## OIL AND GAS WELLS BRING \$3 MILLION EACH YEAR TO STIMULATE FOARD COUNTY ECONOMY

More than \$3.0 million a year of economic stimulation for Foard County flows from its oil and gas wells each year, an annual study by Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association showed this week.

"As one of the 206 producing counties in Texas, Foard County's economy is sensitive to fluctuations in the oil industry generally," commented W. A. Landreth, Fort Worth, Association president.

"Long range, the demand for oil looks strong and current production rates continue to provide Texas a major source of its income. On the other hand, Texas operators are beset by competition from other oil producing areas, government ceilings on natural gas prices, heavy tax payments, and a price for crude oil that is insufficient to encourage the amount of exploratory drilling that is needed to find future reserves."

Based on latest U. S. Bureau of Mines production figures, Foard County in 1965 produced 1.0 million barrels of crude oil, valued at \$3.0 million and 352.6 million cubic feet of natural gas valued at \$45,600, and ranks 138th among Texas counties in production.

A major distribution of income from sales of oil and gas went to county landowners in royalty payments totaling more than \$376,400.

In 1966, a year that saw drilling in Texas fall to its lowest level since 1947, oil and gas operators drilled 14 wells in Foard County. Of these 9 were wildcats seeking new fields.

The Association estimated that operators in the county spent more than \$305,102 in drilling last year, of which \$189,277 was lost in dry holes.

Sharing heavily in the county's production each year is the State Treasury, which received \$136,610 in production taxes in 1965 paid by the producers and royalty owners. Crude oil production paid \$136,418 and natural gas production, \$3,192.

### Wheat Allotment Notices for 1968 Are Due Soon

The Foard County A. S. C. S. office anticipates making final payments during the month of August or as soon as performance is 50 per cent complete on wheat, cotton and feed grain programs. The reporters are measuring cotton, feed grain and diverted acres. Farmers who have not designated diverted acres should do so as soon as possible in order to receive payment at an early date.

Also, payments are now being made to producers who carried out ACP practices, and land owners who have carried out a practice should notify the local ASCS office as soon as the practice is completed.

Cotton farmers were reminded also that cotton must be farmed in a workmanlike manner with the expectation of making a cotton crop if payments are to be made. Diverted acres must be of equal productivity to the land on which the crop is planted and cannot be grazed from May 1 to November 1, 1967.

Mrs. Jean Reeder, office manager, said that county farmers should be receiving their 1968 wheat allotment notices in the near future.

Agriculture and business leaders of the 28 North Texas counties making up the Rolling Plains learned Thursday of last week that by working as an area there is a good possibility of increasing farm and ranch income by \$209 million annually.

In making the statement, Dr. R. E. Patterson, Dean of Agriculture at Texas A&M University, passed out a 501-page economic study report of the 28 counties put together by the Texas Extension Service that shows how.

One hundred and thirty-two men prominent in area agriculture, education, industry and government, assembled in Munday last Thursday by invitation from Dean Patterson to hear what was learned in the year-long study carried out under the direction of Norman Brints, farm management specialist with the Extension Service, from Vernon.

Brints told the crowd the study is similar to programs prepared for other areas of the state. He explained, as an example, in the blacklands where the Blackland Income Growth Program (BIG) is in its sixth year, farm income in 18 selected counties last year was up \$53,894,000 above that of 1965. He said in Collin County farm income in 1961 was \$18 million. BIG is credited with boosting the figure to \$25 million last year.

Brints said the study enumerates the problems and opportunities in the Rolling Plains area. He said all problems common to the area were included as a unit. Objectives of the study were as follows:

1. To evaluate the amount and use of agricultural resources in the 28 counties.
2. To identify agricultural problems and potentials.
3. To develop guidelines for the production and management of each economic enterprise on farms and ranches in the area.
4. To develop suggested plans of action whereby the guidelines and recommendations can be utilized to increase the efficient use of all resources, thereby increasing net farm income.

Source of Increase

Just where the potential increase of \$209 million annually will originate once the program is begun was asked and answered at the three-hour session in Munday High School.

A few points included: Increased use of rainfall on cultivated acres for crop and livestock production by reduction of runoff, evaporation and undesirable plants—\$25 million.

Timely and accurate application of irrigation water on 130,000 acres to increase the value of agricultural production—\$15 million.

Expanded use of latest technology, brush control and deferred grazing in beef production—\$10 million.

Adoption of the best known crop production techniques for increasing yields, improving quality and reducing costs—\$30 million.

Improved farm organization for maximum use of land, labor, capital and management—\$7 million.

Increased processing and manufacturing of agricultural products in the 28 counties—\$120 million.

Effective planning of estates and management of income tax—\$7 million.

Development of commercial outdoor recreation such as hunting, camping and fishing—\$3 million.

Increased production of cattle, swine and sheep on crop farms—\$6 million.

Major Needs

Two major points made were need to improve farm management and product marketing.

The area under study includes 16.8 million acres in Archer, Baylor, Callahan, Clay, Coleman, Cottle, Dickens, Fisher, Foard, Hardeman, Haskell, Jones, Kent, King, Knox, Mitchell, Motley, Nolan, Runnels, Scurry, Shackelford, Stephens, Stonewall, Taylor, Throckmorton, Wichita, Wilbarger and Young Counties.

