Four Accidents Reported in Foard

vestigated four accidents on rural highways in Foard County during the month of November, according to Sgt. Floyd Etheridge, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area. These crashes resulted in three ersons injured and an estimated

property damage of \$1,950.00. The rural accident summary for this county during the first eleven months of 1966 shows a total of 36 accidents resulting in one person killed, 22 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$30,855.00.

The 1966 December traffic cloud hangs very low and dark over the Texas streets and highways horizon. What does the traffic picture look like for this yearend holiday season? If it is anything like the repeat of the past, it is going to be a very sad one for Texas history.

Since 1960, traffic deaths in Texas have risen from 2,254 to 3,028 in 1965. At the beginning of this present month, the traffic fatality count in Texas was 2,921. Motorists are now driving during the most deadly month of the year. December, 1965, was the most deadly month in the history of this state with 363 traffic fatal-

What kind of picture could this year end with? The 2,921 traffic deaths already recorded plus 363 deaths similar to last December would give a total of 3,284 traffic deaths. The sergeant stated it is estimated that this year's traffic death count will be about 15 per cent over 1965.
