#### Utmost Care Needed for Handling **Agriculture Chemicals**

Don't relax your guard when using agricultural chemicals. They can enter the body by ingestion, through the respiratory system and in many cases through the skin, explains county agent Joe Burkett.

A person would not knowingly eat a chemical such as a pesticide; however, failure to remove contaminated clothing and to wash thoroughly prior to eating can result in the ingestion of the chemical on food handled by the individual.

Absorption of the chemical through the respiratory tract can occur by smoking cigarettes that have contacted the chemical on the hands of the individual, says Burkett. Absorption through the respiratory tract can also occur when one is exposed to chemicals in the form of dusts, sprays or vapors, explains the county agent. Adequate ventilation will serve to reduce the degree of exposure and the use of a respiratory protection device is a must in many cases if use hazards are to be minimized, emphasizes the county agent.