The program will get into motion once the federal and state agencies meet and decide what will be required of each agency in putting the program to work.

Then there will be a series of four kickoff meetings in the various areas of the 28 County Rolling Plains.

Following these meetings each county's program building committee will work through the Extension Service in following the suggested guidelines and in selecting their goals. Then, it will

## Highlights and Sidelights from the State Capital

Texas Railroad Commission has turned up the oil allowable to a record high 48 per cent of potential—retroactive to July 1—to meet demands created by the Middle East shoot-out.

Commission's extraordinary mid-month emergency order was the third of the kind since the Arabian oil cutoff. It boosted the allowable to 3,830,560 barrels a day—higher than during latter part of the 1957 Suez oil crisis and probably the highest since wide-open production days of 1948 when producers were encouraged to build up war-drained crude supplies.

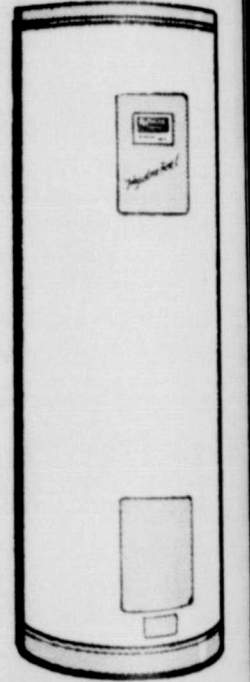
New increase adds 131,000 barrels a day to July allowable, which was raised to 42.9 per cent on the first of the month. Major purchasers told the Commission added production was necessary.

Allowable was 33.8 per cent when the Arab-Israeli shooting started in June. Commission raised it slightly—to 35.9 per cent—in mid-June, retroactive to June 1, and on July 1 announced the 42.9 per cent order.

August allowable is due to be set this week. Since the percentage factor was first used in 1963, the 37.5 per cent-of-potential production was the highest adjustment used until the present Middle East crisis erupted.

In addition to the major effect on the state's general economy, a steadily climbing allowable appears likely to increase Texas' governmental tax income substantially. It has been estimated that the July 1 order would mean a \$53,617 a day increase in state tax income—or a total of \$1,600,000 through this month. Obviously, the increase now will be

## TAERF Sponsors Crowell Student at the University of Texas

Jerry Lynn Setliff, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ennis Setliff of Crowell, was among the University of Texas students completing a year of undergraduate work in the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation program.

In making the announcement, Roff Hardy, vice president of T. A. E. R. F. and president of West Texas Utilities, member company of TAERF, said that participation in the program is restricted to specially qualified students, and that Setliff deserved recognition for having been selected, and for his outstanding work in the research program.

Prior to entering the University of Texas, Setliff was sponsored by WTU as representative to an

Atomic Symposium designed to interest high school students in atomic research. Setliff said that his interest in atomic research was heightened by information received at the symposium he attended. He used the money from his TAERF lab work to help finance his college education.

The Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation (TAERF) is an organization made up of ten Texas investor-owned electric utility companies and the University of Texas. The ultimate goal of the TAERF is to harness the tremendous might of nuclear power for peaceful purposes and thus assure a source of energy that could meet all of the power needs of the world for millions of years.

"Someday we will be able to control thermonuclear power for use in industry," Setliff said. "It will be awhile before we do. We are still developing techniques for study, and gathering data. Most of the lab work right now is gathering data."

Setliff's work with TEARF is in research on plasma diagnostic methods for high temperature plasma research. It deals with methods of time and space resolution of plasma parameters—such as energy, density, and magnetic field in a cylindrical geometry using lasers as probes. It also includes measurement of neutron production due to trapped

magnetic fields. "The work is interesting and I enjoy it," Setliff said.

The TAERF undergraduate program offered Setliff the opportunity to work with graduate students in the lab. His project dealt with a small aspect of the overall problem of atomic research. Many projects in plasma research are being conducted. Plasma is what nuclear power comes from. Present research with plasma has met with the problem of containment. Plasma gets so hot it vaporizes when it touches anything. A way must be found to contain the plasma long enough to get it to fuse and extract energy from

it. Setliff will receive his B. S. E. E. degree in August, 1967, and will enter the University of Texas Graduate School to study computer science when he returns in the fall.

### Young Men Are Needed for Texas Highway Patrol

"The Texas Department of Public Safety still has an ever-present need for young men who are interested in the field of law enforcement as a career," Major Luther C. Moore, regional commander of the DPS, said this week.

Employment practices have been drastically changed to allow qualified applicants to take the examination immediately, in contrast to previous policy of not holding examinations until time for a patrol training school to begin.

"We realize," Moore said, "that a person looking for career employment often needs to know immediately if he is acceptable for the job. For this reason we have made the changes necessary in our procedure to tell an applicant within ten days if he has been accepted for employment."

Training schools will be held at the DPS Law Enforcement Academy in Austin in July and August and periodically thereafter. This training is designed to equip the cadet to handle any of the various situations he may encounter as a patrolman, and will start him off on the right foot toward a rewarding career in law enforcement. Pay will be \$571.00 per month upon completion of training.

