MARCH OF DIMES DRIVE UNDERWAY IN COUNTY

The March of Dimes has opened the "top drawer" of leadership to head its 30th anniversary campaign in Foard County.

Five outstanding volunteers will lead community fund-raising activities in the health organization's fight against birth defects. Mrs. Effie Johnson of Crowell, Foard County Chapter Chairman, announced Monday.

Community leaders are Mrs. Effie Johnson, chapter chairman; Leslie Thomas, treasurer; Mrs. Virginia Whatley, secretary; Mrs. Earl Ford, campaign director; and Mrs. Beverly Gray, assisting.

"Birth defects are the second greatest killer in the United States. Every year they cause the death of 60,000 children and adults and kill more than a half-million babies before they're even born," Mrs. Johnson said.

Research is an important weapon in the fight against this killer. The National Foundation-March of Dimes allocates a substantial part of all funds collected to high-caliber research projects in many parts of the country. Scientists associated with the March of Dimes are now investigating a number of hereditary and environmental factors that interfere with the development of the unborn child, such as the effects of infections during pregnancy, relationship of drugs to birth defects, and other errors of body chemistry and structure.

"If our nation is to produce stronger, healthier babies, research must be expanded as quickly as contributions permit. At the same time, the results of research must be translated into techniques for treating or preventing birth defects. We therefore urge the public to give generously," Mrs. Johnson said.

The response to the Great Plains Conservation Program is increasing tremendously each year, according to John McAlister of the local Soil Conservation Service office. The demand and need for the program greatly exceeds the appropriations that Congress sets for the program, McAlister said. In Texas alone, all of the 1968 fiscal year (July 1, 1967 to June 30, 1968) appropriations have already been used to certify new contracts. This has brought a halt to developing any new contracts in Texas until about June or July of 1968. However, McAlister added, the local office can work with interested farmers and ranchers so that a contract can be developed quickly when funds are made available. "If you think you may be interested in the Great Plains Conservation Program, contact any of the local SCS personnel. They will be happy to talk with you about it," McAlister concluded.

Great Plains Program in County Is Progressing

On August 7, 1956, Congress approved Public Law 1021 which provided for the creation of the Great Plains Conservation Program. Through this law, the Secretary of Agriculture is authorized to enter into contracts with farmers and ranchers to carry out a conservation plan on their farms or ranches based on the needs of the land. The responsibility of administering this program has been assigned to the Soil Conservation Service.

At the present time, the local SCS office has 41 active Great Plains contracts in Foard County. On December 31, four of these contracts expired. They were on land belonging to Sam and Ward Kuehn, Grady and Kenneth Halbert, Jeff Matysek and Fred Hammonds.

Sam and Ward Kuehn have sprigged 10 acres of coastal bermudagrass, built a 1,600-foot Great Plains fence, and constructed a 900-foot diversion terrace. They have also carried out a cropping system, crop residue management, and pasture management on their farm.

Grady and Kenneth Halbert have sprayed 170 acres of mesquite, constructed 12,465 feet of diversion terraces, and built a farm pond. They have also carried out a cropping system, stubble mulching, contour farming, deferred grazing, and proper grazing use on their farm.

Jeff Matysek has sprigged nine acres of coastal bermudagrass and built a 1350 foot Great Plains fence. He has also carried out a cropping system, residue management, installed a sprinkler irrigation system, and pasture management on his farm.

Fred Hammonds has sprigged 13 acres of coastal bermudagrass and built 1750 feet of Great Plains fences. He has also carried out a cropping system, and residue management on his farm.

The response to the Great Plains Conservation Program is increasing tremendously each year, according to John McAlister of the local Soil Conservation Service office. Pronounced dead at the scene was Mrs. Greening and dead on arrival at a Vernon hospital was Mrs. Betty Denny, about 97, of Childress. Mrs. Sam Denny, 69, of Childress, died about 2 p. m. in a Vernon hospital.

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Wheat Fertilizer Demonstration Begun in County

A wheat fertilizer demonstration has been established in Foard County by County Agent Joe Burkett, in cooperation with Dr. Jim Mulkey, superintendent of the Chillicothe Experiment Station of Texas A&M University.

