H. E. (Bud) Minyard Died in Hospital Thursday

Funeral Services Held at Baptist Church Sunday

H. E. (Bud) Minyard, 71, veteran of World War I and retired farmer, died in the Foard County Hospital Thursday night, after an apparent heart attack. Mr. Minyard had been in bad health for a number of years.

Funeral services were conducted at 2:30 p. m. Sunday from the First Baptist Church with the pastor, Rev. John Gillispie, officiating. Interment was in the Crowell Cemetery with Womack Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Pall bearers were Allen Taylor and Billy Marlow of Crowell, Glen Taylor of Wellington, John Moore, Clarence Moore and Dwayne Orr of Dallas, and Clarence Orr of Duke, Okla.

Hugh Estrus Minyard was born July 12, 1896, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. William Harvey Minyard, at Carrollton, Miss. He moved to Foard County with his parents in 1911.

He and the former Miss Oma Orr were married in Margaret on May 2, 1920.

Mr. Minyard helped to organize the American Legion Post in Crowell and recently received the 50-year membership pin of that organization.

Mr. Minyard was a member of the Baptist Church, the I. O. O. F. Lodge, and served as commander of the Gordon J. Ford American Legion Post here for more than a decade before the post became inactive in 1967, at which time he joined the Vernon Legion Post.

He served with the 90th Infantry Division in France during World War I.

Survivors include his wife; two sons, Joe Allen Minyard of Rapid City, S. D., and Ernest Minyard of Corpus Christi; one daughter, Mrs. Clyde James of Clarendon; four sisters, Mrs. Virgie Wright of Wichita Falls, Mrs. Inos Taylor of Wellington, Mrs. Bill Marlow of Crowell and Mrs. Frank Moore of Dallas; ten grandchildren and five great grandchildren.

Pioneer Resident of Margaret Died in Hospital Sunday

Last Rites for Mrs. Valeria Owens Held Monday

Funeral services for Mrs. R. T. (Valeria) Owens, 91, pioneer resident of Foard County, were conducted at 3 p. m. Monday from the Margaret Methodist Church, with Rev. E. H. Martin, pastor, officiating, assisted by Rev. G. C. Laney, of Paducah, former pastor of the Margaret Baptist Church. Interment was in the Crowell Cemetery with Womack Funeral Home directing.

Pall bearers were Allen Taylor, Ray Hysinger, J. E. Ingle, W. A. Dunn, L. E. Painter and Joe Gordon.

Mrs. Owens, a resident of the Margaret community, died Sunday in the Foard County Hospital.

Born October 23, 1876, at Lafayette, Ala., she was a member of the Woodman Circle and was the last surviving charter member of the Margaret Methodist Church which was organized in 1895.

Mrs. Owens had lived by herself for many years, and was extremely active for a person of her age until she fell and broke her hip a few weeks ago. Her husband died in 1918.

Survivors include four sons, Jim Owens and A. B. Owens, both of Margaret, A. W. Owens of Wichita Falls, and David Lee Owens of Knox City; six grandchildren; 10 great grandchildren and three great great grandchildren.

CITY NOW RECEIVING GREENBELT WATER

Water customers of the City of Crowell are now receiving their water supply from the Greenbelt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority.

The City of Crowell was turned into the new water system last Saturday, according to Mrs. Wilma Cates, city secretary.

The new source of water for Crowell promises to give the city a steady source of water especially during the summer months, when the water would sometimes go off due to extremely heavy usage, and with an adequate supply of water, it is hoped that this factor will help cut fire insurance rates here, which have taken a large jump within the past two years.

One of the causes of the insurance increase was an inadequate water supply.

Two Grass Fires Reported Last Week; Residents Urged Not to Burn Trash

Foard County Volunteer Fire Department was called out twice Tuesday afternoon of last week to fight grass fires.

The first call was to the Fred-buhtmeyer home in the north of town where a grass fire damaged a fence and scorched the paint on the home before being extinguished by the department.

Shortly afterwards, the department was called to the Texan Courts to extinguish a grass fire.

Fire Chief Leonard Tole this week urged Crowell residents not to burn trash as the dry grass which might catch from trash barrel fires burns extremely fast and is a danger to homes.

