transfers check the yes block—if not in favor of transfers check the no block. The certification on the back of the envelope sent to producers must be signed or the producer's mark witnessed as evidence that the ballot was marked by the producer personally without undue influence by any person. Ballots are kept secret, although the counting of the ballots is public.

The public counting of the ballots will take place on May 27 at 1 p. m. in the ASCS county office. Anyone who wishes may watch the counting.

Because the transfer of cotton allotments is so important to growers, it is hoped that a large percentage of the county's cotton producers will cast their ballots.

Any cotton producer in the county who has not received a ballot by mail is urged to get in touch immediately with the ASCS county office.

Technical Institute to Open in Fall

The James Connally Technical Institute, a part of the Texas A&M University system, will offer courses in 15 areas of study when its doors open for the first time in September.

The institute was created by an act of the Texas Legislature in April 1945. The legislation authorized the board of directors of Texas A&M University to establish "a coeducational institution . . . which may offer courses

of study in vocational and vocational-technical education for which there is a demand within the state of Texas."

Information on the new educational facility, located near Waco, is now available at the offices of all county agents. According to County Agent Joe Burkett, agents have been supplied with a copy of the institute's general catalog for the 1960-67 session.

Burkett said the instructional programs of the institute are designed for training and retraining youth and adults so they may join the state and nation's workforce as skilled workmen or technicians. A major objective of the institute, he added, is to provide

occupational training needed by Texas business and industry and for which there is sufficient demand by students.

The county agent said that persons desiring to enroll must submit applications for admission. High school graduates can be admitted as regular full time students. Mature individuals who have not graduated from high school will be permitted to register if they furnish evidence that their preparation is substantially the same as required of other applicants and have the ability and desire to profitably pursue their desired course of study.

review at Burkett's office. Copies may also be obtained by writing Roy W. Duggar, director, James Connally Technical Institute, Waco, Texas 76703.

Highway Patrol Seeking Recruits for Training Program

Welch Father and Son to Attend Science Meet

Twenty-four students and teachers from high schools in this area have been selected to attend the Sixth Texas Nuclear Science Symposium at the University of Texas June 12-15 under the sponsorship of West Texas Utilities Company, it was announced today by Roff W. Hardy, company president.

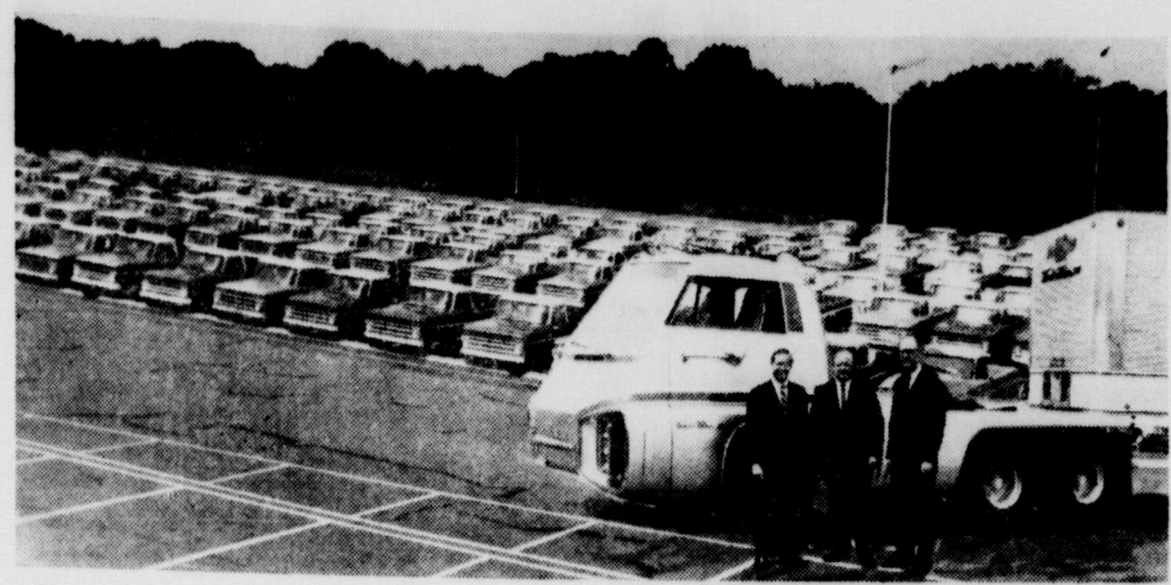
The student selected here to attend the sessions in Austin is James Allen Welch, student in Crowell High School. He will be accompanied by his father, James Welch, science teacher in Crowell High School.