It is located on Jesse Whitfield's farm northeast of Crowell.

Eleven different rates and combinations of nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium fertilizers were used in the demonstration. Each of these rates and combinations were repeated four times in the demonstration.

Later in the year, these plots will be marked, showing the different rates and combinations of fertilizer used, so the wheat farmers and others interested can observe them. When the wheat is harvested, the yield will be figured for each rate and combination of fertilizer and the results made available to those who want it.

Uncle Sam's Selective Service

Editor's note: Below are questions now being asked at draft boards. The answers are by Col. Morris S. Schwartz, State Selective Service Director, 702 Colorado Street, Austin, Texas 78701. He will welcome your questions.

Q—I am now deferred in class II-S as a college student. If I enlist in the National Guard, what will happen to my student deferment?

A—When your local board is notified that you've enlisted, you'll be reclassified from class II-S to class I-D (member of a reserve component).

Q—I've received my induction order. Is it too late to enlist in the Regular Navy?

A—if a representative of the Regular Navy presents evidence that he is prepared to enlist you by your induction date, your order will be cancelled.

Q—My local board has classified me in class I-S(C). I'm a junior in college and was wondering how long I may retain that classification?

Farmers' Filing Requirements Listed by IRS

Farmers who earned at least two-thirds of their 1967 gross income from farming should file their declaration of estimated federal income tax (including self-employment) for 1967 on or before Monday, January 15, 1968. Form 1040-ES should be used for this purpose.

However, Ellis Campbell, Jr., District Director of Internal Revenue for North Texas, said that farmers need not file an estimate if they file their 1967 federal income tax return, Form 1040, and pay in full any tax due by February 15, 1968.

"Farmer's Tax Guide," (Publication No. 225), which furnishes information on this subject, may be obtained from the Internal Revenue Service or from the county farm agent.

Q—My son writes that his local board has refused to permit him to appeal to the President. Why is this?

A—An appeal to the President is not permitted in every case. If the decision of a state appeal board is unanimous, the individual does not have a right of appeal to the President. The state director of Selective Service for the state in which the man's local board is located, the state director of Selective Service for the state in which the appeal board is located, or the national director of Selective Service are authorized to make further appeal in such cases if they consider it appropriate. The local board does not have authority to take such action.

Q—Recently I employed a young man whom I consider essential to my business. Even though he's new, can I request an occupational deferment for him?

A—Yes. When your employee files a request with his local board for an occupational deferment, you should, at the same time, make a similar request. Your letter to the board should describe in considerable detail the duties for

