Mayor Kincaid said with the cooperation of every water user in Crowell, the above plan should prove to be successful in keeping water in Crowell. If not enough cooperation is granted, the mayor said more stringent rules will be put in force.

Foard County Men Attending National Guard Training Camp

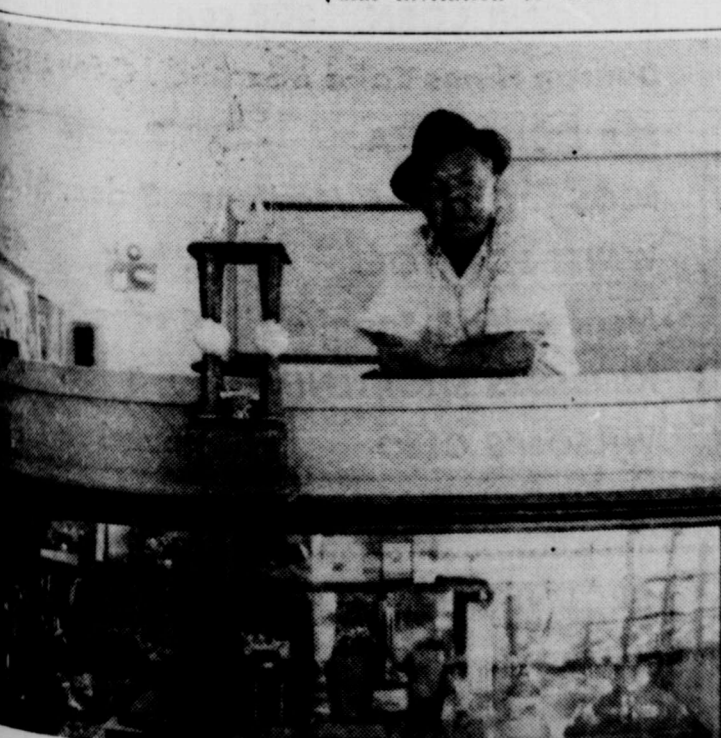
Five Foard County men are spending two weeks at summer National Guard training at Fort Hood. They are members of the 49th Division and left Sunday morning for Fort Hood.