The symposium, which is for outstanding science students and their teachers, is sponsored jointly by the University of Texas and the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation, made up of ten investor-owned electric utility companies in Texas, including the West Texas Utilities.

Selection of students and teachers to attend the symposium is made by the schools participating in the program. About 500 students and teachers will attend throughout the state.

"The symposium will bring to high school science students and teachers the latest information on nuclear physics and related topics by scientists taking part in the program," Hardy said. Outstanding speakers from science, industry and education are scheduled on the four-day program, including Dr. E. C. Creutz, vice president—research and development of General Atomic. Other speakers will be Dr. Nicholas Krall, experimental physicist at General Atomic; Gene Brannum,

Purchase of Savings Bonds Urged by Chairman

George Self, chairman of the US Savings Bonds volunteer committee for Foard County, this week urged bond buyers to take advantage of the new higher annual limitations on holdings of E and H Bonds which have been announced by the Treasury Department. The new regulations provide that eligible purchasers may own up to \$20,000 maturity value, in Series E Bonds bought in any one calendar year, and \$30,000, face value, in H Bonds. Previous limits were \$10,000 and \$20,000, respectively.

Calling attention to the fact that the interest rate on Savings Bonds was recently increased to 4.15 per cent, Mr. Self called the new purchase limit "an unusual opportunity" for both individual and institutional investors to become "larger shareholders in their country."

Under Treasury regulations, any resident of the United States, or citizens temporarily residing abroad, may own Savings Bonds in a choice of registrations: single owner, co-owner, or beneficiary. Where bonds are purchased in the names of two individuals as co-owners, each may hold the maximum amount of either E or H Bonds, or both. Bonds may also be owned by corporations, associations, public or private organizations, fiduciaries, and other investors except commercial banks.

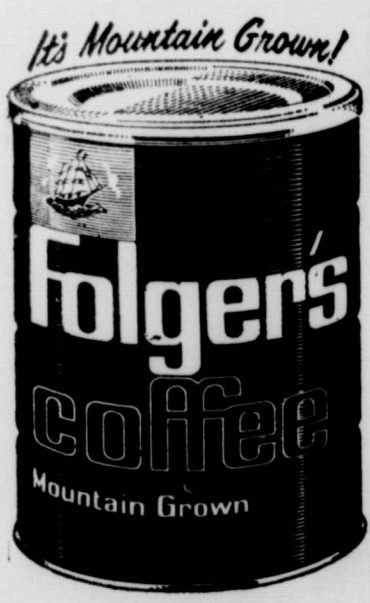

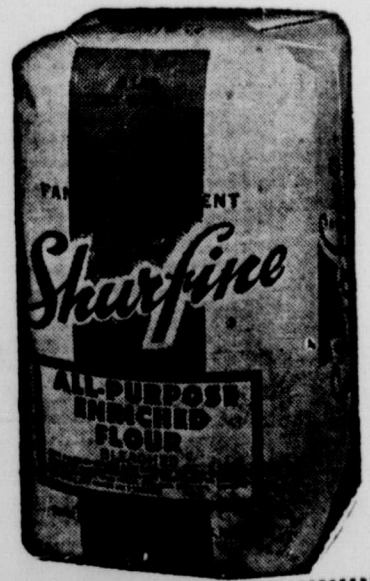
