the dam would be built some day and on many occasions when confronted with the proposition of naming the body of water "Lake Morris" remarked that "Lake Clarendon" was the best name since so many local people had worked on this project through the year; too, the body of water would cover the "Old Clarendon" site and this name and this body of water would serve as a historical marker for the pioneers who settled this area. The bodies of pioneer residents of Old Clarendon which were buried in the Old Clarendon Cemetery were removed as the dam was constructed in this area and are to be reinterred in a cemetery on Lookout Point above the Old Clarendon site. The Old Clarendon court house is to be reconstructed from Old Clarendon Foundation Stone on Lookout Point, also. This stone has already been moved to the top of the hill by Clarendon Boy Scouts and interested adults.

The Greenbelt dam is now complete with a good turf of grass to prevent washing. The filtration plant is now in operation dispersing a "sweet" and dependable water supply to Childress and Quanah.

Greenbelt dam is exceeded in size in the Panhandle only by Lake Meredith. It is 110 feet deep, 6,000 feet long, 700 feet wide at the base and contains 3.6 million cubic yards of dirt fill and 3,400 yards of concrete. When full the dam will impound 60,000 acre feet of water, and eighteen miles of fence have been purchased to fence in the lake

The lake has been stocked with Northern Pike which are already 18 inches in length, and bass that

are over seven inches in length. The next big event will be the dedication of the dam and the entire project sometime within the near future.

**SPEED** KILLS

Texas Tech.

(Note: This is the third and final article dealing with an allout drive by the Texas Department of Public Safety encouraging motorists to drive within the speed limits on Texas highways to reduce the state's evermounting traffic toll.)

Texas motorists will be watching their speedometers more in coming months, as the Texas Highway Patrol fields more patrolmen and more radar speed checking units in a battle against

motorcide. Purpose of the all-out drive against speeders is simple. The Highway Patrol knows that speed kills-and they hope that by sprinkling the state's heavily traveled arteries with radar speed checking units, the ever mounting Texas highway death toll will be

reduced. Previous articles in this series have shown that excessive speed is a contributing factor in a large percentage of the accidents on Texas highways, that the chances of a driver becoming involved in an accident increase many fold when he drives faster than the speed limit, and that one motorist in eight was driving faster than the speed limit on Texas highways last year.

"Now just what is the Highway Patrol going to do about all this speeding?" asks Mr. Average Motorist, and the answer is supplied by Major Luther C. Moore, Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Major Moore has announced that the DPS has ordered enough radar speed measuring units to equip almost every patrol car in the field. He added "use of the radar sets will enable us to patrol the highways more effectively, to encourage all drivers to stay within the speed limit.'

The major continues: "We hope everyone will drive within the speed limit but some will fail to comply, so our efforts will be directed toward apprehending the speeders in order to protect motorists who do comply with the

no warning tickets will be issued to speeders since the Texas Public Safety Commission has ordered that charges will be filed in every case where there is a clear cut and substantial violation of the speed law.
