Registration receipts must be written out by the tax assessorcollector's office staff . . . there will be no special deputies appointed, and application must be made at the court house office.

An application for voter registhe individual requesting it.

A qualified voter may register for himself and members of his immediate family . . . wife or husband, son or daughter, mother or father . . . provided that these family members are otherwise eligible voters.

But in Texas next year, voters will have to be registered, prior of Crowell; two brothers, A. W to January 31, in order to qualify as voters. It's free . . . but it's necessary.