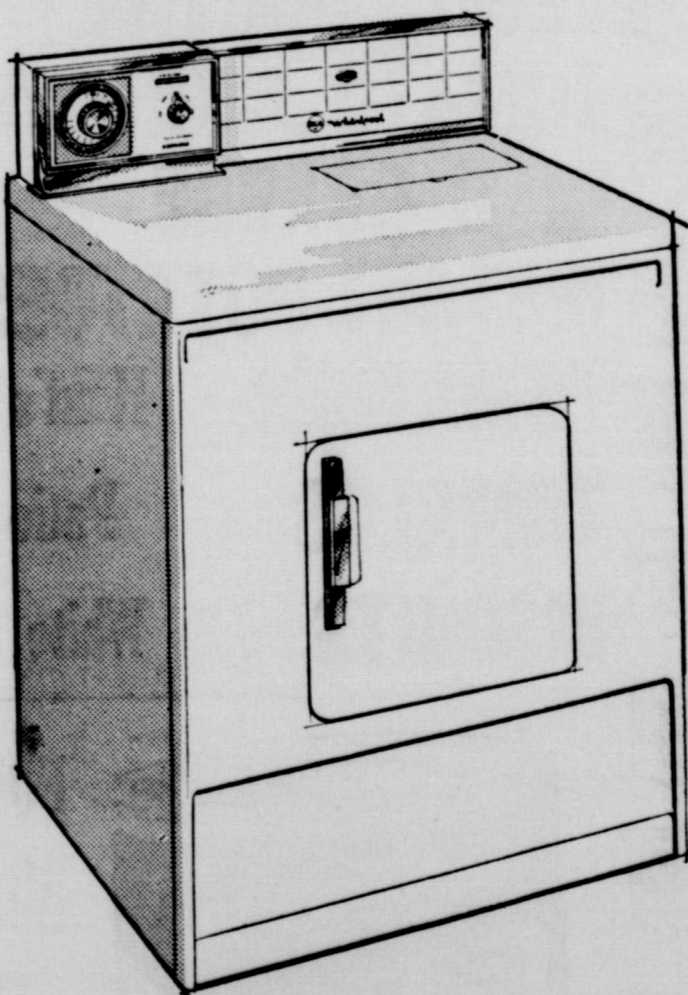

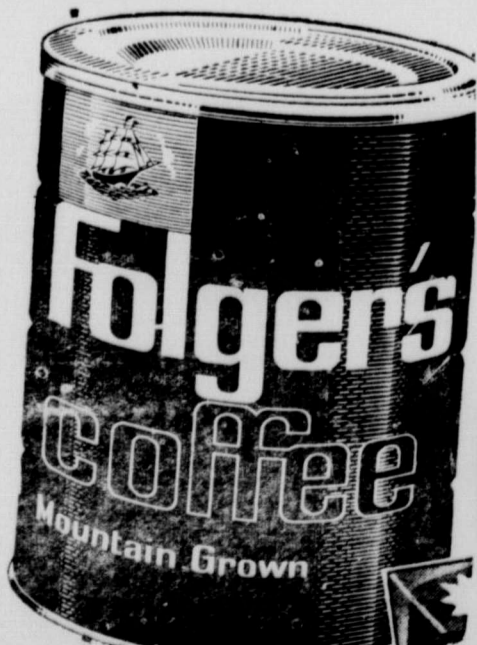

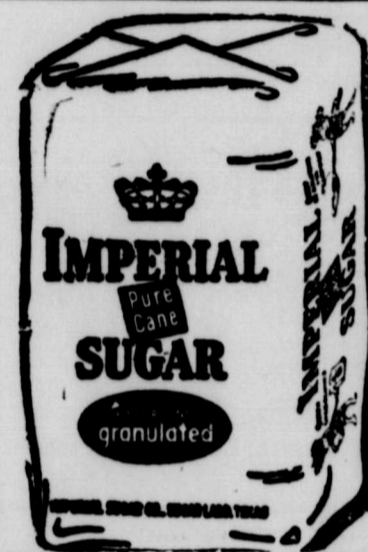

Greenbugs Are Showing Up in Wheat Fields

Greenbugs are beginning to show up in wheat in Foard County. Heavy infestations have shown up in Knox, Hall, Motley, Briscoe, Crosby, Floyd and Hale Counties, according to Joe Burkett, County Agent.

Burkett cautions farmers to keep a close watch on their wheat for damaging infestations.

Burkett says it takes more than freezing weather to kill greenbugs. In Texas this insect passes the winter in the active nymphal and adult stages. If the temperature goes as low as zero or as high as 105 degrees F., some will be killed. Population reduction will also occur at temperatures of 25 and below for extended periods of time. From 55 to 80 degrees is the optimum temperature range for greenbug reproduction. Lady beetles, nabids and lacewings prey on greenbugs, which are also parasitized by a tiny wasp. When temperatures are below 65 degrees, most greenbug enemies reproduce slowly or hardly at all. Long periods of cool weather thus permit the greenbug to increase in enormous numbers while its natural enemies increase very slowly.

Two Minutes With the Bible

Continue Thou

"Evil men and seducers shall wax worse and worse . . . but continue thou" (II Tim. 3:13,14).

These were among the last words of the great Apostle Paul, written in view of his approaching martyrdom, to Timothy, his beloved son in the faith.

