Two bills before the Texas Legislature would permit firms with trade names to continue the practice of optometry. At stake is an old feud between the individual optometrist practicing under his

own name and the optometric firm practicing under a firm name. The State Board of Optometry adopted a rule unfavorable to the firms, and the Supreme Court upheld the board

The News believes that these firms should be allowed to continue their practice, as they have in the past-as long as their practitioners are qualified. And certainly they must be qualified, by examination, before presenting themselves to the public

In the last 30 years, million of eye examinations have been made by licensed optometrists practicing under trade names in optometric offices throughout the state-and under laws passed by the Legislature. The quality of eye-care service has not been impaired; on the contrary, the trade-name firms have held down the cost of eye examinations and

spectacles, thus permitting thousands in lower-income brackets to have more efficient sight. Passage of the two bills now

before the Legislature will not change the situation which has existed for 30 years. The bills merely affirm the intent of the legislative body to permit practice of optometry in one or more of