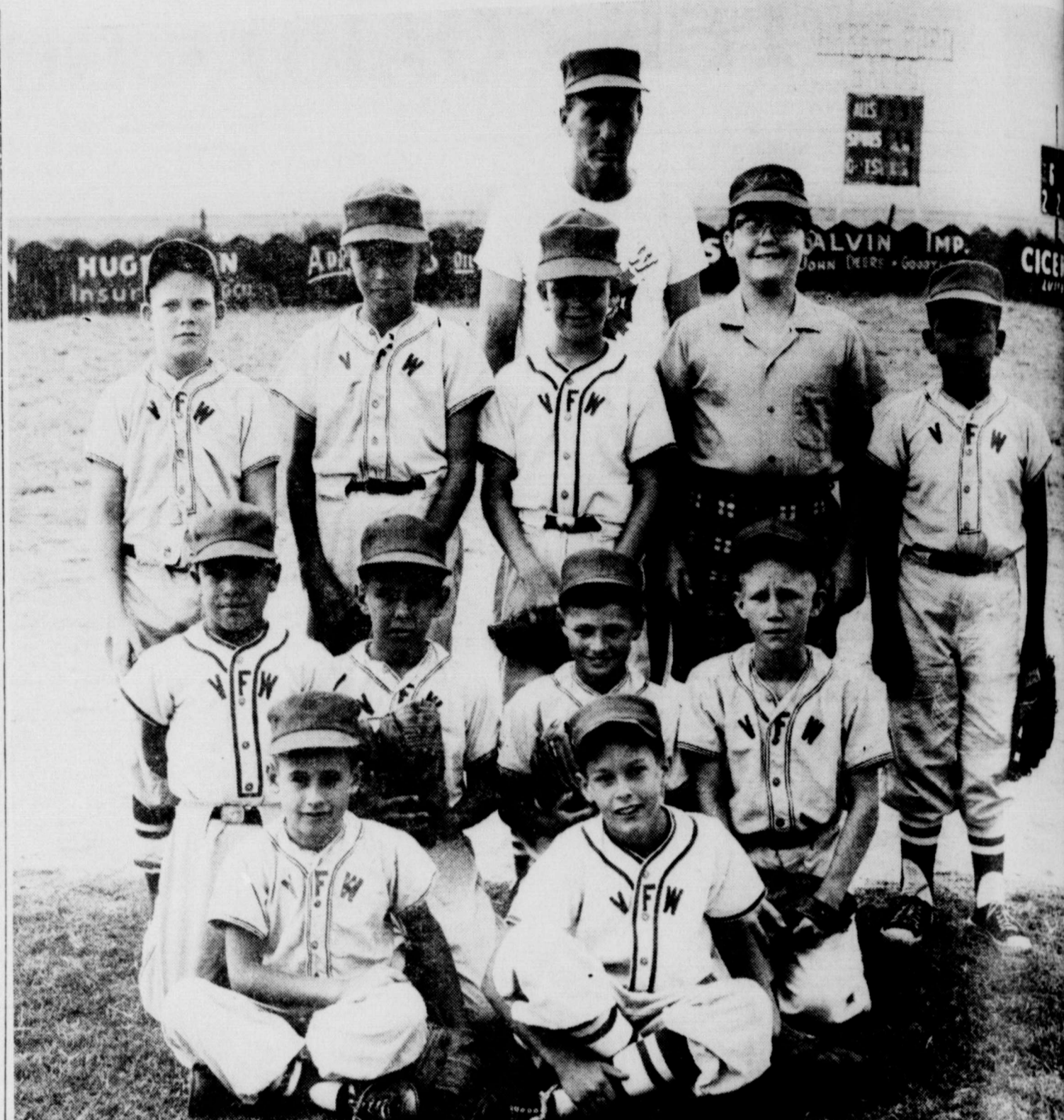

Four Counties Seek Nurses' School Here

The four-county area of Wilbarger, Cottle, Foard and Harde-man Counties is seeking a Neighborhood Youth Corps to provide training for 80 youths, and the establishment of a vocational nurses training school at Crowell.

If the school is approved, trainees would do their 16-week training at hospitals in the county area—the first such program in Texas with more than one participating hospital.

Application for NYC has been made for this area by the Community Action Agency, the Economic Opportunities Advancement Corporation for the four counties, according to CAA Director Don Ross Malone.

Mr. Malone said that the application was filed after CAA analyzed the character and incidence of poverty in the four-county area, and services of existing agencies that deal with the economically deprived.

Well Drilled in June on G. C. Owens' Land to Be Re-Worked

Addison Warner of Fort Worth will re-enter and re-work to 5600 feet a recently plugged Foard County wildcat six miles northwest of Foard City.

It is the No. 1 G. C. Owens, 1980 feet from west and north lines of the Jacob Garrett survey. Dan Auld and Sojourner Drilling Corp. originally dug the hole and plugged it in June of this year at 6641 feet.

Six Accidents in Foard County Reported in June by Hiway Patrol

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated six accidents on rural highways in Foard County during the month of June, according to Sgt. Floyd Etheridge, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in three persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$4,870.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first six months of 1966 shows a total of 20 accidents resulting in one person killed, six persons

injured, and an estimated property damage of \$12,355.00.

The number of traffic deaths in Texas continues to rise. For the first six months of 1966 there have been 1470 traffic deaths compared to 1325 traffic deaths for the first months of 1965. This 11 per cent increase is very alarming, and chances are it will become very critical because of vacation months and holiday periods still ahead to intensify the magnitude of the accident picture.

The sergeant stated, "It is estimated that at the end of 1966 traffic deaths in Texas will increase about 10 per cent over 1965 which means approximately 3300 persons will be killed in

traffic accidents." The sergeant added one other comment, "To control accidents, we must first learn to control ourselves."

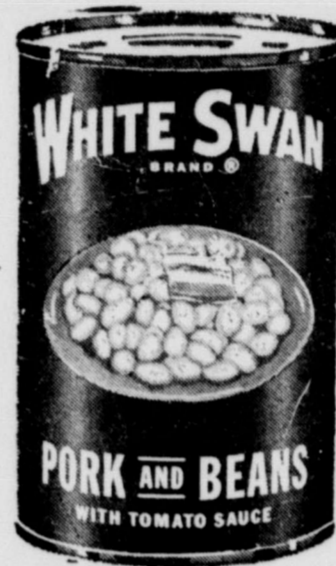

THIRTY YEARS AGO

News items below were taken from the Thursday, July 9, 1936, issue of The Foard County News:

Foard County was reported to have had on hand January 1, 1935, 41,167 chickens over three months of age, according to a recent farm report issued by the Department of Commerce in Washington. Six hundred and five farms of the county reported the egg production during the year 1934 to be 3,731,832 or 310,986 dozen. Chickens raised during 1934, according to the reports from 586 farms of the county, amounted to 104,711.

Foard County's official scholastic census for 1936 is 1,570, according to figures approved by the State Department of Education.

Work was begun Friday of last week on the building of a reservoir at the City Lake which will, when complete, store 60,000 gallons of water.

Rainfall in Crowell since Sunday morning has amounted to .9 inch, according to the official measurement taken at the Crowell State Bank.

An increase in the amount of livestock owned by low-income farms is one result of the first year's work of the Resettlement Administration.

One of the 444 fatalities recorded in the United States due to over-celebrating or other mishaps caused directly from the July 4 holiday happened in Foard County or to Foard County people.

Twenty-five cents an hour with 84 hours work per month for common laborers was the wage rate set for Foard County by the Wichita Falls district of the Works Progress Administration. Intermediate laborers will be allowed 45 cents an hour with a maximum of 67 hours per month, and skilled laborers will be given 75 cents per hour with a maximum of 51 hours per month.