Circumstances, outwardly, were anything but encouraging. It seemed that the last days of the dispensation of grace were indeed at hand. The apostle had borne many "persecutions" and "afflictions" and now "suffered trouble, as an evil doer, even unto bonds." There were those who, like James and Jambres, had "resisted the truth" (verse 8). "Alexander the coppersmith" had done him "much evil" and had "greatly withstood his words" (4:14,15). "Evil men and seducers" had risen on every hand and were to "wax worse and worse, deceiving and being deceived" (3:13).

There was even defection among his own brethren in the faith, so that now, from his Roman prison, he had to report: "All they which are in Asia have turned away from me . . . Demas hath forsaken me . . . only Luke is with me" (1:15; 4:10,11).

And what, now, is his parting advice to young Timothy? Does he say: "Perhaps I have been too intense. My methods have made many enemies. I advise you to be more diplomatic and tolerant than I have been"? Hardly, for the records show Paul to have been of all men most tactful and considerate. His sufferings were not the result of a contentious spirit, but of his faithfulness in proclaiming that message which so embarrasses and enrages "our adversary, the devil," that message which is God's gracious response to man's need and His answer to Satan's slander—the gospel of the grace of God.

Thus it is that the Apostle urges Timothy: "Continue thou . . . be not ashamed . . . be strong." He well knew that in this sin-cursed world the only hope for the individual is to be found in God's offer of salvation through faith in the redemption wrought by Christ at Calvary.

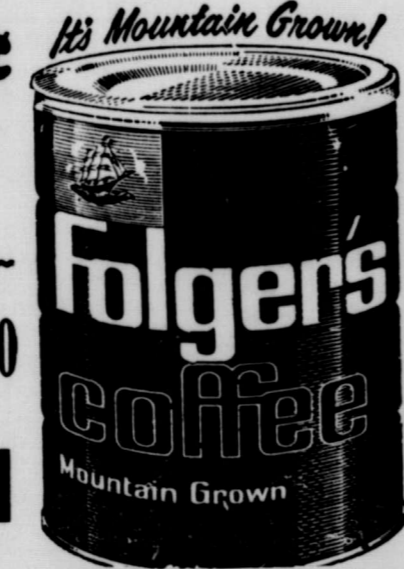

From the News ...

THIRTY YEARS AGO

The State has allotted \$32,500 for hard surfacing Highway 16 south of Crowell.

Father's night will be observed by the Crowell PTA next Monday night, Jan. 16, at 7 o'clock in the High School auditorium in connection with the formal opening of Crowell's new grammar school building. Mrs. A. R. Sanders, president of the Parent Teacher Association, will preside at the meeting.

A total of 43 marriage licenses were issued in Foard County during 1937, a gain of five over the 38 licenses issued in 1936.

There were 110 births and 50 deaths recorded in the county during 1937.

Crowell's new and modern \$75,000 grammar school building was occupied by the ward classes on Monday, Jan. 2. Over 300 desks were moved from the First Baptist Church, where school had been held for the past 1 1/2 years.

With a total of 28.61 inches of rain, the year of 1937 had more moisture than any in the past 11 years, or since 1926 when over thirty inches of rain was received. This mark is 9.46 inches above that of 1936, which was 18.97 inches, and the least received since 1928.

"Dutch" Brough of Plainview, an early-day bronc buster and cowboy on the Witherspoon Ranch, was here for a short visit with friends Monday.

R. J. Thomas, Jr., who has been employed in a dry goods store by his brother-in-law, Irving Fisch of Wink, has accepted a position with the B. & W. Man's Shop in Crowell and assumed his duties Monday.

H. T. Faughn has leased his farm of forty acres to the Government for a nursery to raise trees for shelterbelt purposes during 1938. The trees will be used to re-set shelterbelt strips and put out new strips during 1939.

Point V—Prospecting

Research and analysis must have been carried out, resulting in the identification of "candidate" industries.

All available means of financing must have been examined and, preferably, an Industrial Foundation formed.

Sites and buildings must have been inventoried and evaluated in terms of your "candidate" industries.

These four points are on-going processes and should be well underway before concerted prospecting will be worthwhile. However, because industrial development is a very long-term, continuous process, every community that has a program must inevitably get out and beat the bushes for prospects. Where are your best prospects?