Moore encouraged all interested high school graduates from the ages of 20 through 35 to contact their nearest Department of Public Safety Patrolman for complete details on becoming a commissioned officer with the DPS.

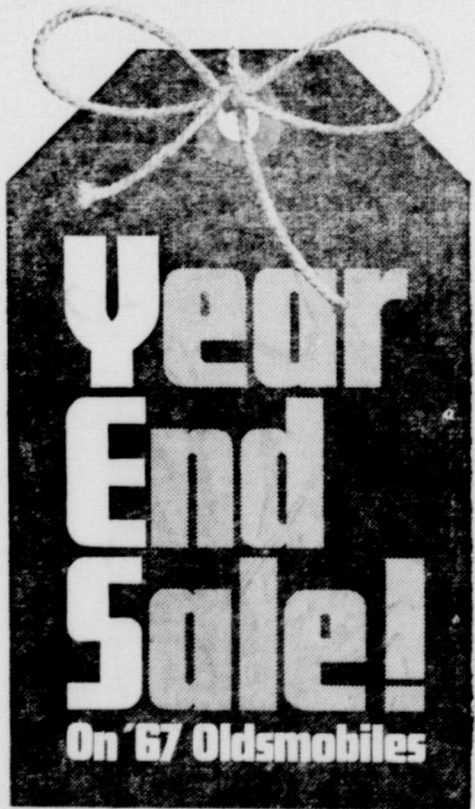

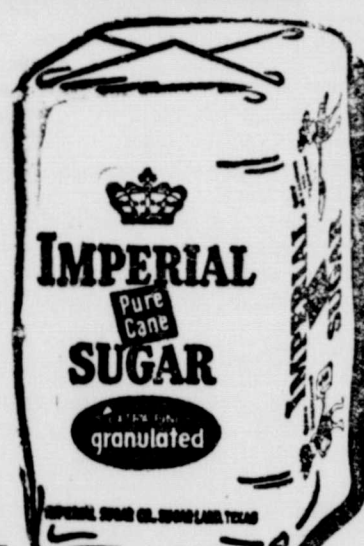

## Recent Rains Cause Favorable Weather for Screwworms

Recent rains in Foard County have created favorable conditions for screwworm fly increases, and area livestock owners are alerted to watch their herds carefully, warns County Agent Joe Burkett. Although the number of con-

firmed screwworm cases is under last year's count for this time of year, stockmen must continue the battle against this costly pest. Stockmen should watch their livestock throughout the summer and into the fall, to prevent the build-up which occurred last fall. Livestock owners should inspect their animals carefully, check and treat all wounds, collect any larval samples and send them to the Mission lab for identification. This year Mission lab officials say that there have been 61 screwworm cases reported throughout the nation, with Texas having 54

## Cotton Pest Populations Are on the Increase

Overwintered boll weevil and fleahopper populations appear to be on the increase in many area cotton fields, according to Emory P. Boring of Vernon, area entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Mr. Boring said in his weekly Rolling Plains Cotton Insect Report that insects had been observed in many more fields during the past week than in previous weeks.

He also said cotton in the 32-county Rolling Plains is fruiting and there are a few counties where cotton is in the four to six leaf stage.

Mr. Boring's summation of the overall area cotton insect situation appears something like this: Fleahoppers—Found in light to medium infestations in many fields but heaviest populations detected in Collingsworth and Wilbarger Counties where up to 30 fleahoppers per 100 terminals were observed.

Boll weevils—Found in many counties with infestations ranging from 65 to 392 boll weevils per acre. Heaviest populations were in Wilbarger, Wichita and Mitchell Counties.

Bollworms—Light to medium infestations reported in Wilbarger, Mitchell and Foard Counties. Populations of one to eight bollworms per 100 plants were observed in fields in these counties.

Thrips—Found in several fields of young cotton in Stonewall County.

Aphid—Reported in many area fields.

Grasshoppers—Continuing with heavy damage in some sections of Hardeman County.

## Murder Suspect Sought by FBI

At 9:28 a. m., August 8, 1966 an unidentified white male who was armed attempted to rob the Inwood National Bank of Dallas. A customer who attempted to intervene was shot and killed by the robber. An FBI artist's conception of this individual has been described by witnesses as an excellent likeness of this person. The man was described as approximately 27 years old, approximately 5' 8" or 5'9" tall, and weighing about 160 pounds. His hair was very dark or black and well groomed. His eyes were dark and he possessed a muscular build with broad shoulders and a narrow waist. Witnesses stated this individual's speech accent indicated the possibility that he was from Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas or Louisiana.

During the commission of this attempted robbery, the robber kept telling customers and employees in the bank not to look at him or he would kill them. One witness thought he had the initials "J. B." on his upper left arm. Another witness noted that when he walked he rose on his toes noticeably.

The FBI has requested that anyone having any information as to the possible identity of this individual please contact the nearest office of the FBI. Anyone having such information is cautioned not to attempt to apprehend this individual, inasmuch as he is considered armed and extremely dangerous.
