





Social Security Credit for Small Farmers Is **Explained by ASCS**

The Social Security Administration leaflet OASI-852 explains how self-employed farmers may

increase social security credits. Two-thirds of gross income up to \$2,400 can now be reported even if the farmer operated at a net loss provided he made \$600 or more in gross farm income. Previously, \$1,800 was the upper limit for optional reporting.

Any questions concerning this part of the social security law will be answered by the local office of the ASCS or the social security representative.