The answer is surprising to some. Your first best prospects are found in the industry you already have. It may be the least glamorous, but research shows that 80 per cent of all industrial growth is due to expansion of existing industry. And, after all, the industry that you already have will be the easiest and most economical to work on. They need the help of your I. D. Committee just like outside industry does—help and encouragement in the forms of research and financing and securing a new building. Your second best prospect is "the man with an idea." Inventiveness combined with enthusiasm is very valuable. Your fourth best prospects are manufacturers in Texas. Our state has more multi-plant operations than any other state in the nation. And Texas industry is growing rapidly. No industrial prospect should be without a current

copy of The Directory of Texas Manufacturers, a valuable reference book.

Your fifth best prospects will come from making the best of the inside information that can be gathered in your own community when all of your citizens are aware of the program and helping. Get every one looking for tips, get them interested... get them involved.

In a certain Texas town, a group of young businessmen with industrial development in mind hold a weekly breakfast for all the salesmen who happen to be in town. Imagine what information might be passed on at such a gathering. If Mrs. Smith's brother is purchasing agent for a big plant in the mid-West, and she hears that his company is considering a Texas location... well, that's a prospect.

All this is not to say that prospecting is easy. It's not. But it is intended to show you that there are more types of prospects than you perhaps thought, and closer to home.

At some stage in prospecting, you will want to promote your community. A colorful, informative brochure is a good way to do this. A campaign of direct mail to your "candidate" industries is another good means of promotion. If your town has developed any tourist attractions, these can be used for promotion relating to industrial development.

Prospecting for new industry is never easy, but it will be a lot easier when the first four points of industrial development have been initiated.

Color Photograph Necessary Part of Driver's License

Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, reminded Texans this week that a color photograph becomes a standard part of all drivers' licenses issued after January 1, 1968.

"The change makes it necessary for all drivers to renew licenses in person at one of our department offices," Garrison said, "and we have been working toward setting up a procedure that will not cause excessive delay when a person comes to us to renew a license."

Garrison explained that the change in license was incorporated into law by the last legislature. "Renewal notices will be mailed to each driver, just as always," Garrison said. "However, under the new procedure, each driver must take the renewal notice to the nearest DPS office. There he will be given a standard vision test, sign the renewal notice and step in front of our camera. The picture will be snapped and a receipt will be issued to enable the person to drive until he receives his new license in the mail."

Garrison explained that about 250 full-time license offices would be in operation over the state to service license renewals. Issuance of new licenses will also be conducted in many of these new offices as well as at offices already established.

There are currently over 5,800,000 licensed drivers in Texas and about 2,500,000 licenses are renewed annually. To facilitate the process, all licenses after January 1 will be renewed to expire on the birthdate of the licensee. If the person holds a license ending in an even number, it will be renewed for a four year term; if the license ends in an odd number, it will be renewed for two years the first time, then for four years each time thereafter. The cost to the driver remains the same per year.

The new license will be approximately 2 1/8 inches wide by 3 3/8 inches long, or about the same size as a standard credit card.

"We anticipate fairly large crowds at many of our offices," said Garrison, "and we hope to be able to give each person completely satisfactory service. We look forward to making many new friends among the millions of persons we have been serving by mail before now."

Foard in Area for Prospective Junior College

The State College Coordinating Board staff said last week at least 18 more public junior colleges are feasible in Texas during the next ten years.

Counties in the 18 proposed regions include Region No. 28 which includes Cottle, Hardeman, Foard, Wilbarger, Wichita, Clay, King, Knox, Baylor, Archer, Stonewall, Haskell, Throckmorton and Young.

Dr. Jack Williams, commissioner of higher education, presented preliminary staff proposals for coordinating board policy on community junior colleges at a meeting of presidents of two-year colleges.

The board's staff recommended that no community junior college be authorized until it can enroll at least 500 full-time student equivalents in freshman and sophomore academic work by its third year and has a potential of at least 1,000 full-time student equivalents in all programs by the start of its fifth year.

Based on these standards, the staff proposed that the state be divided into 52 geographic regions each of which could support at least one junior college. Thirty-four of the proposed regions already have such schools.