Two Minutes With the Bible

More Than Conquerors

Two boys fight in a back alley. Fists fly. Shouts go up from the other kids standing by. "Give it to 'im! Let 'im have it!"

Finally one of the two walks away with a cocky bearing, head and shoulders wagging. He has won!

But has he? Look at him. He has a bloody nose, a black eye and welts on his face and arms. And if looks could kill he wouldn't even be alive, for while his friends shout his praises, the boy he has beaten gives him a look that says: "Just wait." He has not won anything except, perhaps, a bitter and lasting enemy.

So it is with the wars that nations wage against each other. Necessary as it sometimes becomes to defend our liberties, our homes, our way of life, by force of arms, seldom does any nation actually win in war. Rather, all lose, even the "victors," as in their "victories," they sow the bitterness and hate which are the seeds of future wars.

It is different, however, with "the good fight of the faith," for the Christian may come out of every battle stronger than when he went in. Only the Christian can say with regard to the heartaches and disappointments, the sickness, the difficulties and obstacles, that cross his path: "Nay, in all these things we are more than conquerors, through Him that loved us" (Rom. 8:37).

During Paul's busy ministry for Christ he suffered a painful "thorn in the flesh," and "besought the Lord thrice" that it might be taken away. The Lord did not see fit to remove the thorn, but answered Paul: "My grace is sufficient for thee, for My strength is made perfect in weakness" (II Cor. 12:9).

Paul's response: "Most gladly therefore will I rather glory in my infirmities, that the power of Christ may rest upon me. . . . I take pleasure in infirmities. . . . for when I am weak, then am I strong" (vers. 9, 10). Let all go well, and we are prone to grow careless in our Christian lives. Adversity, on the other hand, makes Christians pray the harder and lean the more—and therein lies their strength and their victory.

Safety Code Seen as Factor in Low Toll

Water recreational fatalities dropped substantially in Texas during a holiday-punctuated period normally marked by an increased comparative toll, according to an unofficial count by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Department safety personnel assumed that tighter supervision of pleasure boating has been a factor in the lower number of drownings since the faster water craft and associated water skiing significantly have not contributed measurably to the tragedies.

Deaths recorded for the last two weeks period were 13 for a year's total of 130. This compares with the toll for the same time last year of 21 and a combined total of 137.

The Department attributed the statistical drop to one of the lowest holiday week end death tolls.

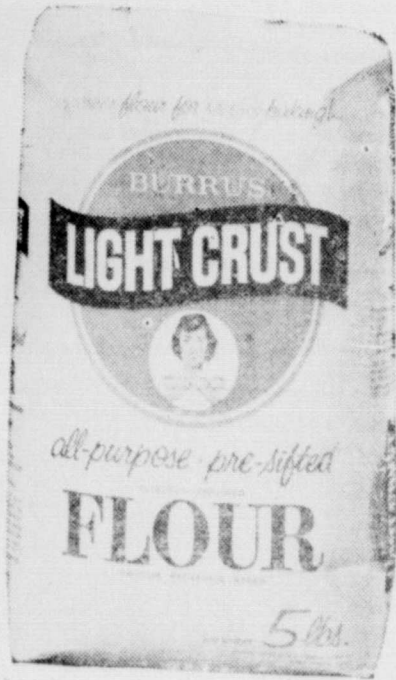

Leakey—Some state parks have everything even to a veritable Hollywood staged flash flood.

That would be Garner State Park which didn't need the latest embellishment for its reputation as one of the favorite places for people to go and have fun.

The latest episode, with a happy beginning and end, reflects modern teamwork of state agencies, according to Donald Oliver, regional park ranger temporarily handling Garner affairs.

On a week end morning the State Highway Department alerted Oliver that heavy rains in the headquarters of the Frio river, which roams benignly through the wooded park, would cause a substantial rise in the river.

Oliver noted the dripping trees from a light shower, observed the tranquil clear water stream and the happy campers along its bank.

Then he did a massive double take.

Zowie! The friendly advisers had added that the rise would be six feet and the time would be 2 p. m.

The Ranger and his staff notified the unbelieving guests they had five hours to quietly fold their tents, pack up their equipment, move back up on higher ground and enjoy the water show.

Garner, the first state park ever to approach the 1,000,000 annual visitation mark, had its usual thousands. And they joined the river bank evacuees, all very skeptical, what with the sun shining and the birds singing and the air very fresh from the dainty shower.

But the highway folks had calculated well what would happen when up to seven inches of rain cascaded down the barren canyons. Almost on the dot at 2 p. m., here came a modest wall of water, about like a boat wake, said Oliver. Slowly the stream climbed six feet, covering the bank camp area. Nobody even got their feet wet. Soon the river was blue and clear again, back where it had been before the deluge. And the fishermen were smelling up the shaded area frying catfish that hadn't bitten good since the spring rains.
