

The meeting which effected the consolidation was in the office of County School Supt. Leslie Thomas.

Since classes had not been held in the Thalia district for two years, that district, according to law, had become a dormant district, and at the decision of the Thalia board, the consolidation with Crowell ISD was effected. Thalia pupils had been coming to Crowell under a constract between the two districts.

Election to Be Held County Supt. Thomas said last week that an election will be called in the Crowell district, which now includes the old Thalia district, to levy a tax rate and spread the indebtedness of the two districts over the entire newly-formed district.


