showers and After weather last week had stopped the Foard County wheat harvest until last Sunday, combines got back into the fields early Sunday afternoon, really got rolling the rest of the day and part of Sunday night.

The harvest, which had been stopped with 318,000 bushels delivered to the elevators, jumped by 180,000 bushels after Sunday's cutting.

This brought the total number of bushels delivered to the elevators up to 498,000 bushels, reports from the county's three elevators revealed shortly after noon Monday.


One elevator reported that with the wind that blew Sunday night, some of the combines sending wheat to that elevator cut until about 3 a. m. Monday.

A big rush of wheat was exthe time of next week's edition. Since the Thalia community received upwards of 3 inches of rain last week, some of the fields were not dry enough early this week to permit combines to get in the fields. This condition was not evident in most other sections of the county, which did not receive that much rain.