If trash must be burned, it should not be left unattended until it is completely burned down, Chief Tole added.

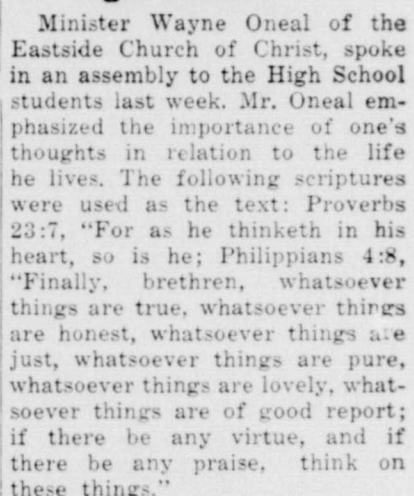

Social Security Changes Affect Women, Children

Edwin Draughon, manager of the Vernon social security office, says among the changes in the social security program recently signed into law are a number of special significance to women.

Chief among them is a change that will make about 175,000 children eligible for monthly payments. It changes the conditions for determining dependency upon a working mother.

Some widowers who were dependent on a wife at the time of the wife's death and some husbands who were dependent on a wife at the time of her retirement or disability may now also get benefits under this provision. Another very important change in the law makes it possible for a disabled widow, or disabled divorced wife, of a worker to receive disability benefits beginning at age 50. This provision also applies to the disabled widower who was dependent upon his wife at the time of her death.

Anyone believing that they or someone in their family may be eligible under these changes in the law should get in touch with the Vernon office.

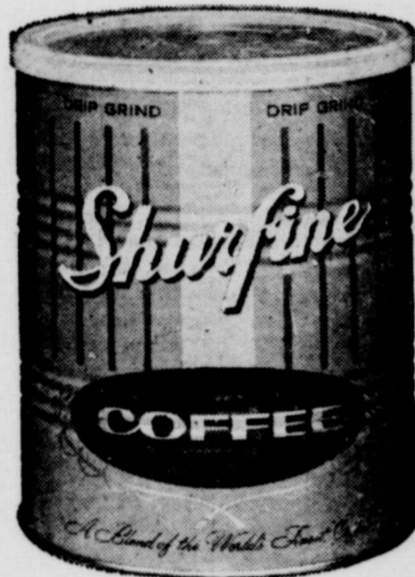

Robert Kincaid Is Foard Easter Seal Representative

Robert Kincaid will serve as Easter Seal representative and treasurer for the 1968 Easter Seal Appeal in Foard County, it was announced this week by Robert W. Milam, of McAllen, president of the Easter Seal Society for Crippled Children and Adults of Texas.

Residents of Foard County will receive the annual Easter Seal Appeal letters in the mail beginning March 1. The Easter Seal Appeal, conducted yearly to provide disabled persons and their families treatment and service adapted to specific community needs, will be conducted until Easter Sunday, April 14.

Mr. Kincaid is one of 169 men and women throughout Texas who are serving in this capacity. The cost of the state-wide program is over one million dollars, financed mainly by the Easter Seal Appeal. Almost 90 per cent of all funds raised by the Easter Seal Appeal remain in Texas to support the growing needs of the disabled in the state.

Special emphasis is being given in the 1968 Easter Seal Appeal to the disabled citizen or his family in Foard County who may need assistance and not know where to obtain it. Any disabled person can contact Mr. Kincaid at the Crowell State Bank, who will refer the request for services to the Easter Seal Society. A determination of the extent and type of assistance needed and the most efficient means of obtaining that assistance will be made. Arrangements for needed treatment or service will be made by the Easter Seal Society.

Dr. Milam stated that funds received as a result of the annual Easter Seal Appeal now aid 17,622 disabled Texans but that there are many more not currently being aided. These disabled cit-

izens and especially those in Foard County who contact Mr. Kincaid can now be guided to the proper sources of assistance. They or their families are urged to contact him or the Texas Easter Seal Society in Dallas, regardless of age, race, cause of disability or financial status.

Dr. Milam added that the Texas Easter Seal Society annually spends more money on direct services to patients than it raises in the Easter Seal Appeal.
