

When Mr. average motorist takes to the highway, about one driver in every eight he meets (actually 12.4 per cent) will be exceeding the daytime speed limit of 70 miles per hour, says Captain Blackwell.

The figure jumps much higher at night, and veteran officers point out that this increase is directly responsible for many fatal accidents.

Captain Blackwell said the survey made on Texas highways last year shows that nearly one-third of the drivers (29.6 per cent) exceeded the night speed limit of 65 miles per hour.

The safest driving speed, according to the government report, is the average speed of all traffic -while the highest accident rates are found at the very lowest and very highest highway speeds.

Captain Blackwell says the government study shows that passenger car drivers under 25 and more than 65 years old were involved in the greatest number of traffic mishaps. The survey also shows that drivers of older cars are involved in more accidents than drivers of newer cars-perhaps due to the low horsepower and poor acceleration of the older

The most common traffic accident, according to the government survey, is the rear-end collision in which one car overtakes and strikes another car from the rear.



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



Even though bone meal is not always needed, most successful producers make it avail able to cattle at all times.

Phosphorus is usually more efficient than calcium in most regions of Texas, and results in loss of appetite and weight, decline in milk production, poor calf crop and failure to breed. Prolonged phosphorus deficiency causes cows to become lame and stiff in the joints. Should this condition occur, the county agent says phosphorus should be added directly to the drinking water. Minerals should be placed in a sturdy container divided into two sections. Loose salt should be kept in one section and bonemeal in the other Mineral boxes should be placed in shady areas near available water supplies. Burkett said additional information on minerals for livestock is available from his office.
